Each month, all AFA members receive *Air Force* Magazine, the journal of the Air Force Association and flagship publication of the AFA publications enterprise. The Magazine has a long and proud history, having been in existence since 1918—before there was either an Air Force or an Air Force Association.

Over the decades, *Air Force* Magazine has evolved into one of the world's foremost defense publications. It bears no resemblance to the small, parochial, inward-looking "house organs" so typical of most associations. It maintains the highest standards of quality, accuracy, and integrity while covering a broad range of military, foreign, and intelligence issues. Though it exists to serve the AFA membership, *Air Force* Magazine is also a significant voice to the wider world: read, respected, and frequently cited by members of Congress, defense officials, and other media.

The excellence of our Magazine is of premier importance to the Association. It provides AFA members with the facts, figures, and straight analysis needed to stay abreast of major Air Force, airpower, and defense issues. The Magazine, with in-depth articles of a historical nature, also fosters appreciation for airpower heritage and lore

The staff of *Air Force* Magazine also produces the annual May Almanac and a wide variety of special publications such as conference programs and Mitchell Institute reports. The May Almanac is a heavyweight compendium of facts and figures about Air Force people, equipment, budgets, bases, organizations, leaders, heroes, and much more. This invaluable reference tool is referred to throughout the year, and the Air Force orders hundreds of extra copies for airmen to use as basic desk reference.

Air Force Magazine's online "Daily Report" allows for comprehensive

Many defense officials begin their day with the Daily Report, and have commented that it's the single best source for news about the Air Force.

Available either by daily e-mail blast or online at www.airforce-magazine.com, the Daily Report brings airpower professionals up-to-the minute news along with useful graphics, testimony, and in-depth pieces.

One testament to the quality of work the *Air Force* Magazine staff puts together comes from the large number of reprint requests we receive. Every year, we receive dozens of official requests to reprint *Air Force* Magazine articles from organizations such as the Air War College, the Joint Unmanned Aircraft Systems Center of Excellence, the Naval War College, NATO Special Operations School, the Spaatz Center, Squadron Officer College, and the US Army Command and General Staff College.

AFA's President/CEO uses e-mail to inform some 80,000 AFA members, Members of Congress, and the Air Force community about current Air Force issues and AFA positions, utilizing his long-running *Notes from the President* and new *Washington Perspective*. The reach and impact of these products continue to grow.

Informing AFA Members

"AFA Update" has provided information on AFA benefits and veteran, retiree, and Tricare issues, reaching more than 70,000 AFA members via e-mail twice monthly.

Educating Lawmakers and their Staffs

Congressional outreach programs include briefings, targeted meetings, and Secretary/Chief of Staff of the Air Force receptions reaching hundreds of Congressional staffers and members, with attendance increasing at virtually every event.

Leveraging Social Media

AFA has taken many initiatives to leverage social media in our day-to-day activities. Our reach is far beyond members. On **Twitter**, we're followed by other aviation fans, reporters, government officials, industry partners, and Air Force leaders. On **Facebook**, we highlight chapter activities, scholarships, and other awards, and connect people with the work AFA headquarters is doing, as well as share pictures, stories, and heritage. With increased real time social media presence at all our events, we can quickly provide updates from our conference/symposium sessions to our online fans. We can also make connections with those that are present at the events.

Conferences/Symposia, Technology Expositions, AFA Breakfast Series, and Other Events

AFA's conference and symposia maintained good attendance in 2011, and, even with the questionable state of the economy and defense budget cuts, our technology exposition exhibit sales showed a slight growth over the previous year. Corporate sponsorships also were up in 2011. These events and others sponsored by AFA offer valuable professional development opportunities for the Total Force and help educate the public on airpower issues.

Air Warfare Symposium and Technology Exposition

AFA's 27th annual Air Warfare Symposium and Technology Exposition at the Rosen Shingle Creek Hotel in Orlando, FL, attracted more than 2,000 attendees. Although down by 90 from 2010, overall the 2011 event was still significantly higher than earlier years. The larger venue has enabled AFA to continue to expand the technology exposition. In 2011, the square footage of the exposition floor space increased by approximately 15% over 2010. And, total sponsorships in 2011 were 7.6% higher than in 2010.

CyberFutures Conference and Technology Exposition

In 2011, AFA held its inaugural CyberFutures Conference and Technology Exposition at the Gaylord National Resort and Convention Center in National Harbor, MD. This new conference provides a venue for open dialogue on the cyber challenges facing the nation, bringing together DOD leadership, industry experts, academicians, and current cybersecurity specialists. This first event attracted a modest number of attendees and exhibitors.

Air & Space Conference and Technology Exposition

AFA's three-day Air & Space Conference and Technology Exposition at the Gaylord National Resort and Convention Center in National Harbor, MD, attracted nearly 6,000 attendees. It featured 93 individual speakers over 54 workshops, panels, and addresses. The technology exposition showcased 126 exhibitors, with average booth size up by more than 21 square feet over the previous year. Industry sponsorships were about 3% lower than anticipated. AFA continues to network with industry partners, working with each company individually to determine where each finds value as a means to sustain and expand this program.

Global Warfare Symposium

The AFA Global Warfare Symposium held in Los Angeles in 2011 attracted 776 attendees. AFA moved the event from the Beverly Hilton to the Hyatt Century Plaza in Los Angeles. The larger venue enbaled AFA to expand the symposium, adding breakout sessions and more speakers. However, attendance did drop about 4% over the previous year.

