11 Allowances and Expenses

 interparliamentary receptions, and gratuities to heirs of
 deceased employees of the House, \$720,247.

5 Administrative Provisions

SEC. 101. (a) REQUIRING AMOUNTS REMAINING IN 6 7 MEMBERS' REPRESENTATIONAL ALLOWANCES TO BE 8 USED FOR DEFICIT REDUCTION OR TO REDUCE THE 9 FEDERAL DEBT.—Notwithstanding any other provision of 10 law, any amounts appropriated under this Act for "HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES—SALARIES AND 11 EXPENSES MEMBERS² REPRESENTATIONAL 12 ALLOW-ANCES" shall be available only for fiscal year 2016. Any 13 amount remaining after all payments are made under such 14 allowances for fiscal year 2016 shall be deposited in the 15 Treasury and used for deficit reduction (or, if there is no 16 17 Federal budget deficit after all such payments have been made, for reducing the Federal debt, in such manner as 18 the Secretary of the Treasury considers appropriate). 19

20 (b) REGULATIONS.—The Committee on House Ad21 ministration of the House of Representatives shall have
22 authority to prescribe regulations to carry out this section.
23 (c) DEFINITION.—As used in this section, the term
24 "Member of the House of Representatives" means a Rep-

resentative in, or a Delegate or Resident Commissioner
 to, the Congress.

3 DELIVERY OF BILLS AND RESOLUTIONS

4 SEC. 102. None of the funds made available in this 5 Act may be used to deliver a printed copy of a bill, joint 6 resolution, or resolution to the office of a Member of the 7 House of Representatives (including a Delegate or Resi-8 dent Commissioner to the Congress) unless the Member 9 requests a copy.

10 DELIVERY OF CONGRESSIONAL RECORD

11 SEC. 103. None of the funds made available by this 12 Act may be used to deliver a printed copy of any version 13 of the Congressional Record to the office of a Member of 14 the House of Representatives (including a Delegate or 15 Resident Commissioner to the Congress).

16 LIMITATION ON AMOUNT AVAILABLE TO LEASE VEHICLES SEC. 104. None of the funds made available in this Act may be used by the Chief Administrative Officer of the House of Representatives to make any payments from any Members' Representational Allowance for the leasing of a vehicle, excluding mobile district offices, in an aggregate amount that exceeds \$1,000 for the vehicle in any month. LIMITATION ON PRINTED COPIES OF U.S. CODE TO

HOUSE

3 SEC. 105. None of the funds made available by this
4 Act may be used to provide an aggregate number of more
5 than 50 printed copies of any edition of the United States
6 Code to all offices of the House of Representatives.

DELIVERY OF REPORTS OF DISBURSEMENTS

8 SEC. 106. None of the funds made available by this 9 Act may be used to deliver a printed copy of the report 10 of disbursements for the operations of the House of Representatives under section 106 of the House of Represent-11 atives Administrative Reform Technical Corrections Act 12 (2 U.S.C. 5535) to the office of a Member of the House 13 of Representatives (including a Delegate or Resident Com-14 15 missioner to the Congress).

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DELIVERY OF DAILY CALENDAR

17 SEC. 107. None of the funds made available by this 18 Act may be used to deliver to the office of a Member of 19 the House of Representatives (including a Delegate or 20 Resident Commissioner to the Congress) a printed copy 21 of the Daily Calendar of the House of Representatives 22 which is prepared by the Clerk of the House of Represent-23 atives.

GENERAL EXPENSES

2 For necessary expenses of the Capitol Police, including motor vehicles, communications and other equipment, 3 4 security equipment and installation, uniforms, weapons, supplies, materials, training, medical services, forensie 5 services, stenographic services, personal and professional 6 7 services, the employee assistance program, the awards pro-8 gram, postage, communication services, travel advances, 9 relocation of instructor and liaison personnel for the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center, and not more 10 than \$5,000 to be expended on the certification of the 11 Chief of the Capitol Police in connection with official rep-12 resentation and reception expenses, \$69,000,000, to be 13 disbursed by the Chief of the Capitol Police or his des-14 15 ignee: Provided, That, notwithstanding any other provision of law, the cost of basic training for the Capitol Police 16 at the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center for fis-17 eal year 2016 shall be paid by the Secretary of Homeland 18 Security from funds available to the Department of Home-19 land Security. 20

 SEC. 1001. (a) IN GENERAL. Section 2802(a)(1) of
 the Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2001 (2 U.S.C.

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1 1905(a)(1)) is amended by striking "District of Colum 2 bia)" and inserting the following: "District of Columbia),
 3 and from any other source in the case of assistance pro 4 vided in connection with an activity that was not spon 5 sored by Congress".

6 (b) CONFORMING AMENDMENT. Section 2802(a)(2) 7 of such Act (2 U.S.C. 1905(a)(2)) is amended by striking 8 "law enforcement assistance to any Federal, State, or local 9 government agency (including any agency of the District 10 of Columbia)" and inserting "any law enforcement assist-11 ance for which reimbursement described in paragraph (1) 12 is made".

12 For salaries for the Architect of the Capitol, and 13 other personal services, at rates of pay provided by law; for all necessary expenses for surveys and studies, con-14 15 struction, operation, and general and administrative support in connection with facilities and activities under the 16 care of the Architect of the Capitol including the Botanie 17 Garden; electrical substations of the Capitol, Senate and 18 House office buildings, and other facilities under the juris-19 diction of the Architect of the Capitol; including fur-20 21 nishings and office equipment; including not more than \$5,000 for official reception and representation expenses, 22 23 to be expended as the Architect of the Capitol may ap-24 prove; for purchase or exchange, maintenance, and oper-25 ation of a passenger motor vehicle, \$90,946,000.

