# H. R. 2818

To amend the Public Health Service Act to provide for the establishment of a drug-free workplace information clearinghouse, to support residential methamphetamine treatment programs for pregnant and parenting women, to improve the prevention and treatment of methamphetamine addiction, and for other purposes.

Mr. MCNERNEY (for himself and Mrs. BONO MACK) introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Energy and Commerce

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## A BILL

To amend the Public Health Service Act to provide for the establishment of a drug-free workplace information clearinghouse, to support residential methamphetamine treatment programs for pregnant and parenting women, to improve the prevention and treatment of methamphetamine addiction, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

1 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

2 This Act may be cited as the “Methamphetamine  
3 Education, Treatment, and Hope Act of 2010”.

4 **SEC. 2. ENHANCING HEALTH CARE PROVIDER AWARENESS**  
5 **OF METHAMPHETAMINE ADDICTION.**

6 Section 507(b) of the Public Health Service Act (42  
7 U.S.C. 290bb(b)) is amended—

8 (1) by redesignating paragraphs (13) and (14)  
9 as paragraphs (14) and (15), respectively; and

10 (2) by inserting after paragraph (12) the fol-  
11 lowing:

12 “(13) collaborate with professionals in the ad-  
13 diction field and primary health care providers to  
14 raise awareness about how to—

15 “(A) recognize the signs of a substance  
16 abuse disorder; and

17 “(B) apply evidence-based practices for  
18 screening and treating individuals with or at-  
19 risk for developing an addiction, including ad-  
20 diction to methamphetamine or other drugs;”.

21 **SEC. 3. RESIDENTIAL TREATMENT PROGRAMS FOR PREG-**  
22 **NANT AND PARENTING WOMEN.**

23 Section 508 of the Public Health Service Act (42  
24 U.S.C. 290bb–1) is amended—

25 (1) in subsection (a)—

1 (A) in the matter preceding paragraph (1),  
2 by striking “postpartum women treatment for  
3 substance abuse” and inserting “parenting  
4 women treatment for substance abuse (includ-  
5 ing treatment for addiction to methamphet-  
6 amine)”;

7 (B) in paragraph (1), by striking “reside  
8 in” and inserting “reside in or receive out-  
9 patient treatment services from”; and

10 (C) in paragraph (2), by striking “the  
11 minor children of the women reside with the  
12 women in such facilities” and inserting “the  
13 minor children of the women who reside in such  
14 facilities reside with such women”;

15 (2) in subsection (d), by amending paragraph  
16 (2) to read as follows:

17 “(2) Referrals for necessary hospital and dental  
18 services.”;

19 (3) by amending subsection (m) to read as fol-  
20 lows:

21 “(m) ALLOCATION OF AWARDS.—In making awards  
22 under subsection (a), the Director shall give priority to  
23 any entity that agrees to use the award for a program  
24 serving an area that—

1           “(1) is a rural area, an area designated under  
2           section 332 by the Administrator of the Health Re-  
3           sources and Services Administration as a health pro-  
4           fessional shortage area with a shortage of mental  
5           health professionals, or an area determined by the  
6           Director to have a shortage of family-based sub-  
7           stance abuse treatment options; and

8           “(2) is determined by the Director to have high  
9           rates of addiction to methamphetamine or other  
10          drugs.”;

11          (4) in subsection (p)—

12           (A) by striking “October 1, 1994” and in-  
13           serting “one year after the date of the enact-  
14           ment of the Methamphetamine Education,  
15           Treatment, and Hope Act of 2010” ;

16           (B) by inserting “In submitting reports  
17           under this subsection, the Director may use  
18           data collected under this section or other provi-  
19           sions of law, insofar as such data is used in a  
20           manner consistent with all Federal privacy laws  
21           applicable to the use of data collected under  
22           this section or other provision, respectively.”  
23           after “biennial report under section 501(k).”;  
24           and

1           (C) by striking “Each report under this  
2           subsection shall include” and all that follows  
3           and inserting “Each report under this sub-  
4           section shall, with respect to the period for  
5           which the report is prepared, include the fol-  
6           lowing:

7           “(1) A summary of any evaluations conducted  
8           under subsection (o).

9           “(2) Data on the number of pregnant and par-  
10          enting women in need of, but not receiving, treat-  
11          ment for substance abuse. Such data shall include,  
12          but not be limited to, the number of pregnant and  
13          parenting women in need of, but not receiving, treat-  
14          ment for methamphetamine abuse, disaggregated by  
15          State and tribe.

16          “(3) Data on recovery and relapse rates of  
17          women receiving treatment for substance abuse  
18          under programs carried out pursuant to this section,  
19          including data disaggregated with respect to treat-  
20          ment for methamphetamine abuse.”;

21          (5) by redesignating subsections (q) and (r) as  
22          subsections (r) and (s), respectively;

23          (6) by inserting after subsection (p) the fol-  
24          lowing:

1       “(q) METHAMPHETAMINE ADDICTION.—In carrying  
2 out this section, the Director shall expand, intensify, and  
3 coordinate efforts to provide pregnant and parenting  
4 women treatment for addiction to methamphetamine or  
5 other drugs.”; and

6           (7) in subsection (s) (as so redesignated), by  
7 striking “such sums as may be necessary to fiscal  
8 years 2001 through 2003” and inserting  
9 “\$16,000,000 for fiscal year 2012, \$16,500,000 for  
10 fiscal year 2013, \$17,000,000 for fiscal year 2014,  
11 and \$17,500,000 for fiscal year 2015, and  
12 \$18,000,000 for fiscal year 2016”.

13 **SEC. 4. WORKPLACE INFORMATION CLEARINGHOUSE.**

14       Section 515(b) of the Public Health Service Act (42  
15 U.S.C. 290bb–21(b)) is amended—

16           (1) in paragraph (10), by striking “and” at the  
17 end;

18           (2) by redesignating paragraph (11) as para-  
19 graph (13); and

20           (3) by inserting after paragraph (10) the fol-  
21 lowing new paragraph:

22           “(11) maintain a clearinghouse that provides  
23 information and educational materials to employers  
24 and employees about comprehensive drug-free work-

1 place programs and substance abuse prevention and  
2 treatment resources;”.

3 **SEC. 5. YOUTH INVOLVEMENT IN PREVENTION STRATE-**  
4 **GIES.**

5 Section 515(b) of the Public Health Service Act (42  
6 U.S.C. 290bb–21(b)), as amended by section 4, is further  
7 amended by inserting after paragraph (11) the following  
8 new paragraph:

9 “(12) support the involvement of youth in the  
10 development and implementation of prevention strat-  
11 egies focused on youth, with regard to methamphet-  
12 amine and other drugs; and”.
