In lieu of the matter proposed to be inserted by the  
Senate, insert the following:

**1       DIVISION A—FURTHER ADDITIONAL**  
**2       CONTINUING APPROPRIATIONS ACT, 2019**

**3       SEC. 101.** The Continuing Appropriations Act, 2019  
**4** (division C of Public Law 115–245) is further amended—

**5           (1)** by striking the date specified in section  
**6       105(3)** and inserting “February 8, 2019”; and

**7           (2)** by adding after section 136 the following:

**8       “SEC. 137.** Notwithstanding section 251(a)(1) of the  
**9** Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of  
**10** 1985 and the timetable in section 254(a) of such Act, the  
**11** final sequestration report for fiscal year 2019 pursuant  
**12** to section 254(f)(1) of such Act and any order for fiscal  
**13** year 2019 pursuant to section 254(f)(5) of such Act shall  
**14** be issued, for the Congressional Budget Office, 10 days  
**15** after the date specified in section 105(3), and for the Of-

1 fice of Management and Budget, 15 days after the date  
2 specified in section 105(3).

3 “SEC. 138. The authority provided under title XXI  
4 of the Homeland Security Act of 2002 (6 U.S.C. 621 et  
5 seq.), as amended by section 2(a) of the Protecting and  
6 Securing Chemical Facilities from Terrorist Attacks Act  
7 of 2014 (Public Law 113–254), shall continue in effect  
8 through the date specified in section 105(3).

9 “SEC. 139. Section 319L(e)(1)(A) of the Public  
10 Health Service Act (42 U.S.C. 247d–7e(e)(1)(A)) shall  
11 continue in effect through the date specified in section  
12 105(3) of this Act.

13 “SEC. 140. Section 405(a) of the Pandemic and All  
14 Hazards Preparedness Act (42 U.S.C. 247d–6a note) shall  
15 continue in effect through the date specified in section  
16 105(3) of this Act.

17 “SEC. 141. Notwithstanding any other provision of  
18 this Act, there is appropriated for ‘U.S. Customs and Bor-  
19 der Protection—Procurement, Construction, and Improve-  
20 ments’ \$5,710,357,000 for fiscal year 2019, to remain  
21 available until September 30, 2023.

22 “SEC. 142. Notwithstanding section 101, section 230  
23 of division F of Public Law 115–141 shall not apply to  
24 amounts made available by this Act.”

1 This division may be cited as the “Further Additional  
2 Continuing Appropriations Act, 2019”.

3 **DIVISION B—MEDICAID**  
4 **EXTENDERS**

5 **SEC. 101. EXTENSION OF MONEY FOLLOWS THE PERSON**  
6 **REBALANCING DEMONSTRATION.**

7 (a) GENERAL FUNDING.—Section 6071(h) of the  
8 Deficit Reduction Act of 2005 (42 U.S.C. 1396a note) is  
9 amended—

10 (1) in paragraph (1)—

11 (A) in subparagraph (D), by striking  
12 “and” after the semicolon;

13 (B) in subparagraph (E), by striking the  
14 period at the end and inserting “; and”; and

15 (C) by adding at the end the following:

16 “(F) subject to paragraph (3),  
17 \$112,000,000 for fiscal year 2019.”;

18 (2) in paragraph (2)—

19 (A) by striking “Amounts made” and in-  
20 serting “Subject to paragraph (3), amounts  
21 made”; and

22 (B) by striking “September 30, 2016” and  
23 inserting “September 30, 2021”; and

24 (3) by adding at the end the following new  
25 paragraph:

1           “(3) SPECIAL RULE FOR FY 2019.—Funds ap-  
2           propriated under paragraph (1)(F) shall be made  
3           available for grants to States only if such States  
4           have an approved MFP demonstration project under  
5           this section as of December 31, 2018.”.

