Self-Reported Health Information from the Airborne Hazards and Open Burn Pit Registry

As of July 1, 2019

The following summary includes self-reported information from 176,935 Veterans and active duty service members in the registry between June 2014 to July 1, 2019 (up from 164,295 as of December 31, 2018). This summary also provides a brief description of the demographic and military service characteristics of registry participants.

The data in this report is descriptive and does not necessarily mean that exposure caused a specific disease.

1. Burn Pit Registry Facts:

- 165,755 (93.7%) reported a burn pit exposure during deployment. The number has increased from 157,107 (93.6%) as reported from December 31, 2018.
- 100,806 (59.8%) reported duties involving burn pits. The number has increased from 100,352 (59.9%) as reported from the December 31, 2018.
- 96,397, (54.5%) are interested in seeing a health care provider. The number has increased from 90,211 (53.7%) as reported through December 31, 2018.
- 123,355 (69.7%) were close enough to feel the blast of an improvised explosive device (IED). The number has increased from 114,954 (70.4%) as reported through December 31, 2018.
- 67,908 (38.4%) reported ever smoking. The number has increased from 63,378 (38.6%) as reported through December 31, 2018.
- 18,551 (10.5%) were currently smoking at the time they completed the survey. About half were daily smokers.
- 15,240 (8.6%) are Gulf War 1 Veterans. The number has increased from 14,048 (8.5%) as reported through December 31, 2018.
- 59,879 (33.8%) saw a health care provider during their deployment for respiratory symptoms due to air quality. The number has increased from 55,801 (33.9%) as reported through December 31, 2018.
- About 114,020 (64.4%) of those in the registry are Veterans (retired or separated from service.) The number has increased from 106,000 (64.5%) as reported through December 31, 2018.
- About 61,639 (34.8%) of those in the registry are currently in the service (active duty, Reserve or National Guard). The number has increased from 59,000 (35.9%) as reported through December 31, 2018.

1. AHOBPR Participants by Per Year and Cumulative per year


