Chief's Initiation Season Under Way

Welcome aboard 1998 Chief Petty Officer Selectees! I salute each of you on achieving this life-changing position in your career.

As you have learned at this point in the initiation process, the journey is just beginning. Becoming a chief, is about more than just donning khakis and pinning anchors to your collar. It is really all about setting and being the example, leading and taking care of Sailors and about accepting the tremendous responsibility others place in you to accomplish the mission.

I charge **all** CPOs with making this initiation season truly value-laden. That must begin with 100% participation by all CPOs in the mess. There is more than enough work to go around, and good messes simply do not tolerate bystanders in this process.

My office continues to receive calls on whether I was changing any guid-

ance on chief's initiation. I'd like to reiterate what I put out in the May issue of *Direct Line*. "MAINTAIN COURSE, INCREASE SPEED!"

There have been volumes very carefully written to effectively guide this time-honored process so as not to destroy our rich heritage nor the creativity and innovation messes use to bring new CPOs into the fold. The major focus should and will be placed on the weeks between the selection announcement and advancement ceremony. There is simply no substitute for well thought out training and team building during this period. It is this time frame that determines just how well the new CPO will become a functioning member of the mess. It is everything that happens prior to the 16th that gives meaning to the time honored traditions of the 16th.

The initiation itself on the 16^{th} of September is merely a great day to get together to welcome our newest mess members into the mess by sharing some good-natured fun and camaraderie. There is nothing in any of the guidelines signaling that anything less would be more appropriate.

During initiation season, we are preserving tradition and

ensuring the future of our Navy by teaching our newest chiefs about our heritage, our values and leadership. The Naval Heritage Reading Assignment that each new CPO **must** complete is and will remain an integral part of initiation. I do not want selectees to merely give book reports given on these great books. The idea is for each selectee to read a selection (no desire for the entire group of selectees to read the same selection) taking note during the reading of instances where our core values either were or were not demonstrated in the past.

The command master chief will then lead a discussion of our core values and each of their elements during which the selectees will illustrate their discussion with the instances they noted during their reading. The discussion guide and a student guide for this discussion can be found in the March 1997 *Direct Line* or on the internet at http://www.chinfo.navy.mil/navpalib/mcpon/readgide.html.

This meaningful exercise can be made even better if the CO is invited to attend and participate. My recommenda-

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tion is to hold it near the end of the training process.

We must have full participation of the entire CPO mess. Every member of the mess has a role to play in initiation. We set the example of teamwork to our selectees by working together, not only throughout initiation season, but always.

Make charge book entries that are truly meaningful. I will send charge book entries to chief selectees who request them (see page 6). Deadlines for requests is Sept. 1.

Your participation in the group PT is essential. While PT three times per week is the requirement each of us should be accomplishing every week, doing it with the selectees sends a powerful teamwork and leadership example. PT is not just the way to a better life, it is the most visible, palpable example of leadership you can send. It is the "follow me, do as I do" style we all admire!

Sponsors are the keys to the understanding the selectees must gain to become functioning members of the mess. An initiation without the wisdom and guidance given by a good sponsor will ensure less than optimum value and knowledge is gained by our new CPOs.

Each year it is often the CPOs selected the previous year that have the greatest desire to be a sponsor. All of the previous guidance cautions against appointing them as a sponsor this first year in the mess, and I endorse that. All sponsors should have at least one initiation season under their belts after their own initiation to fully understand the whole process and to gain the wisdom and knowledge to ensure their success as a sponsor.

I want to stress that sponsors are not only there to get the selectee through initiation, but to be their mentor and much more. You are there to promote a better understanding of the goals and purpose of CPO initiation. This relationship should be a very active process throughout the new CPO's first year in the mess. Your coaching, counsel and personal example will make the difference.

Many chiefs have asked if I have any don'ts for initiation season. There are several "don'ts" in previous guidelines and all must be followed. With regard to food, my response is, "Nothing in the mouth and nothing down the gullet.