6           (b) FUNDING FOR QUALITY ASSURANCE AND IM-  
7           PROVEMENT; TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE; OVERSIGHT.—  
8           Section 6071(f) of the Deficit Reduction Act of 2005 (42  
9           U.S.C. 1396a note) is amended by striking paragraph (2)  
10          and inserting the following:

11           “(2) FUNDING.—From the amounts appro-  
12          priated under subsection (h)(1)(F) for fiscal year  
13          2019, \$500,000 shall be available to the Secretary  
14          for such fiscal year to carry out this subsection.”.

15          (c) TECHNICAL AMENDMENT.—Section 6071(b) of  
16          the Deficit Reduction Act of 2005 (42 U.S.C. 1396a note)  
17          is amended by adding at the end the following:

18           “(10) SECRETARY.—The term ‘Secretary’  
19          means the Secretary of Health and Human Serv-  
20          ices.”.

1 **SEC. 102. EXTENSION OF PROTECTION FOR MEDICAID RE-**  
2 **CIPIENTS OF HOME AND COMMUNITY-BASED**  
3 **SERVICES AGAINST SPOUSAL IMPOVERISH-**  
4 **MENT.**

5 (a) IN GENERAL.—Section 2404 of Public Law 111–  
6 148 (42 U.S.C. 1396r–5 note) is amended by striking “the  
7 5-year period that begins on January 1, 2014,” and in-  
8 serting “the period beginning on January 1, 2014, and  
9 ending on March 31, 2019,”.

10 (b) RULE OF CONSTRUCTION.—

11 (1) PROTECTING STATE SPOUSAL INCOME AND  
12 ASSET DISREGARD FLEXIBILITY UNDER WAIVERS  
13 AND PLAN AMENDMENTS.—Nothing in section 2404  
14 of Public Law 111–148 (42 U.S.C. 1396r–5 note) or  
15 section 1924 of the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C.  
16 1396r–5) shall be construed as prohibiting a State  
17 from disregarding an individual’s spousal income  
18 and assets under a State waiver or plan amendment  
19 described in paragraph (2) for purposes of making  
20 determinations of eligibility for home and commu-  
21 nity-based services or home and community-based  
22 attendant services and supports under such waiver  
23 or plan amendment.

24 (2) STATE WAIVER OR PLAN AMENDMENT DE-  
25 SCRIBED.—A State waiver or plan amendment de-  
26 scribed in this paragraph is any of the following:

1 (A) A waiver or plan amendment to pro-  
2 vide medical assistance for home and commu-  
3 nity-based services under a waiver or plan  
4 amendment under subsection (c), (d), or (i) of  
5 section 1915 of the Social Security Act (42  
6 U.S.C. 1396n) or under section 1115 of such  
7 Act (42 U.S.C. 1315).

8 (B) A plan amendment to provide medical  
9 assistance for home and community-based serv-  
10 ices for individuals by reason of being deter-  
11 mined eligible under section 1902(a)(10)(C) of  
12 such Act (42 U.S.C. 1396a(a)(10)(C)) or by  
13 reason of section 1902(f) of such Act (42  
14 U.S.C. 1396a(f)) or otherwise on the basis of a  
15 reduction of income based on costs incurred for  
16 medical or other remedial care under which the  
17 State disregarded the income and assets of the  
18 individual's spouse in determining the initial  
19 and ongoing financial eligibility of an individual  
20 for such services in place of the spousal improv-  
21 erishment provisions applied under section 1924  
22 of such Act (42 U.S.C. 1396r-5).

23 (C) A plan amendment to provide medical  
24 assistance for home and community-based at-

1           tendant services and supports under section  
2           1915(k) of such Act (42 U.S.C. 1396n(k)).

