- Subject: Soliciting Comments on Proposed Format Change to the Surf Zone Forecast through August 31, 2018

The NWS is seeking public comment on proposed format changes to the Surf Zone Forecast (SRF) through August 31, 2018.

The SRF provides valuable and life-saving information about hazards in the surf zone to all potentially impacted populations along the beach, including the public and providers of beach safety services, e.g., lifeguards. As a result of updates applied at different times and locations to this product over the last several years, there is a need to restore a consistent national format.

Proposed changes to the SRF:

- National standard format: A consistent format will enable users to find surf zone information more easily, regardless of which beach they are visiting. The SRF will contain surf zone conditions out to 2 days with the option to extend the forecast out to 5 days.
- Definitions for Rip Current and Swim Risk will be located at the bottom of the product: Currently, many offices provide the definition next to the Rip Current or Swim Risk, which makes the forecast product length longer.