Corporate Membership Program


The AFA Industrial Associate Program ended Dec. 31, 2009, and on Jan. 1, 2010, AFA launched its new AFA Corporate Membership Program. Now in its second year, the program attracted 91 companies. It currently numbers 88 companies. Among the benefits to each company are 50 full individual memberships and a listing in AFA's online Corporate Member Directory. The program provides a variety of opportunities for industry to put its products and programs in front of decision-makers at every level and provides industry employees with opportunities to pursue professional education, networking, and to meet potential new customers. Of note, while AFA requires Corporate Membership to exhibit (and sponsor) at its technology expositions, several Corporate Membership companies are not currently exhibitors at AFA's shows.

AFA Air Force Breakfast Series

In October 2009, AFA began hosting Air Force Breakfast programs, which are held 10 times each year in Arlington, VA, with speakers provided by the Secretary of the Air Force's office. These events consistently attract leaders of aerospace industry and defenseaerospace media representatives.

Other AFA Events

AFA continues to sponsor an annual Air Attaché Reception, enabling USAF and corporate officials to converse with members of the foreign attaché community in an informal setting. Another enterprising venue—the AFA Chalet at the Joint Services Open House at JB Andrews, MD-continues to attract an increasing number of Air Force officials, AFA industry partners, and foreign attachés and other members of their embassies.







AFA founded the General Billy Mitchell Institute for Airpower Studies to honor the leadership of Brig. Gen. William Mitchell through timely and high-quality research, writing, and speaking on airpower and its role in the security of the nation.

In 2011, the Mitchell Institute, under the leadership of independent Director Dr. Rebecca Grant since its founding in 2008, hosted several airpower discussions and produced two papers.

The Mitchell Hour presentations included:

- Reflections on Desert Storm—presented by Gen. Charles A. Horner, USAF (Ret.), who led air operations for the 1990-1991 Operation Desert Shield/Desert Storm.
- AirSea Battle for the Future—presented by Gen. Philip M. Breedlove, Air Force Vice Chief of Staff, who led USAF work on a new AirSea Battle developed with the Navy.
- Operation Enduring Freedom: A New Model for Airpower—presented by Gen. T. Michael Moseley, USAF (Ret.), who led coalition air operations during the opening phase of OEF in 2001.

■ Airpower and National Security—presented by Dr. Grant and David A. Ochmanek, Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense for Force Development, during AFA's Air Warfare Symposium & Technology Exposition in Orlando, Fla.

Attendance levels for each session ranged from 40 to 75. Audience members included a good mix of analysts, industry representatives, foreign attaches, active duty military, and media.

The Mitchell Institute Press published two Mitchell Papers:

- **Predator's Big Safari,** written by long-time defense reporter Richard Whittle and based on research and interviews he conducted over more than two years to help produce a historical record of the development and initial employments of the technological revolution that is the MQ-1 Predator remotely piloted aircraft.
- Layering ISR Forces, researched and written by former fighter pilot Col. Michael W. Isherwood, USAF (Ret.), now a defense analyst, who says: "Intelligence, surveillance, and reconnaissance (ISR) may be growing into the pre-eminent mission of the United States Air Force."

THE NATIONAL HIGH SCHOOL CYBER DEFENSE COMPETITION

AFA's CyberPatriot (CP), The National High School Cyber Defense Competition, matured in the past year into a strong national competition.

The CyberPatriot-III National Finals Competition, conducted in the Washington, DC area, was an unqualified success. Emerging as National Champions were Red Bank Regional High School from Little Silver, NJ, in the Open Division and Orlando (FL) Cadet Squadron (Civil Air Patrol) in the All Service Division. Through the generosity of CyberPatriot Presenting Sponsor Northrop Grumman, \$54,000 in educational grants were awarded to winning team members in the First, Second, and Third places of both Divisions.

The CyberPatriot Program Office implemented a post-CP-III competition survey instrument to assess program success in providing an effective, educational, and exciting competition. Every measurement indicated positive outcomes including self-assessed knowledge improvement in cybersecurity, providing a meaningful competition, and whether the competition was fun for competitors. For CyberPatriot-IV both pre- and post survey instruments have been implemented.

The number of registering teams expanded in both divisions of competition from the 2010-2011 competition (CP-III) to the 2011-2012 competition (CP-IV). In the All Service Division (open to Junior ROTC teams of all Services and Civil Air Patrol composite and cadet squadrons) registered teams increased from 489 to 617 teams, a 26% increase. And in the Open Division (open to any high school), registrations increased from 189 to 402 teams, a staggering 113% increase.

The growth was attributed to several factors, including a strong external marketing effort led by several elements of the AFA head-quarters staff, a strong presence by CyberPatriot at several key science, technology, and education forums, and to an exceptionally strong promotion and recruiting effort by AFA volunteers. Analysis suggests the program reached 100,000 American students in carrying its message of the importance of cybersecurity and the promise of rewarding careers in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics.

CP-IV also brought an international flavor to the competition. Having heard of CyberPatriot's success, Manitoba Innovation, Energy and Mines contacted the CyberPatriot Program Office to request participation of Canadian high school teams in the competition. Through the execution of a memorandum of agreement, Canada

was represented in online rounds of competition and was assured of a presence at the CP-IV National Finals Competition with two international exhibition teams.

During the year, the National Association of Secondary School Principals placed CyberPatriot on the NASSP National "Advisory List" of Student Contests and Activities for 2011-2012. The designation provided a resounding endorsement of the program's strong relevance as an accredited national high school contest. As of this writing indications are that CP will receive a repeat listing for CP-V in the coming year.

The competition was restructured in 2011 to provide more symmetry between the two divisions of competition. In CP-III and earlier competitions, 12 All Service Division teams competed at AFA's Air Warfare Symposium for only five opportunities to advance to the National Finals Competition. Beginning with CP-IV, fully 12 All Service Division teams will advance to the National Finals Competition, a number that matches the number of Open Division teams advancing.