3 **SEC. 103. REDUCTION IN FMAP AFTER 2020 FOR STATES**  
4 **WITHOUT ASSET VERIFICATION PROGRAM.**

5           Section 1940 of the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C.  
6 1396w) is amended by adding at the end the following  
7 new subsection:

8           “(k) REDUCTION IN FMAP AFTER 2020 FOR NON-  
9 COMPLIANT STATES.—

10           “(1) IN GENERAL.—With respect to a calendar  
11 quarter beginning on or after January 1, 2021, the  
12 Federal medical assistance percentage otherwise de-  
13 termined under section 1905(b) for a non-compliant  
14 State shall be reduced—

15           “(A) for calendar quarters in 2021 and  
16 2022, by 0.12 percentage points;

17           “(B) for calendar quarters in 2023, by  
18 0.25 percentage points;

19           “(C) for calendar quarters in 2024, by  
20 0.35 percentage points; and

21           “(D) for calendar quarters in 2025 and  
22 each year thereafter, by 0.5 percentage points.

23           “(2) NON-COMPLIANT STATE DEFINED.—For  
24 purposes of this subsection, the term ‘non-compliant  
25 State’ means a State—

1           “(A) that is one of the 50 States or the  
2           District of Columbia;

3           “(B) with respect to which the Secretary  
4           has not approved a State plan amendment sub-  
5           mitted under subsection (a)(2); and

6           “(C) that is not operating, on an ongoing  
7           basis, an asset verification program in accord-  
8           ance with this section.”.

9   **SEC. 104. MEDICAID IMPROVEMENT FUND.**

10       Section 1941(b)(1) of the Social Security Act (42  
11 U.S.C. 1396w-1(b)(1)) is amended by striking  
12 “\$31,000,000” and inserting “\$6,000,000”.

13   **SEC. 105. BUDGETARY EFFECTS.**

14       (a) **STATUTORY PAYGO SCORECARDS.**—The budg-  
15 etary effects of this division shall not be entered on either  
16 PAYGO scorecard maintained pursuant to section 4(d) of  
17 the Statutory Pay-As-You-Go Act of 2010 (2 U.S.C.  
18 933(d)).

19       (b) **SENATE PAYGO SCORECARDS.**—The budgetary  
20 effects of this division shall not be entered on any PAYGO  
21 scorecard maintained for purposes of section 4106 of H.  
22 Con. Res. 71 (115th Congress).

23       (c) **CLASSIFICATION OF BUDGETARY EFFECTS.**—  
24 Notwithstanding Rule 3 of the Budget Scorekeeping  
25 Guidelines set forth in the joint explanatory statement of



1 the committee of conference accompanying Conference Re-  
2 port 105–217 and section 250(c)(8) of the Balanced  
3 Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985, the  
4 budgetary effects of this division shall not be estimated—

5 (1) for purposes of section 251 of such Act; and

6 (2) for purposes of paragraph (4)(C) of section  
7 3 of the Statutory Pay-As-You-Go Act of 2010 as  
8 being included in an appropriation Act.

9 (d) PAYGO ANNUAL REPORT.—For the purposes of  
10 the annual report issued pursuant to section 5 of the Stat-  
11 utory Pay-As-You-Go Act of 2010 (2 U.S.C. 934) after  
12 adjournment of the second session of the 115th Congress,  
13 and for determining whether a sequestration order is nec-  
14 essary under such section, the debit for the budget year  
15 on the 5-year scorecard, if any, and the 10-year scorecard,  
16 if any, shall be deducted from such scorecard in 2019 and  
17 added to such scorecard in 2020.

18 **DIVISION C—ADDITIONAL SUP-**  
19 **PLEMENTAL APPROPRIA-**  
20 **TIONS FOR DISASTER RELIEF,**  
21 **2019**

22 The following sums in this division are appropriated,  
23 out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appro-  
24 priated, for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2019,  
25 and for other purposes, namely:

1 TITLE I  
2 DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE  
3 AGRICULTURAL PROGRAMS  
4 PROCESSING, RESEARCH AND MARKETING  
5 OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY

