### What We Do

Purchase and deliver processed commodities under domestic distribution programs such as the National School Lunch, Commodity Supplemental Food, Food Distribution on Indian Reservations, and Disaster Assistance Programs.

Purchase and deliver commodities to foreign countries under Titles II and III of Public Law 480, Food for Progress and Section 416(b) of the Agricultural Act of 1949 and, McGovern-Dole Food for Education Act, through private voluntary organizations, World Food Program, and government-togovernment transfers.

*Purchase* from vendors or processors Milk Price Support program commodities such as butter, cheese, and nonfat dry milk from vendors or processors.

Acquire and dispose of commodities pledged as collateral for marketing assistance loans such as wheat, corn, soybeans, oilseeds, cotton, peanuts, and other commodities.

*Establish* Posted County Prices for locations throughout the U.S. to develop loan rates, loan deficiency payments, and market assistance loan repayments.

*Market, manage, and regularly analyze the location, condition and quantity* of CCC inventories such as cotton, grain, oilseeds, peanuts, nonfat dry milk, and rice.

Administer the CCC Storage Agreements for Grain and Rice, Cotton, Processed Commodities, Sugar, and Peanuts.

Administer the U.S. Warehouse Act and perform warehouse examinations and audits in support of USWA and CCC programs.

Prepare claims and adjudicate debts by and against CCC resulting from export and domestic transportation and warehouse losses.
