A BILL

To amend the Homeland Security Act of 2002 to establish the Countering Weapons of Mass Destruction Office, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-

- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Countering Weapons
- 5 of Mass Destruction Act of 2018".

11	"(3) provide resources to enhance detection,
12	analysis, communication, and coordination to better
13	integrate into Federal operations State, local, Tribal,
14	and territorial assets;
15	"(4) facilitate alarm adjudication and provide
16	subject matter expertise and technical assistance on
17	concepts of operations, training, exercises, and alarm
18	response protocols;
19	"(5) communicate with, and promote sharing of
20	information about the presence or detection of nu-
21	clear or other radiological materials among appro-
22	priate Federal, State, local, Tribal, and territorial
23	governments, in a manner that ensures transparency
24	with the jurisdictions served by such program;

1	"(6) provide augmenting resources, as appro-
2	priate, to enable State, local, Tribal, and territorial
3	governments to sustain and refresh their capabilities
4	developed under the STC program; and
5	"(7) provide any other assistance the Secretary
6	determines appropriate.
7	"(b) Designation of Jurisdictions.—In carrying
8	out the STC program under subsection (a), the Secretary
9	shall designate jurisdictions from among high-risk urban
10	areas under section 2003, and other cities and regions,
11	as appropriate.
12	"(c) Congressional Notification.—The Sec-
13	retary shall notify the Committee on Homeland Security
14	and the Committee on Appropriations of the House of
15	Representatives and the Committee on Homeland Security
16	and Governmental Affairs and the Committee on Appro-
17	priations of the Senate not later than three days before
18	the designation of a new jurisdiction in accordance with
19	subsection (b) or any other change to participating juris-
20	dictions.".
21	(b) References and Construction.—
22	(1) In general.—Any reference in any law,
23	regulation, document, paper, or other record of the
24	United States to—

1	(A) the Domestic Nuclear Detection Office
2	shall be deemed to be a reference to the Coun-
3	tering Weapons of Mass Destruction Office; and
4	(B) the Director for Domestic Nuclear De-
5	tection shall be deemed to be a reference to the
6	Assistant Secretary for the Countering Weap-
7	ons of Mass Destruction Office.
8	(2) Construction.—Sections 1923 through
9	1927 of the Homeland Security Act of 2002, as so
10	redesignated by subsection (a), shall be construed to
11	cover the chemical and biological responsibilities of
12	the Assistant Secretary for the Countering Weapons
13	of Mass Destruction Office.
14	(3) AUTHORITY.—The authority of the Director
15	of the Domestic Nuclear Detection Office to make
16	grants or enter into cooperative agreements is trans-
17	ferred to the Assistant Secretary for the Countering
18	Weapons of Mass Destruction Office, and such au-
19	thority shall be construed to include grants for all
20	purposes of title XIX of the Homeland Security Act
21	of 2002, as amended by this Act.
22	(c) CHIEF MEDICAL OFFICER.—
23	(1) Repeal.—Title V of the Homeland Secu-
24	rity Act of 2002 (6 U.S.C. 311 et seq.) is amended
25	by striking section 516.

1	(2) AMENDMENT.—Title XIX of the Homeland
2	Security Act of 2002 (6 U.S.C. 591 et seq.), as

6	"SEC. 1931. CHIEF MEDICAL OFFICER.
7	"(a) In General.—There is in the Office a Chief
8	Medical Officer, who shall be appointed by the President.
9	The Chief Medical Officer shall report to the Assistant
10	Secretary.
11	"(b) QUALIFICATIONS.—The individual appointed as
12	Chief Medical Officer shall be a licensed physician pos-
13	sessing a demonstrated ability in and knowledge of medi-
14	cine and public health.
15	"(c) Responsibilities.—The Chief Medical Officer
16	shall have the responsibility within the Department for
17	medical issues related to natural disasters, acts of ter-
18	rorism, and other man-made disasters, including—
19	"(1) serving as the principal advisor on medical
20	and public health issues to the Secretary, the Ad-
21	ministrator of the Federal Emergency Management
22	Agency, the Assistant Secretary, and other Depart-
23	ment officials;
24	"(2) providing operational medical support to
25	all components of the Department;

1	"(3) as appropriate, providing medical liaisons
2	to the components of the Department, on a reim-
3	bursable basis, to provide subject matter expertise
4	on operational medical issues;
5	"(4) coordinating with Federal, State, local,
6	and Tribal governments, the medical community,
7	and others within and outside the Department, in-
8	cluding the Centers for Disease Control and Preven-
9	tion and the Office of the Assistant Secretary for
10	Preparedness and Response of the Department of
11	Health and Human Services, with respect to medical
12	and public health matters; and
13	"(5) performing such other duties relating to
14	such responsibilities as the Secretary may require.".

2	retary for Management may further delegate these respon-
3	sibilities, as appropriate.
4	"(b) Responsibilities.—The Under Secretary for
5	Management, in coordination with the Chief Medical Offi-
6	cer, shall—
7	"(1) provide oversight and coordinate the med-
8	ical and health activities of the Department for the
9	human and animal personnel of the Department;
10	"(2) establish medical, health, veterinary, and
11	occupational health exposure policy, guidance, strat-
12	egies, and initiatives for the human and animal per-
13	sonnel of the Department;
14	"(3) as deemed appropriate by the Under Sec-