6 For an additional amount for the “Office of the Sec-  
7 retary”, \$1,105,442,000, which shall remain available  
8 until December 31, 2020, for necessary expenses related  
9 to losses of crops (including milk), trees, bushes, and  
10 vines, as a consequence of Hurricanes Michael and Flor-  
11 ence, other hurricanes, typhoons, volcanic activity, and  
12 wildfires occurring in calendar year 2018 under such  
13 terms and conditions as determined by the Secretary: *Pro-*  
14 *vided*, That the Secretary where authorized may provide  
15 assistance for such losses in the form of block grants to  
16 eligible states and territories and such assistance may in-  
17 clude compensation to producers, as determined by the  
18 Secretary, for forest restoration and poultry and livestock  
19 losses: Provided further, That in the case of producers im-  
20 pacted by volcanic activity that resulted in the loss of crop  
21 land, or access to crop land, the Secretary shall consider  
22 all measures available, as appropriate, to bring replace-  
23 ment land into production: *Provided further*, That the total  
24 amount of payments received under this heading and ap-  
25 plicable policies of crop insurance under the Federal Crop

1 Insurance Act (7 U.S.C. 1501 et seq.) or the Noninsured  
2 Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) under section  
3 196 of the Federal Agriculture Improvement and Reform  
4 Act of 1996 (7 U.S.C. 7333) shall not exceed 85 percent  
5 of the loss as determined by the Secretary: *Provided fur-*  
6 *ther*, That the total amount of payments received under  
7 this heading for producers who did not obtain a policy or  
8 plan of insurance for an insurable commodity for the ap-  
9 plicable crop year under the Federal Crop Insurance Act  
10 (7 U.S.C. 1501 et seq.) for the crop incurring the losses  
11 or did not file the required paperwork and pay the service  
12 fee by the applicable State filing deadline for a noninsur-  
13 able commodity for the applicable crop year under NAP  
14 for the crop incurring the losses shall not exceed 65 per-  
15 cent of the loss as determined by the Secretary: *Provided*  
16 *further*, That producers receiving payments under this  
17 heading, as determined by the Secretary, shall be required  
18 to purchase crop insurance where crop insurance is avail-  
19 able for the next two available crop years, excluding tree  
20 insurance policies, and producers receiving payments  
21 under this heading shall be required to purchase coverage  
22 under NAP where crop insurance is not available in the  
23 next two available crop years, as determined by the Sec-  
24 retary: *Provided further*, That, not later than 120 days  
25 after the end of fiscal year 2018, the Secretary shall sub-

1 mit a report to the Congress specifying the type, amount,  
2 and method of such assistance by state and territory: *Pro-*  
3 *vided further*, That such amount is designated by the Con-  
4 gress as being for an emergency requirement pursuant to  
5 section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and  
6 Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

7 FARM SERVICE AGENCY

8 EMERGENCY FOREST RESTORATION PROGRAM

9 For an additional amount for the “Emergency Forest  
10 Restoration Program”, for necessary expenses related to  
11 the consequences of Hurricanes Michael and Florence and  
12 wildfires occurring in calendar year 2018, and other nat-  
13 ural disasters, \$200,000,000, to remain available until ex-  
14 pended: *Provided*, That such amount is designated by the  
15 Congress as being for an emergency requirement pursuant  
16 to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and  
17 Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

18 NATURAL RESOURCES CONSERVATION SERVICE

19 WATERSHED AND FLOOD PREVENTION OPERATIONS

20 For an additional amount for “Watershed and Flood  
21 Prevention Operations”, for necessary expenses for the  
22 Emergency Watershed Protection Program related to the  
23 consequences of Hurricanes Michael and Florence and of  
24 wildfires occurring in calendar year 2018, and other nat-  
25 ural disasters, \$125,000,000, to remain available until ex-

1 pended: *Provided*, That such amount is designated by the  
2 Congress as being for an emergency requirement pursuant  
3 to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and  
4 Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