EDUCATE

Concept planning began in 2011 for expansion of CyberPatriot to a regional competition. The new structure, likely to be introduced in limited form in CP-V, will better allow the program to manage its tremendous growth and will assure equitable distribution of national finalist teams throughout the nation.

Planning also began at restructuring the architecture of the CyberPatriot competition system. With achievement of even aggressive growth goals established for CP-IV, it became apparent the system must be able to expand to accommodate even more teams. Accordingly, with the preparation and distribution of a requirements document, planning began for the new system expected to be fielded in time for CP-V online competition.

The year also brought the designation of the Los Angeles Unified School District (LA-USD) as the first CyberPatriot Center of Excellence (COE). LA-USD's established record of strong recruitment of teams (which numbered nearly 50 for CP-IV) and the outstanding performance of those teams in the national competition was the basis of the designation. As of the preparation of this report other areas were also about to be designated CP COEs.

CyberPatriot sponsorships surged in 2011 and early 2012. Northrop Grumman renewed its generous Presenting Sponsorship through CyberPatriot V, while transferring sponsorship from Northrop Grumman to The Northrop Grumman Foundation. SAIC, Boeing, AT&T, Microsoft, and the Air Force Research Laboratory continued their sponsorships. Additionally, CyberPatriot welcomed URS under the newly created tiered sponsorship categories as a Cyber Gold Sponsor. MIT Lincoln Laboratory and Cisco joined as Cyber Silver Sponsors. CyberPatriot also continued its strong relationship with The University of Texas-San Antonio's Center for Infrastructure Assurance and Security (UTSA-CIAS). UTSA-CIAS is closely involved in development of the CyberPatriot regionalization concept.

Legislative Accomplishments

Health Care Issues

- Won VA stipend, health/respite care, and support services for wounded warriors' caregivers.
- Won implementation of TRICARE coverage for Gray Area Reserve retirees.
- Authorized TRICARE coverage until age 26 for unmarried children with no employer coverage.
- Expanded VA health care services for women veterans.

Active/Reserve Force Issues

- Won upgrades to laws protecting troops' and families' financial, legal rights.
- Barred services from administratively separating servicemembers for medical conditions for which they have been found fit for duty.
- Eliminated 75% cap on retired pay for military disability retirees with over 30 years of service.
- Enhanced travel benefits for survivors to attend memorial services.
- Required approval of next-of-kin for media access at return-of-remains ceremonies.

Military Family/Veterans/Other Issues

- Won participation by 39 states in Military Children's Educational Compact.
- Won DOD reimbursement of full household goods replacement value if carrier doesn't cover.
- Established job training/services grants for female vets and homeless vets with children.
- Improved and increased services to homeless veterans.
- Increased and improved VA insurance for servicemembers, wounded, and veterans.
- Won upgrades to Post-9/11 GI Bill fixes to allow job training, Guard AGR (Title 32) access, active duty book allowance.

Weapons Systems Recapitalization

Advocated for the following:

- Preservation of the funding request and development schedule for the next generation bomber.
- Ensuring that the KC-46 tanker acquisition program stays on track.
- Maintaining robust F-35 funding to mitigate the fighter bathtub in the active duty, Guard, and Reserve.
- Sustaining legacy aircraft service life extension programs to maintain force structure capacity.
- Ensuring concurrent and balanced modernization of Guard and Reserve assets.
- Making continued investment in the Air Force's cyberspace capabilities.
- Sustaining investment in the Air Force's strategic infrastructure to enable effective shaping and deterrence.
- Modernizing Air Force Special Operations equipment and systems.

Top Issues for 2012

AFA's Top Issues for 2012, which were approved by the Board of Directors and national delegates at the national convention in September 2011, represent AFA's positions on the current and ongoing issues facing the Air Force today.

The Air Force Association is especially proud of Air Force men and women—Active, Guard, Reserve, retired, and civilian—for their sacrifices on behalf of our nation. The strength of the Air Force is found in the men and women who serve. AFA is grateful for their dedication.

PREPARING AND SUPPORTING AIRMEN; CARING FOR VETERANS AND RETIREES

- National leaders must make it a priority to protect troops, families, and veterans from an erosion of retirement benefits. Changes must not be made without a thorough analysis of the impacts of those changes.
- TRICARE/TRICARE For Life is an earned benefit that meets the unique demands of military service.
- Our veterans deserve the best of care; more must be done to reduce the high rates of unemployment and homelessness found among veterans.

RECAPITALIZING THE AGING FLEET

- Recognize the vital nature of the KC-46A program and give it unqualified support. It must be fielded promptly.
- Continue modification of the C-5B/Cs; secure the flexibility to retire the older C-5As.
- Keep the F-35 on schedule to prevent a fighter deficit.
- Field a new bomber well before the current B-52 and B-1 bomber fleets go out of service.
- Ensure C-130J platform recapitalization efforts remain an Air Force priority to ensure the United States continues to provide the world's premier Special Operations aviation capability.

SECURING SPACE AND CYBERSPACE

- Support strong Air Force role in ensuring US military security and freedom of action within the cyber domain.
- Fully fund and support space situational awareness, space protection programs, and assured access to space.
- Invest steadily and strategically on space capabilities and recognize the US must retain clear superiority in this critical mission area.

STRENGTHENING THE NUCLEAR MISSION

- Provide life extension programs that ensure safe, reliable, and secure nuclear weapons and maintain a responsive production infrastructure to deter, assure, and provide stability.
- Sustain delivery systems and warheads for the foreseeable future, but just as importantly, nuclear support equipment and infrastructure.
- Support policies for future improvement of our nuclear deterrent.