CAPITOL BUILDING

For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care
and operation of the Capitol, \$46,737,000, of which
\$22,737,000 shall remain available until September 30,
2020.

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CAPITOL GROUNDS

For all necessary expenses for care and improvement
of grounds surrounding the Capitol, the Senate and House
office buildings, and the Capitol Power Plant,
\$11,880,000, of which \$2,000,000 shall remain available
until September 30, 2020.

12 House Off

HOUSE OFFICE BUILDINGS

13 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care of the office 14 operation House and buildings, 15 \$149,962,000, of which \$23,886,000 shall remain available until September 30, 2020, and of which \$62,000,000 16 17 shall remain available until expended for the restoration and renovation of the Cannon House Office Building. 18

In addition, for a payment to the House Historie
Buildings Revitalization Trust Fund, \$10,000,000, to remain available until expended.

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CAPITOL POWER PLANT

For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care
and operation of the Capitol Power Plant; lighting, heating, power (including the purchase of electrical energy)

and water and sewer services for the Capitol, Senate and 1 House office buildings, Library of Congress buildings, and 2 the grounds about the same, Botanie Garden, Senate ga-3 4 rage, and air conditioning refrigeration not supplied from 5 plants in any of such buildings; heating the Government Printing Office and Washington City Post Office, and 6 7 heating and chilled water for air conditioning for the Su-8 preme Court Building, the Union Station complex, the 9 Thurgood Marshall Federal Judiciary Building and the 10 Folger Shakespeare Library, expenses for which shall be advanced or reimbursed upon request of the Architect of 11 12 the Capitol and amounts so received shall be deposited into the Treasury to the credit of this appropriation, 13 \$91,549,898, of which \$14,408,898 shall remain available 14 15 until September 30, 2020: Provided, That not more than \$9,000,000 of the funds credited or to be reimbursed to 16 this appropriation as herein provided shall be available for 17 obligation during fiscal year 2016. 18

19 LIBRARY BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

For all necessary expenses for the mechanical and structural maintenance, care and operation of the Library buildings and grounds, \$36,589,000, of which \$11,646,000 shall remain available until September 30, 24 2020. CAPITOL POLICE BUILDINGS, GROUNDS AND SECURITY
 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care
 and operation of buildings, grounds and security enhance ments of the United States Capitol Police, wherever lo cated, the Alternate Computer Facility, and AOC security
 operations, \$22,058,000, of which \$4,525,000 shall re main available until September 30, 2020.

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BOTANIC GARDEN

9 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care 10 and operation of the Botanie Garden and the nurseries, 11 buildings, grounds, and collections; and purchase and ex-12 change, maintenance, repair, and operation of a passenger motor vehicle; all under the direction of the Joint Com-13 mittee on the Library, \$11,892,000; of which \$2,100,000 14 15 shall remain available until September 30, 2020: Provided, That of the amount made available under this heading, 16 17 the Architect of the Capitol may obligate and expend such sums as may be necessary for the maintenance, eare and 18 operation of the National Garden established under sec-19 20 tion 307E of the Legislative Branch Appropriations Act, 21 1989 (2 U.S.C. 2146), upon vouchers approved by the Ar-22 chitect of the Capitol or a duly authorized designee.

23 CAPITOL VISITOR CENTER

For all necessary expenses for the operation of the
Capitol Visitor Center, \$20,557,000.

4 SEC. 1101. None of the funds made available in this 5 Act for the Architect of the Capitol may be used to make incentive or award payments to contractors for work on 6 7 contracts or programs for which the contractor is behind 8 schedule or over budget, unless the Architect of the Cap-9 itol, or agency-employed designee, determines that any 10 such deviations are due to unforeseeable events, government-driven scope changes, or are not significant within 11 the overall scope of the project and/or program. 12

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SCRIMS

14 SEC. 1102. None of the funds made available by this 15 Act may be used for serims containing photographs of 16 building facades during restoration or construction 17 projects performed by the Architect of the Capitol.

18 ACQUISITION OF PARCEL AT FORT MEADE

19 SEC. 1103. (a) ACQUISITION.—The Architect of the 20 Capitol is authorized to acquire from the Maryland State 21 Highway Administration, at no cost to the United States, 22 a parcel of real property (including improvements thereon) 23 consisting of approximately 7.34 acres located within the 24 portion of Fort George G. Meade in Anne Arundel County, 25 Maryland, that was transferred to the Architect of the Capitol by the Secretary of the Army pursuant to section
 122 of the Military Construction Appropriations Act, 1994
 (2 U.S.C. 141 note).

(b) TERMS AND CONDITIONS.—The terms and conditions applicable under subsections (b) and (d) of section
122 of the Military Construction Appropriations Act, 1994
(2 U.S.C. 141 note) to the property acquired by the Architeet of the Capitol pursuant to such section shall apply
to the real property acquired by the Architect pursuant
to the authority of this section.

 sections 111, 119, and chapter 10 of such title may be
 used for the costs incurred in the administration of the
 Copyright Royalty Judges program, with the exception of
 the costs of salaries and benefits for the Copyright Royalty
 Judges and staff under section 802(c).