5 RURAL DEVELOPMENT

6 RURAL COMMUNITY FACILITIES PROGRAM ACCOUNT

7 For an additional amount for “Rural Community Fa-  
8 cilities Program Account”, \$8,000,000, to remain avail-  
9 able until September 30, 2020, for Community Facilities  
10 Technical Assistance and Training Grants pursuant to  
11 section 306(a)(26) of the Consolidated Farm and Rural  
12 Development Act to assist recovering communities in iden-  
13 tifying public and private resources to address identified  
14 community facility needs related to disaster relief, long-  
15 term recovery, and economic revitalization as a con-  
16 sequence of Hurricanes Michael and Florence: *Provided*,  
17 That such amount is designated by the Congress as being  
18 for an emergency requirement pursuant to section  
19 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emergency  
20 Deficit Control Act of 1985.

21 GENERAL PROVISIONS—THIS TITLE

22 SEC. 101. Notwithstanding section 3(r) of the Food  
23 and Nutrition Act of 2008 (7 U.S.C. 2028), not to exceed  
24 \$8,500,000 of funds made available for the contingency  
25 reserve under the heading “Supplemental Nutrition As-

1 sistance Program” of division A of Public Law 115–31  
2 shall be available for the Secretary to provide a grant to  
3 the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands for  
4 disaster nutrition assistance in response to the Presi-  
5 dentially declared major disasters and emergencies: *Pro-*  
6 *vided*, That funds made available to the Commonwealth  
7 of the Northern Mariana Islands under this section shall  
8 remain available for obligation by the Commonwealth until  
9 September 30, 2020, and shall be in addition to funds oth-  
10 erwise made available: *Provided further*, That such amount  
11 is designated by the Congress as being for an emergency  
12 requirement pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the  
13 Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of  
14 1985.

15 SEC. 102. For purposes of administering Title I of  
16 Subdivision 1 of Division B of the Bipartisan Budget Act  
17 of 2018 (Public Law 115–123), losses to agricultural pro-  
18 ducers resulting from hurricanes shall also include losses  
19 incurred from Tropical Storm Cindy and losses of peach  
20 and blueberry crops in calendar year 2017 due to extreme  
21 cold: *Provided*, That the amounts provided by this section  
22 are designated by the Congress as being for an emergency  
23 requirement pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the  
24 Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of  
25 1985: *Provided further*, That amounts repurposed under

1 this heading that were previously designated by the Con-  
2 gress as an emergency requirement pursuant to the Bal-  
3 anced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985  
4 are designated by the Congress as an emergency require-  
5 ment pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced  
6 Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

7 TITLE II

8 DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE

9 ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ADMINISTRATION

10 ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS

11 (INCLUDING TRANSFERS OF FUNDS)

12 Pursuant to section 703 of the Public Works and  
13 Economic Development Act (42 U.S.C. 3233), for an addi-  
14 tional amount for “Economic Development Assistance  
15 Programs” for necessary expenses related to flood mitiga-  
16 tion, disaster relief, long-term recovery, and restoration of  
17 infrastructure in areas that received a major disaster des-  
18 ignation as a result of Hurricanes Florence, Michael and  
19 Lane, Typhoons Yutu and Mangkhut, and of wildfires, vol-  
20 canic eruptions and other natural disasters occurring in  
21 calendar year 2018 under the Robert T. Stafford Disaster  
22 Relief and Emergency Assistance Act (42 U.S.C. 5121 et  
23 seq.), \$300,000,000, to remain available until expended:  
24 *Provided*, That such amount is designated by the Congress  
25 as being for an emergency requirement pursuant to sec-

1 tion 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emer-  
2 gency Deficit Control Act of 1985: *Provided further*, That  
3 within the amount appropriated, up to 2 percent of funds  
4 may be transferred to the “Salaries and Expenses” ac-  
5 count for administration and oversight activities: *Provided*  
6 *further*, That within the amount appropriated, \$1,000,000  
7 shall be transferred to the “Office of Inspector General”  
8 account for carrying out investigations and audits related  
9 to the funding provided under this heading.