INVESTING IN AIRPOWER

- Promote early learning in foundational studies, including science and math, to stimulate the development of the next generation of engineers, scientists, and technicians.
- Establish a strategic plan to identify the elements of a robust defense industrial base and the steps, to include funding, needed to maintain that robustness.

About the Foundation

The Air Force Memorial Foundation (AFMF) provides the daily Air Force Memorial (AFM) management oversight and direct event planning and support that helps ensure the AFM becomes and remains a national place of reverence, remembrance, celebration, and pride for its hundreds of thousands yearly visitors. Inherent and critical to this mission is preserving the heritage of America's Airmen.


The AFMF was formed in 1992 as a tax exempt, charitable, historical, and educational organization. (It is incorporated in the District of Columbia and has been granted a 501(c)(3) status by the IRS and contributions are 100% tax deductible.) It was created to build a national memorial to commemorate the contributions, sacrifices, courage, and heroism of America's Airmen and the technological achievements that have made American airpower the most formidable in the world.

The Memorial was dedicated in October 2006 to the millions of patriotic men and women who have distinguished themselves in the service of their country in the US Air Force and its heritage organizations.

In April 2007 the AFMF officially became affiliated with and fully part of the Air Force Association. AFA formally signed an agreement to provide oversight governance and a day-to-day operational presence at the Memorial. This day-to-day presence is provided by the two staff members of the AFMF.

Preserving Air Force Heritage

AFA through the AFMF has defined an Air Force Memorial vision for the 2017 time period. A significant goal of this vision is the preservation of Air Force Heritage. Several actions are on-going to help us meet this vision. Three that can use your support are the on-going volunteer docent program, the annual Airman's Society program, and the Air Force Memorial Registry:

AFA Veteran Benefits Association



The AFA Veteran Benefits Association (AFAVBA) is an AFA affiliate. AFAVBA is a 501(c)19 Veterans Organization formed to manage the Veterans Advocacy and member benefit programs of AFA. AFAVBA supports legislation that will improve the quality of life for all veterans who have served our nation. All AFA Members are also members of AFAVBA. We encourage you to review the benefit programs of AFA and AFAVBA at www.afavba.org.

GROUP INSURANCE PROGRAMS

AFAVBA paid \$3.3 million in death benefits in 2011 to the families of members insured under its Term Life and Accidental Death insurance policies. More than 20,000 members participate in these group life insurance plans which are exclusive to AFAVBA. The AFAVBA life insurance plans are particularly beneficial for AFA members as they do not contain a war clause and do not exclude deaths resulting from terrorist activities. And, there is no additional premium or reduction in benefits for flying personnel.

Dividend payments totaling more than \$225,000 were mailed to participants in the Decreasing Term Life Insurance plan in 2011, essentially returning a portion of the premium paid for their insurance protection.

Other insurance programs administered or endorsed by AFAVBA which are benefitting members include long-term care, dental, whole life, hospital, cancer, auto and home, and supplements to both Medicare and TRICARE.

OTHER BENEFIT PROGRAMS

Additional programs administered or endorsed by AFAVBA that benefit AFA members include a group legal services plan; vacation and travel discounts; emergency travel services; car and truck rental discounts; tuition discounts; resume preparation assistance; a job bank; shopping discounts at Apple, Dell, Microsoft, and car dealers; discounts for prescriptions, vision, dental and medical screenings; and discounts on identity theft protection and bank checks. An exclusive "World Rewards" MasterCard is available to members with additional benefits.

AFAVBA staff members also develop and administer special projects for AFA, including the 2011 "Air Force Association Membership Directory," the Holiday Greeting Card Program, the USAF Tradition of Excellence DVD Series, and the "Hangar" store which sells merchandise with the AFA and Air Force Memorial Foundation logos.

AFA BUILDING

The AFA headquarters building is a landmark in the Washington, D.C. area and a great source of pride for the association. AFA is the sole owner of the building and occupies about 25 percent of its space. About 75 percent of the building is leased to other organizations. We are pleased to report that the building is fully leased and occupied and should provide a steady stream of revenue in the years ahead.



Awards, Grants, and Scholarships

Pitsenbarger Awards

Each year AFA awards \$400 grants and a certificate of achievement to Air Force enlisted personnel who have graduated from the Community College of the Air Force in pursuit of a bachelor's degree and who exhibit distinguished activity encompassing leadership, teamwork, citizenship, community service, dedication, personal development, and academic achievement. They also must have a commander's endorsement. In 2011, AFA presented 382 Pitsenbarger Awards (for a total of \$152,800), which are named for SSgt. William H. Pitsenbarger, a pararescue jumper who received the Medal of Honor posthumously for heroic actions during the Vietnam War.

Spouse Scholarships

In 2011, AFA awarded four education scholarships of \$2,500 each to spouses who are pursuing undergraduate or graduate degrees. The recipients of these scholarships must be spouses of active duty, Guard, or Reserve airmen who have demonstrated academic achievement and participated in community activities. The 2011 recipients are: Laura Ann Atkins, JB Elmendorf-Richardson, AK, who is pursuing a bachelor's degree in finance and history; Sharon Groves, Columbia, SC, who is pursuing a master's in social work with plans to complete certification as a family and marriage counselor; Logan C. Schmaltz, Moorhead, MN, who is seeking a bachelor's in biology and chemistry to meet pre-veterinary requirements; D'Ann Warnke, O'Fallon, IL, who is pursuing a bachelor's in sports management, health, and fitness to enhance her work as a fitness trainer.

JROTC Instructor Grants

Continuing its long tradition of support for Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (JROTC) programs, AFA provided \$5,000 in 2011 to help promote aerospace education activities, including making 20 \$250 grants to JROTC instructors.

