## SAMHSA Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorders Center for Excellence Fetal Alcohol Syndrome Legislation by State Introduced in 2003-2004

(As of April 2004)

In 2003-2004 the following States either introduced or passed legislation related to fetal alcohol spectrum disorders (FASD): Arizona, Colorado, Illinois, Indiana, Louisiana, Maryland, Minnesota, Nevada, New Jersey, North Carolina, Virginia. Of those 11 States, Maryland and Nevada introduced more than one FASD-related bill. The bills fall into three categories:

- 1. **General FASD Information,** including definitions, birth registries, and parental consent for FASD testing (6 States)
- 2. **Prevention and Intervention Services,** including research and public information and awareness (6 States)
- 3. **Training and Licensing,** including teacher certification and physician licensing (2 States)

Table 1.1 provides nationwide legislation pertaining to FASD either introduced or passed within the 2003-2004 legislative session. Language of the legislation appears verbatim and has not been edited.