10 NATIONAL OCEANIC AND ATMOSPHERIC  
11 ADMINISTRATION  
12 OPERATIONS, RESEARCH, AND FACILITIES

13 For an additional amount for “Operations, Research,  
14 and Facilities” for necessary expenses related to the con-  
15 sequences of Hurricanes Florence and Michael, Typhoon  
16 Yutu, and of wildfires occurring in calendar year 2018,  
17 \$70,570,000, to remain available until September 30,  
18 2020, as follows:

- 19 (1) \$3,000,000 for repair and replacement of  
20 observing assets, real property, and equipment;
- 21 (2) \$11,000,000 for marine debris assessment  
22 and removal;
- 23 (3) \$31,570,000 for mapping, charting, and ge-  
24 odesy services; and



1           (4) \$25,000,000 to improve (a) hurricane inten-  
2           sity forecasting, including through deployment of un-  
3           manned ocean observing platforms and enhanced  
4           data assimilation; (b) flood prediction, forecasting,  
5           and mitigation capabilities; and (c) wildfire pre-  
6           diction, detection, and forecasting:

7   *Provided*, That such amount is designated by the Congress  
8   as being for an emergency requirement pursuant to sec-  
9   tion 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emer-  
10   gency Deficit Control Act of 1985: *Provided further*, That  
11   the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration  
12   shall submit a spending plan to the Committees on Appro-  
13   priations of the House of Representatives and the Senate  
14   for funding provided under subsection (4) of this heading  
15   within 45 days after the date of enactment of this Act.

16       PROCUREMENT, ACQUISITION AND CONSTRUCTION

17       For an additional amount for “Procurement, Acquisi-  
18   tion and Construction”, \$25,000,000, to remain available  
19   until September 30, 2021, for improvements to oper-  
20   ational and research weather supercomputing infrastruc-  
21   ture and satellite ground services used for hurricane inten-  
22   sity and track prediction; flood prediction, forecasting, and  
23   mitigation; and wildfire prediction, detection, and fore-  
24   casting: *Provided*, That such amount is designated by the  
25   Congress as being for an emergency requirement pursuant

1 to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and  
2 Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985: *Provided further*,  
3 That the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administra-  
4 tion shall submit a spending plan to the Committees on  
5 Appropriations of the House of Representatives and the  
6 Senate within 45 days after the date of enactment of this  
7 Act.

8 FISHERY DISASTER ASSISTANCE

9 For an additional amount for “Fishery Disaster As-  
10 sistance” for necessary expenses associated with the miti-  
11 gation of fishery disasters, \$82,000,000, to remain avail-  
12 able until expended: *Provided*, That funds shall be used  
13 for mitigating the effects of commercial fishery failures  
14 and fishery resource disasters declared by the Secretary  
15 of Commerce, as well as those declared by the Secretary  
16 to be a direct result of Hurricanes Florence and Michael  
17 and Typhoons Yutu and Mangkhut: *Provided further*,  
18 That such amount is designated by the Congress as being  
19 for an emergency requirement pursuant to section  
20 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emergency  
21 Deficit Control Act of 1985.

## 3 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

4 For an additional amount for “Salaries and Ex-  
5 penses” for necessary expenses related to the con-  
6 sequences of Hurricanes Florence and Michael, and Ty-  
7 phoon Yutu, \$1,336,000: Provided, That such amount is  
8 designated by the Congress as being for an emergency re-  
9 quirement pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Bal-  
10 anced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

## 11 FEDERAL PRISON SYSTEM

## 12 BUILDINGS AND FACILITIES

13 For an additional amount for “Buildings and Facili-  
14 ties” for necessary expenses related to the consequences  
15 of Hurricanes Florence and Michael and Typhoon Yutu,  
16 \$28,400,000, to remain available until expended: *Pro-*  
17 *vided*, That such amount is designated by the Congress  
18 as being for an emergency requirement pursuant to sec-  
19 tion 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emer-  
20 gency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