CAP Educator and Unit Grants

In 2011, AFA awarded \$22,500 to support Civil Air Patrol (CAP) aerospace education activities. The grants go to teachers who are members of either CAP or AFA to help them further aerospace knowledge among their students and to CAP units to support science, technology, engineering, or math (STEM) activities. AFA awarded grants in the amount of \$250 each to 39 educators and to 40 CAP units.

Outstanding CAP, JROTC, ROTC Cadets

Each year AFA works with CAP, JROTC, and ROTC officials to honor individual cadets who have demonstrated outstanding focus and energy in their aerospace endeavors. Each detachment, squadron, or unit selects an outstanding cadet and presents an AFA medal, ribbon, and certificate to the cadet. In 2011, AFA awards went to 211 CAP cadets, 888 JROTC cadets, and 146 ROTC cadets.

Lt. Col. Romeo and Josephine Bass Ferretti Scholarship

In 2011, AFA presented a \$2,500 scholarship to Christina Marie Bladow of Bellevue, NE, to help her pursue a degree in biology at Creighton University in Omaha. AFA presents this scholarship thank to a \$250,000 endowment provided by the late Lt. Col. Romeo Ferretti, USAF (Ret.) and late Mrs. Josephine Bass Ferretti. The recipients are minor dependents of Air Force active duty, Guard, or Reserve personnel who have demonstrated both merit and need. Both Colonel

Ferretti and his wife were long-time supporters of AFA and advocates of education. Colonel Ferretti began his military career as a P-61 pilot in World War II, retiring from the Air Force after 23 years and afterward becoming a stock broker and financial planner. His wife was a secondary and high school teacher for 30 years and taught a variety of courses for airmen at MacDill AFB, Florida.

Capt. Jodi Callahan Memorial Scholarship

AFA awarded the \$1,000 Capt. Jodi Callahan Memorial Scholarship in 2011 to TSgt. Edward M. Thomas Jr., who is pursuing a master's in human relations at the University of Oklahoma. Recipients of this annual scholarship must be an active duty, Guard, or Reserve Air Force officer or enlisted member seeking a graduate degree in a non-technical field. Donations to the Jodi Callahan Memorial Fund make this annual scholarship possible. Captain Callahan, who was pursuing a second master's degree at the time of her death, was an under-40 AFA National Director and Aerospace Education Foundation Trustee.

Spaatz Award

In 2011, AFA bestowed the Gen. Carl A. "Tooey" Spaatz Award on Maj. Shawn Keller, along with an accompanying \$1,000 and replica of the Spaatz plaque. AFA presents the Spaatz award annually to the Air Command and Staff College graduate with the paper that best advocates Air Force aerospace power, in this case, the paper titled "Turning Point: A History of German Petroleum in World War II and its Lessons for the Role of Modern Oil in Air Warfare." This award is made possible through an endowed gift by Rebecca Spaatz-Nagel to honor her father, General Spaatz, who not only served as Air Force Chief of Staff but also, after his retirement, as AFA Chairman of the Board, continuing his strong advocacy of telling the airpower story.

Grantham University Scholarship

AFA manages the selection process for Grantham University Scholarships awarded to an active duty airman or AFA member or dependent of either category. In 2011, AFA helped select Teresa Kimminau, who is the spouse of an active duty officer and has worked in nursing for more than 26 years. She plans to pursue a master's in nursing education. She will receive an online degree scholarship valued at approximately \$36,000.

Aerospace Education Educator Grants

Each year AFA promotes aerospace education within K-12 classrooms through its Educator Grant program, which awards up to \$250 grants to meet the unmet and unfunded educational needs of students. AFA selects projects it believes will significantly influence student learning through development of innovative aerospace activities within a school's prescribed curriculum. For the 2011-12 school year, AFA awarded 79 Educator Grants, totaling \$19,377.

Visions of Exploration Grants

USA TODAY Education and AFA, which began the Visions of Exploration program 21 years ago as a means to enhance elementary, middle, and high school student skills in STEM courses and aerospace education, have reached nearly 13 million students over the course of the program with the help of AFA's more than 200 local chapters. For the 2011-12 school year, the Visions of Exploration program sponsored 777 classrooms, reaching some 230,000 students.

Michael Wilson Scholarship

The Air Force Association is proud to announce the Michael Wilson Scholarship, a new fund that awards scholarships to Air Force ROTC cadets throughout the country.

This remarkable scholarship was established through Brian Wilson, pitcher for Major League Baseball's San Francisco Giants, to reflect the honor, commitment to service, and legacy of Brian's father, Michael Wilson, in the US Air Force. Brian's father, a 22-year Air Force veteran, passed away from cancer when Brian was 17.

Brian Wilson's contribution is the largest scholarship donation given by an individual that AFA has administered in its 65-year history.

This program will enable AFA to award two scholarships each year for the next five years

(2011 to 2015). It is open to any Air Force ROTC cadet in the United States.

Brian Wilson said: "This scholarship is not a donation in my mind, but rather a reward to those who put their country before themselves—a reward that dictates diligence, leadership, perseverance, and patriotism. It is an honor for me to contribute to the men and women who represent America. Most of my family served and our flag is etched in my heart. From an early age I learned punctuality, order, and reliance. These are the traits that have molded me into the man I am today."

"The men and women who voluntarily sign-up to protect and defend our country are this nation's greatest asset," said Mike Dunn, President and CEO of AFA. "AFA strives to encourage and assist

AFA encourages the pursuit of education by offering numerous scholarships and grants to Air Force active duty, Air National Guard and Air Force Reserve members and their dependents; and awards various educator grants to promote science and math education at the elementary and secondary school levels.

