We have several new courses opening for enrollment—among these are: 1381, *Math for Marines* (CD version), 1382, *Math for Marines* (Web version), 571A, *NBC*, and 0054, *Hazardous Waste/Hazardous Materials*. Please check our Web site for enrollment instructions. In addition to those listed above, several new courses will be opening for enrollment in the upcoming months.

Within the next month, users will be able to print the certificates/diplomas from the Web site as they do now and save the document to their hard drive or have it emailed directly to them. In addition, MCI will be upgrading and replacing some Web and database servers that will speed up all processes over the next quarter. Finally, we are in the process of greatly improving the speed of UVR reporting by transferring UVR reports to their own data warehouse servers. In simple terms, this means that UVR reporting will have its very own hardware, which should greatly improve the speed and quality of UVR reports.

We hope that these upcoming improvements will help all our users and we look forward to further enhancements in the future.

#### Marine in the Spotlight

After more than 39 years of Federal service, Mr. David Garnett will retire on 29 October 2004. Mr. Garnett spent the last 23 of those years with MCI working in many different areas. When he joined MCI in January 1981, he was the Professional Military Education (PME) coordinator. While working as the PME coordinator, Mr. Garnett worked with Colonel Christie, Lieutenant Colonel Scott Aiken, and Mr. Steve Jones on General Holcomb's initial roadmap for distance learning, which became the prototype for all future refinements. Dave also introduced Information Mapping as a new method of thinking and writing distance learning course material. MCI now uses Information Mapping in all our products for the distance learning student.

Mr. Garnett moved on to assume the duties of Director for PME and MOS (red books) products. This department became the Distance Learning and Technologies Department (DLTD). He then assumed the position of Director, Student Services and Support Department (SSSD), which included overseeing both Student Services and the Logistics Division within MCI. Soon thereafter, the Division incorporated new procedures and equipment for "getting books out the door."

Dave has seen many changes over his 20 plus years at MCI. When asked what he values the most during his time at MCI, he responded that "I hope I made a major contribution to defining the distinction between education and training, which was virtually nonexistent in 1980." He also was instrumental in employing critical thinking into MCI education and training programs. One of the best things he was able to be a part of was online enrollment, processing, and record keeping.