## 22 LEGAL SERVICES CORPORATION

12 consequences of Hurricanes Florence and Michael, Ty-  
13 phoons Mangkhut and Yutu, and wildfires or earthquakes  
14 occurring in 2018 in those areas for which a major dis-  
15 aster or emergency has been declared under sections 401  
16 or 501 of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and  
17 Emergency Assistance Act (42 U.S.C. 5170 and 5190)  
18 (referred to under this heading as “covered disaster or  
19 emergency”), for assisting in meeting the educational

15 ment Fund”, \$1,060,000,000, to remain available until  
16 expended, for necessary expenses for activities authorized  
17 under title I of the Housing and Community Development  
18 Act of 1974 (42 U.S.C. 5301 et seq.) related to disaster  
19 relief, long-term recovery, restoration of infrastructure  
20 and housing, economic revitalization, and mitigation in the  
21 most impacted and distressed areas resulting from a  
22 major disaster that occurred in 2018 pursuant to the Rob-  
23 ert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance  
24 Act (42 U.S.C. 5121 et seq.): *Provided*, That funds shall

1 ernment, or Indian tribe (as such term is defined in sec-  
2 tion 102 of the Housing and Community Development Act  
3 of 1974) at the discretion of the Secretary: *Provided fur-*  
4 *ther*, That any funds made available under this heading  
5 and under the same heading in Public Law 115–254 that  
6 remain available after the funds under such headings have  
7 been allocated for necessary expenses for activities author-  
8 ized under such headings shall be allocated to grantees  
9 that received allocations for disasters that occurred in  
10 2018 for mitigation activities in the most impacted and  
11 distressed areas resulting from a major disaster that oc-  
12 curred in 2018: *Provided further*, That such allocations  
13 shall be made in the same proportion that the amount of  
14 funds each grantee received under this division and the

8 government” and inserting “State, unit of general local  
9 government, or Indian tribe (as such term is defined in  
10 section 102 of the Housing and Community Development  
11 Act of 1974 (42 U.S.C. 5302))”: *Provided further*, That  
12 the sixth proviso under this heading in the Supplemental  
13 Appropriations for Disaster Relief Requirements Act,  
14 2018 (division I of Public Law 115–254) is amended by  
15 striking “State or subdivision thereof” and inserting  
16 “State, unit of general local government, or Indian tribe  
17 (as such term is defined in section 102 of the Housing  
18 and Community Development Act of 1974 (42 U.S.C.  
19 5302))”: *Provided further*, That in administering the  
20 funds under this heading, the Secretary of Housing and  
21 Urban Development may waive, or specify alternative re-  
22 quirements for, any provision of any statute or regulation  
23 that the Secretary administers in connection with the obli-  
24 gation by the Secretary or the use by the recipient of these  
25 funds (except for requirements related to fair housing,

1 nondiscrimination, labor standards, and the environment),  
2 if the Secretary finds that good cause exists for the waiver  
3 or alternative requirement and such waiver or alternative  
4 requirement would not be inconsistent with the overall

7 the preceding proviso, recipients of funds provided under

13 their subrecipients) that receive allocations pursuant to  
14 this heading, received disaster recovery allocations under

24 and mitigation in the most impacted and distressed areas  
25 resulting from a major disaster, including funds provided