Wounded Airman Program

The Air Force Association and its chapters have taken on a new initiative to help care for wounded Airmen as they make their way from the front lines to their home. AFA Chapters around the world are participating in this effort along with the Air Force Recovery Care Coordinators to provide support to Airmen while in various phases of recovery.

When Airmen are injured and returning to the United States, they typically do not have personal clothing or items with them as they begin medical recovery. This new program was created to help ease their discomfort by offering a variety of both required and congenial items. These items range from immediate small sundries, gift cards, casual clothing, bags, entertainment, and

technology to connection with larger support agencies for longer term support. The program may also provide support for family members who arrive to assist their recovery and rehabilitation.

In 2011, three AFA chapters implemented the first phase of this new initiative: the Nation's Capital Chapter and D.W. Steele, Sr. Memorial Chapter in the D.C. area and the Alamo Chapter in San Antonio. These three chapters were initially selected due to the volume of injured Airmen sent to the military medical facilities in their locations. The AFA program is also monitoring wounded Airmen arriving in both Germany and Hawaii. In the near future, AFA will also be following Airmen injured in the past to determine their needs and challenges.

Air Force Team of the Year Program

AFA works with the Air Force each year to honor a career field under the Team of the Year Program. The Chief Master Sergeant of the Air Force and the major command-level command chief master sergeants select the career field—historically an enlisted field—and identify individual members who clearly display superior technical expertise, attract the praise of their superiors, and provide leadership and inspiration to others.

For 2011, the Air Force chose First Sergeants as the Team of the Year, selecting five airmen to represent the special duty's more than 2,500 members. AFA honored those five during a reception and a ceremony in the Washington, DC area as part of a four-day program that included visits with Air Force leaders at the Pentagon and a visit with each team member's Congressman on Capitol Hill.

CMSgt. David R. Henry serves as Air Force Reserve Command First Sergeant Functional Manager at Hq. AFRC, Robins AFB, GA, where he is responsible for advising the command on the training and utilization of 521 assigned first sergeants. Since entering the Air Force in August 1989, he has served in the aircraft maintenance field and as a first sergeant at squadron, group, wing, and command levels.

MSgt. Todd K. Meaney is the First Sergeant for the 790th Missile Security Forces Squadron at F.E. Warren AFB, WY, where he assists the commander in managing the health, morale, welfare, and discipline for more than 300 personnel. He entered USAF in June 1990, serving first as a construction equipment operator apprentice and then retraining into the F-16 avionics maintenance field. He deployed for Desert Storm, Enduring Freedom, and Iraqi Freedom.

SMSgt. Melanie K. Noel, an instructor at the US Air Force First Sergeant Academy at Gunter Annex, Maxwell AFB, AL, helps develop the curriculum for and teaches prospective first sergeants. She entered the service in April 1992, serving in



the Security Forces and personnel administration fields and as a first sergeant and deploying to Operation Iraqi Freedom. She also helped create the first-ever First Sergeant Spouse's Guide.

SMSgt. Manny Piñeiro is the First Sergeant for Hq. 3rd Air Force at Ramstein AB, Germany, where he serves as the principle advisor to the commander on the morale, welfare, readiness, and fitness for more than 1,200 personnel and their families. Since entering the Air Force in July 1988, he served in the services career field and as a military training instructor, as well as deploying to Desert Shield/Storm, Enduring Freedom, and Iraqi Freedom.

SMSgt. Ernest T. Williams, First Sergeant for the 147th Combat Communications Squadron at San Diego ANGS, CA, serves as the commander's focal point for all matters concerning the unit's enlisted members. He enlisted in the Marine Corps in June 1980 and joined the California Air National Guard in January 1992. As a civilian, Williams works at the Space and Naval Warfare Systems Center Pacific where he supervises an engineering branch.

Outstanding Airmen Program

The Air Force Outstanding Airmen program annually recognizes 12 enlisted members for superior leadership, job performance, community involvement, and personal achievements. The program was initiated at AFA's 10th annual National Convention, held in New Orleans in 1956. The selection board comprises the Chief Master Sergeant

of the Air Force and the command chief master sergeants from each USAF major command. The selections are reviewed by the Air Force Chief of Staff. The Air Force awards the 12 selectees the Outstanding Airman ribbon with the bronze service star device. They also wear the Outstanding Airman badge for one year.



SSGT. JORDAN S. BISHOPP

Explosive Ordnance Disposal Craftsman, 377th EOD Flight 377th Air Base Wing (Air Force Materiel Command) Kirtland AFB, N.M.

Home State: New Mexico

On his third deployment, this one to Afghanistan, Bishopp completed more than 120 combat missions, neutralizing 46 improvised explosive devices. He analyzed 12 post-blast IED attacks, helping improve operations, and he collected and catalogued more than 500 post-attack IED items, providing evidence instrumental in the capture of at least three enemy IED placers. Over three deployments, he completed more than 400 missions, countering 200 IEDs, and received the Bronze Star Medal, Army Commendation Medal with one oak leaf cluster, and the Joint Service Achievement Medal. One of his commanders calls him "the complete package," who shows superior job knowledge and leadership, particularly in mentoring younger airmen.

TSGT. RICARDO A. CHAVEZ

Military Training Instructor 433rd Airlift Wing (Air Force Reserve Command) Lackland AFB, Tex. (Part of Joint Base San Antonio) Home State: Texas

Chavez began his Air Force career as a security forces specialist, including serving as an undercover agent for a joint drug enforcement team, before switching to the Reserve and cross-training as a military training instructor. Chavez has the Master MTI Blue Rope award and is among USAF's top MTIs. He is considered a BEAST master—training recruits in basic combat skills and improving courseware in USAF's new Basic Expeditionary Airman Skills Training program. He has improved the MTI process, cutting class prep time by 26 percent and equipment errors by 42 percent. Chavez also serves as an MTI training manager, providing orientation and ensuring compliance for newly assigned instructors.



