PEPFAR has saved over 17 million lives through accountable, transparent, and cost-effective investments

18.9 million voluntary medical male circumcisions to prevent Over 14.6 million women, men, and children on lifesaving infections in men and boys

As of September 30, 2018, PEPFAR supported 18.9 million biomedical preventive interventions (VMMC) in Eastern and Southern Africa to protect men and boys.

New HIV diagnoses continued to decline in 85% of DREAMS districts in the past year

In the past year, HIV diagnoses among adolescent girls and young women continued to decline in 85 percent of the highest HIV burden communities/districts that are implementing the program's DREAMS public-private partnership. In addition, eight of the DREAMS-supported districts that had less than a 25 percent decline of new HIV diagnoses among adolescent girls and young women in 2017 had a greater than 25 percent decline in 2018 – showing marked success.

Over 2.4 million babies born HIV-free

As of September 30, 2018, PEPFAR enabled more than 2.4 million babies of HIV-infected mothers to be born HIV-free.

Nearly 95 million people received HIV testing services

PEPFAR supported HIV testing services for nearly 95 million people in Fiscal Year 2018.

As of September 30, 2018, PEPFAR supported lifesaving antiretroviral treatment for more than 14.6 million people.

Over 700,000 children on lifesaving antiretroviral treatment

As of September 30, 2018, PEPFAR supported lifesaving antiretroviral treatment for more than 700,000 children.

Over 6.8 million orphans, vulnerable children, and their caregivers provided with critical care and support

As of September 30, 2018, PEPFAR provided critical care and support for more than 6.8 million orphans, vulnerable children, and their caregivers to mitigate the physical, emotional, and economic impact of HIV/AIDS.

Over 270,000 new health workers trained

As of September 30, 2018, PEPFAR supported training (including pre-service training) for more than 270,000 new health care workers to deliver HIV and other health services.
