Dear Administrator Johnson:

I have written to you three times regarding the proposed rulemaking entitled "Prevention of Significant Deterioration New Source Review: Refinements of Increment Modeling Procedures." Staff at the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the National Park Service (NPS) have expressed concern that this proposal will "make it much easier to build power plants" near national parks and will increase air pollution in our national parks. Staff are also concerned that the rule could also adversely affect the air quality in other "class 1" areas, such as wildlife refuges and wilderness areas. EPA has failed to provide assurances — or even express an expectation — that these concerns are unwarranted. The agency has explicitly stated that it was "unable to conclusively confirm or deny" the potentially serious impacts from this rulemaking.<sup>2</sup>

I believe that EPA and NPS staff have raised serious, credible concerns about the likely adverse effects of this rulemaking. Rather than hiding behind self-imposed ignorance, EPA should analyze the impacts of the proposed rule so that the public can fully understand the potential impact of the proposal.