LS AIR FORCE

TSGT. DUSTIN K. GOODWIN

Flight Chief, 48th Security Forces Squadron 48th Fighter Wing (US Air Forces in Europe) RAF Lakenheath, Britain Home State: California

Goodwin has deployed twice to both Iraq and Afghanistan. Recently in Afghanistan, in a three-hour-long attack against his facility, he engaged 20 enemy fighters—at one point shunning full cover to take out two insurgents who were throwing grenades. He received a Bronze Star Medal and Air Force Combat Action Medal. He also responded outside the wire to 13 enemy rocket attacks, receiving an Army Combat Action Badge. Goodwin helped foil an espionage plot and organized transfer of a high-value-target prisoner, receiving State Department praise. He also worked with the Army's Criminal Investigation Division and US Secret Service to help defuse a potential threat to the President.



SMSGT. PATRICK D. JONES

Operations Flight Superintendent, 375th Civil Engineer Squadron 375th Air Mobility Wing (Air Mobility Command) Scott AFB, III.

Home State: Louisiana

Jones, who helps manage 250 multiskilled military and civilian engineers, was named best AMC superintendent and led his squadron to best in AMC. USAF benchmarked his work to develop a \$15 million 24-mile pipe repair plan. He anchored the wing's Air Traffic System Evaluation Program, receiving AMC inspector general praise for "best to date" preparation. His effort during a major snow recovery operation ensured uninterrupted Tanker Airlift Control Center operations during Haiti earthquake relief activity. He also saved USAF about \$2 million by enlisting Reserve help in repairing and converting 85 housing units to transient living facility quarters.

SRA. NORA L. LIMJOCO

Dental Lab Journeyman, 30th Medical Operations Squadron 30th Space Wing (Air Force Space Command) Vandenberg AFB, Calif. Home State: Louisiana

Limjoco has "definitely raised the bar," according to one supervisor. In addition to excelling at her primary work, designing and fabricating dental prostheses, she directs the wing's Basic Life Support program, oversees the Precious Metals program, and is a member of the 30th Medical Group security team. As part of the BLS program, Limjoco has certified more than 3,000 base personnel, greatly improving wing emergency readiness. She led a five-person lab during the NCOIC's six-month absence and is rated No. 1 among five lab personnel by providers. Her efforts to develop a dental lab case log and initiate product timeline comment codes were lauded by Air Force Medical Operations Agency officials.



SMSGT. KATHLEEN M. MCCOOL

Superintendent, Recruiter Screening Team Air Force Recruiting Service (Air Education and Training Command) Randolph AFB, Tex. Home State: Arizona

McCool transitioned from health services management to Military Training Instructor, achieving a Master MTI Blue Rope Award, before volunteering for recruiting and becoming one of the top 12 recruiters in the nation. She took her enlisted accessions production flight from bottom to first place among 189 AFRS production flights. She revamped the new recruiter assignment process, reducing screening time by 5,000 hours per year. She spearheaded AETC's special duty briefing team, increasing recruiter duty applications by 300 percent, and her mentoring skill enabled a new recruiter to earn top rookie honors in 2010. She also led recruiter hiring, securing high caliber personnel with a 96 percent successful recruiter schoolhouse graduation rate.

Outstanding Airmen Program Continued

SMSGT. DAVID L. NEWMAN

Superintendent, Knowledge Operations Management, J3 US Strategic Command Offutt AFB, Neb. Home State: California

Newman orchestrated more than 1,800 taskings related to nuclear command and control policy and forecasted more than 50 nuclear inspections across five platforms, helping revive NC2 accountability. He received a Joint Service Achievement Medal for leading the response team when USSTRATCOM headquarters flooded. Among other accomplishments, he spearheaded a two-day Combatant Commander Liaison Officer conference; revamped an evaluation program, improving quality and timeliness; led J3 implementation of DOD's Translingual Instant Messaging (TrIM) initiative; and worked with several Army and Air Force inspectors general on employing Defense Connect Online to capture testimonies to save money and expedite investigations.



Norris served as a Tactical Air Control Party member on three deployments before leaving active duty to enroll full-time in college and join the Air National Guard. Before a recent deployment to Afghanistan, he created realistic training scenarios that increased TACP situational awareness and response times and successfully indoctrinated inexperienced airmen for combat operations. On deployment, he charged into enemy fire, rescuing two wounded soldiers, and then directed lethal fire from two Apache helicopters while ordering evacuation of the wounded. His Army commander has nominated him for a Bronze Star Medal with Valor Device. He also controlled 120 close air support strikes and conducted more than 100 combat patrols, receiving the Army Commendation Medal

SRA. DANIEL T. SKIDMORE

Combat Control Journeyman, 21st Special Tactics Squadron 720th Special Tactics Group (Air Force Special Operations Command) Pope Field, N.C. Home State: Ohio

Skidmore was among the first airmen in Haiti, deploying just 26 hours after the earthquake struck and quickly working to set up airfield operations. He and five other combat controllers ran the international airport out of rucksacks, averaging takeoffs and landings every five minutes for more than 4,100 sorties with no mishaps. Skidmore personally marshaled more than 100 aircraft and worked with Haiti air traffic personnel and Miami Center. He also helped rescue several American citizens. At his home base, he briefed a Senate delegation on ground operations in Haiti. In a recent deployment to Afghanistan, he participated in 60 combat missions and three firefights. In one ambush with his team pinned down, he returned fire while calling in close air support, successfully directing USAF F-15E fighters and Army AH-64 helicopters on precision strikes. He also organized and led CAS training for Army Special Forces.