1 under section 145 of division C of Public Law 114–223,  
2 section 192 of division C of Public Law 114–223 (as  
3 added by section 101(3) of division A of Public Law 114–  
4 254), section 421 of division K of Public Law 115–31,  
5 and any mitigation funding provided under the heading  
6 “Department of Housing and Urban Development–Com-  
7 munity Planning and Development–Community Develop-  
8 ment Fund” of Public Law 115–123 that were allocated  
9 in response to Hurricane Matthew may be used inter-  
10 changeably and without limitation for the same activities  
11 in the most impacted and distressed areas related to Hur-  
12 ricane Florence. In addition, any funds provided under the  
13 heading “Department of Housing and Urban Develop-  
14 ment—Community Planning and Development—Commu-  
15 nity Development Fund” in this Act or in division I of  
16 Public Law 115–254 that are allocated in response to  
17 Hurricane Florence may be used interchangeably and  
18 without limitation for the same activities in the most im-  
19 pacted and distressed areas related to Hurricane Matthew.  
20 Until HUD publishes the Federal Register Notice imple-  
21 menting this provision, grantees may submit for HUD ap-  
22 proval revised plans for the use of funds related to Hurri-  
23 cane Matthew that expand the eligible beneficiaries of ex-  
24 isting programs contained in such previously approved  
25 plans to include those impacted by Hurricane Florence.



1 Approval of any such revised plans shall include the execu-  
2 tion of revised grant terms and conditions as necessary.

3 (b) Amounts made available for administrative costs  
4 for activities authorized under title I of the Housing and  
5 Community Development Act of 1974 (42 U.S.C. 5301 et  
6 seq.) related to disaster relief, long-term recovery, restora-  
7 tion of infrastructure and housing, economic revitalization,  
8 and mitigation in the most impacted and distressed areas  
9 under this title or any future Act, and amounts previously  
10 provided under section 420 of division L of Public Law  
11 114–113, section 145 of division C of Public Law 114–  
12 223, section 192 of division C of Public Law 114–223 (as  
13 added by section 101(3) of division A of Public Law 114–  
14 254), section 421 of division K of Public Law 115–31,  
15 and under the heading “Department of Housing and  
16 Urban Development—Community Planning and Develop-  
17 ment—Community Development Fund” of division B of  
18 Public Law 115–56, Public Law 115–123, and Public  
19 Law 115–254, shall be available for eligible administrative  
20 costs of the grantee related to any disaster relief funding  
21 identified in this subsection without regard to the par-  
22 ticular disaster appropriation from which such funds origi-  
23 nated.

24 (c) Amounts repurposed pursuant to this section that  
25 were previously designated by the Congress as an emer-

1 gency requirement or as being for disaster relief pursuant  
2 to the Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control  
3 Act are designated by the Congress, respectively, as an  
4 emergency requirement pursuant to section  
5 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emergency  
6 Deficit Control Act of 1985 or as being for disaster relief  
7 pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(D) of the Balanced Budget  
8 and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

9 TITLE XI

10 GENERAL PROVISIONS—THIS DIVISION

11 SEC. 1101. Each amount appropriated or made avail-  
12 able by this division is in addition to amounts otherwise  
13 appropriated for the fiscal year involved.

14 SEC. 1102. No part of any appropriation contained  
15 in this division shall remain available for obligation beyond  
16 the current fiscal year unless expressly so provided herein.

17 SEC. 1103. Unless otherwise provided for by this divi-  
18 sion, the additional amounts appropriated by this division  
19 to appropriations accounts shall be available under the au-  
20 thorities and conditions applicable to such appropriations  
21 accounts for fiscal year 2019.

22 SEC. 1104. Each amount designated in this division  
23 by the Congress as being for an emergency requirement  
24 pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budg-  
25 et and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985 shall be

1 available (or rescinded or transferred, if applicable) only  
2 if the President subsequently so designates all such  
3 amounts and transmits such designations to the Congress.

4       SEC. 1105. For purposes of this division, the con-  
5 sequences or impacts of any hurricane shall include dam-  
6 ages caused by the storm at any time during the entirety  
7 of its duration as a cyclone, as defined by the National  
8 Hurricane Center.

9       SEC. 1106. Any amount appropriated by this division,  
10 designated by the Congress as an emergency requirement  
11 pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budg-  
12 et and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985 and subse-  
13 quently so designated by the President, and transferred  
14 pursuant to transfer authorities provided by this division  
15 shall retain such designation.

16       This division may be cited as the “Additional Supple-  
17 mental Appropriations for Disaster Relief, 2019”.
