This Week's Hearings and Markups

On Tuesday, the Subcommittee on Insular Affairs, Oceans and Wildlife will hold an oversight hearing on implementation of the "Magnuson-Stevens Fishery Conservation and Management Act (MSFCMA) of 2006." The Subcommittee will explore the progress made by the National Marine Fisheries Service and the Regional Fishery Management Councils in setting annual catch limits and accountability measures to end overfishing and rebuild overfished fish stocks, as required by the MSFCMA. The hearing will focus on how annual catch limits are set, efforts to improve the type and quality of information that informs management decisions, and successes and challenges of implementing annual catch limits and accountability measures.

Goethel, Fishing Vessel Ellen Diane; Herbert P. Moore, Jr., Esq., Gallagher, Briody & Butler; Captain Mark Brown, Fishing Vessel Teaser 2; and Mr. Gregory DiDomenico, Executive Director, Garden State Seafood Association.

• Also on Tuesday, the **Subcommittee on Water and Power** will hold an oversight hearing on "Water Management and Climate Variability: Information

Support at the United States Geological Survey (USGS) and Bureau of Reclamation." The USGS and the Bureau of Reclamation are responsible for the collection and management of water resource data. The National Research Council recently completed their review of the USGS water management program and has identified specific recommendations for ensuring data integrity and accessibility. The oversight hearing will focus on whether the agencies are collecting the right information and whether it is adequate for use by water managers and the general public.

Steiner, P.E., Member, Committee on Water Resource Activities at USGS, Water Science and Technology Board, National Research Council, The National Academies, Washington, D.C.; Mr. Michael Strobel, Director, National Water and Climate Center, United States Department of Agriculture, Portland, Oregon; Mr. Tony Willardson, Executive Director, Western States Water Council, Midvale, Utah; and Mr. Joseph K. Hoffman, Executive Director, Interstate Commission on the Potomac, River Basin, Rockville, Maryland.

- On Wednesday, the **Committee on Natural Resources** will meet in open markup session to consider the following bills:
  - <u>H.R. 2213</u> (Kind): To reauthorize the Neotropical Migratory Bird Conservation Act.
  - <u>H.R. 2888</u> (DeFazio): To provide for the designation of the Devil's Staircase Wilderness Area in the State of Oregon, to designate segments of Wasson and Franklin Creeks in the State of Oregon as wild or recreation rivers, and for other purposes. *"Devil's Staircase Wilderness Act of 2009"*
  - <u>H.R. 2781</u> (Schrader): To amend the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act to designate segments of the Molalla River in Oregon, as components of the National Wild and Scenic Rivers System, and for other purposes.
  - <u>H.R. 86</u> (Campbell): To eliminate an unused lighthouse reservation, provide management consistency by bringing the rocks and small islands along the coast of Orange County, California, and meet the original Congressional intent of preserving Orange County's rocks and small islands, and for other purposes.

• <u>H.R. 118</u> (Frelinghuysen): To authorize the addition of 100 acres to Morristown National Historical Park.