SRA. ULLA B. STRÖMBERG

Medical Technician Journeyman, 99th Medical Operations Squadron 99th Air Base Wing (Air Combat Command)

Nellis AFB, Nev. Home State: Kansas

Strömberg was selected for below-the-zone promotion and is a recipient of the Nellis Air Force Base Chief's Excellence in Action award. At Nellis, she provided care to 400 patients per month, attaining 111 percent of her goal, and assisted with 161 readiness reviews, helping assure wing medical readiness at more than 97 percent and achieve an excellent rating on the wing operational readiness inspection. She also was an Honor Guard trainer and ACC's Honor Guardsman of the Year. On deployment to Afghanistan, she aided 1,200 patients, 15 surges, and 500 aeromedevacs—earning an "excellent care" comment and coin from an Army commander and an Army Achievement Medal.



SRA. RAVEN S. TAYLOR

Medical Technician Journeyman, 354th Medical Operations Squadron 354th Fighter Wing (Pacific Air Forces)

Eielson AFB, Alaska Home State: Georgia

Taylor has often been called to fill in for more senior NCOs. She trained three sections in instrument sterilization procedures, ensuring wartime skills certification. She saved valuable time for nurses by contacting 600 patients about lab results. Taylor also revamped the infection control program, ensuring zero acquired infections over 18,000 patient visits. She oversaw 650 preventive health assessments during a 50 percent manning shortage to sustain the wing's medical readiness. She assisted with 20 minor surgeries, averting costly referrals. She led the medical screenings process, personally handling 2,000 patients, and achieved overall a 98 percent access rate. She also built minor surgical kits, enabling 60 new procedures and decreasing appointment times by 20 percent.



Vehicle Operations Supervisor, 5th Logistics Readiness Squadron 5th Bomb Wing (Air Force Global Strike Command) Minot AFB, N. D.

Home State: Indiana

Serving with an Army medium truck detachment on deployment, Williams participated in 200 missions, encountering 300 insurgent attacks. He led 17 convoys, providing critical supplies to 23 forward operating bases. He saved six convoys by rerouting them and coordinating with a quick reaction force after identifying vehicle-borne improvised explosive devices. He thwarted a small-arms attack. He conducted in-theater training, leading 25 premission convoy briefs and reinforcing combat skills for dozens of airmen and soldiers. He was among first responders on a major accident and coordinated life-saving medical evacuation. His feedback at the career field manager deployment after-action conference prompted USAF to change its convoy training standards. He received a Bronze Star Medal for his efforts while deployed. At Minot, as acting first sergeant, he personally counseled airmen on numerous financial and family problems.





National Teacher of the Year Program

AFA created its National Aerospace Teacher of the Year Award 26 years ago to recognize K–12 teachers for their accomplishments and achievements in building enthusiasm among their students about science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) and preparing those students to use STEM skills to contribute to tomorrow's technologies. In 2011, AFA selected Nancy Hoover of L.C. Bird High School, Midlothian, VA, as its National Aerospace Teacher of the Year.

Hoover is a high school teacher with 15 years' experience, exclusively in the physical sciences with a solid focus on STEM courses. Over the years, she increased her capability to teach complex subject matter by earning a Ph.D. and obtaining specialized training. She currently serves as the Specialty Center Coordinator at the Governor's Academy for Engineering Studies at L.C. Bird High School.

Employing innovative teaching tactics, she has extended her education efforts beyond the basic classroom to include endeavors such as sponsoring student teams for robotic programs, the Physics Olympics, and NASA's Student Launch Initiative. She looks for every opportunity to provide successful experiences for her students.

Hoover also established a series of "Brown Bag Seminars," offering an interactive forum with teachers, parents, and guests that allows students to ask questions about professional STEM experiences and future STEM career opportunities. To further increase her school's academic offerings, she established an aerospace curriculum, consulting with subject matter experts to help develop objectives and create quality lesson plans.

AFA presented Hoover with a \$3,000 cash award and plaque

at its National Convention in the Washington, DC metro area. AFA also presented cash awards to the second and third place national-level teachers of the year—Lori Bradner of Florida received \$2,000 and Thomas E. Jenkins Jr. of Ohio, \$1,000.

MEMBERSHIP AND FIELD ACTIVITIES

AFA Field Report

The Air Force Association is made up of a grassroots network of more than 200 local chapters, 38 state organizations, and 14 regional organizations. AFA members work together through chapters to carry out the goals of the association as determined by our elected Board of Directors.

Chapters conduct meetings, seminars, legislative visits, aerospace education projects, and much more to focus attention on the Air Force and to support AFA's objectives. AFA Field leaders are dedicated to educating the public of the necessity for a strong national defense, advocating Air Force airpower, and supporting the United State Air Force.

While all working to advance the same objectives of the Air Force Association, local chapters vary in the methods used based on their local community. For example, the Kitty Hawk Chapter in North Carolina is made up of 67 members that work tirelessly to keep the chapter active and to educate the public through events held at the Wright Brothers National Memorial. Our largest chapter, the Alamo Chapter in San Antonio, TX, has more than 3,500 members who work together to support the local Lackland Air Force Base. This support includes sponsoring the "Fit to Fight Freedom Run" 5K race on base. The activities of each chapter vary based on the needs and demographics of their environment. The ability to adapt outreach efforts among chapters ensures that advocacy efforts reach all types of communities throughout the country and overseas.

AFA Field leaders also come together as the official governing body of the association. Each September, AFA members from around the country and abroad come together to play a pivotal role in shaping our association. As defined by AFA's Constitution, the association is governed by its National Convention body, which passes its authority to an elected Board of Directors for required actions between National Conventions. 

Composition of AFA Membership