The only additional prohibition I have is that there is to be **no** initiation anywhere prior to the 16th of September without the knowledge of your CNO-directed Command Master Chief, Force Master Chief or Fleet Master Chief, who will contact me prior to granting approval. I just see no overriding reason for any initiation prior to the 16th, which this year falls on a Wednesday. Most reasons are convenience reasons and not necessities. Permission is granted to hold initiations on or anytime after the 16th. If you should need any further guidance, contact your CNO-directed Command Master Chief, Force Master Chief or Fleet Master Chief. Use your chain of command and keep them informed at all times.

I am often asked about members of the other services participating in CPO initiation. I wholeheartedly endorse this initiative as long as some very basic qualifications are met. First the individual must be on active duty in the pay grade of E-7, E-8 or E-9. Next, the individual must be an integral part of the command or have a working relationship with the CPO mess that is integral to its operation. And finally, the individual must participate the entire period of initiation from the time of selection announcement through the pinning ceremony and successfully complete all evolutions the CPO selectees are expected to complete.

While I am happy to welcome members of other services who meet these qualifications into the mess, I do not desire to bestow this honor on those who just have a desire to be an initiate CPO nor those who cannot complete the entire process. All other service participants must be approved by your CNO-directed Command Master Chief, Force Master Chief or Fleet Master Chief.

CPO initiation is not just the first step to becoming a chief. It is a truly valuable, worthwhile part of our culture and Navy heritage. Those of us who wear the anchors know its importance in the workings of the mess. It is up to each of us to make it not only a memorable event for our newest CPOs but also a truly value-laden evolution.

Congratulations again and have a great initiation season.

PRT, pride, teamwork and initiation season

Over the past several years, CPO selectee group PT has proven to very effective in building camaraderie and esprit de corps, promoting teamwork and improving fitness levels. A solid PT program is not only a good idea but a critical element of a successful initiation season.

Here are some suggestions in planning a PT program for the initiation season:

-- Don't make it optional. Participation in group PT should a requirement. Since a minimum of three PT sessions is mandated to all hands, this should not come as a surprise.

- -- Encourage all chiefs to PT with selectees.
- --Designate several fit chiefs to lead PT and require them to develop plan to include various levels of fitness.
- -- Charge the selectees with designing and procuring appropriate CPO Pride PT gear.
- -- Have the selectees design and carry a CPO Pride Guide On flag.
- -- Invite guests occasionally, the CO or XO for example, to PT with selectees.

"People are, and must continue to be, our number one priority," Secretary Dalton said. "Without the four leaders standing before you, and many other top-notch Sailors who competed for this honor, the Navy would cease to be a viable fighting force."

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Building a master chief

Hone your leadership skills at SEA

The next board for the Senior Enlisted Academy is set for November, and I encourage all master chief petty officers and hot-running senior chiefs to put in a package.

The academy provides excellent training on leadership skills. I stress on all my trips in the Fleet, that building a Sailor never ends -- this includes senior chiefs, master chiefs and even myself as the Master Chief Petty Officer of the Navy. SEA is a not just an opportunity to become a better Sailor, but a better leader.

The November board will fill seats in the Spring and Summer SEA classes. Packages for the board are due to PERS-4 no later than Oct. 1, 1998.

Eligibility Requirements*

- -Be a senior or master chief
- -Recommended by the CO
- -Must meet body fat standards
- -Must be physically capable to PT
- -Obligated service of 24 months

Application Procedures*

Qualified personnel should submit their application via

the chain of command to BUPERS (PERS 4010C) using a NAVPERS 1306/7.

History of the Senior Enlisted Academy

Opening ceremonies held on Sept. 14, 1981 marked the beginning of an educational program which is unique among the Navy's many training schools and programs. On that day, the Navy's Senior Enlisted Academy opened its doors to its first class.

The pilot class, consisting of 16 students, would receive and validate the nine-week curriculum containing a diverse mix of subjects such as communication skills, national security affairs, Navy programs, and physical readiness training.

Because of the SEA's success in preparing senior enlisted leaders for positions of greater responsibilities, graduation is now a requirement before assuming positions of command master chief or chief of the boat.

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Parting Thoughts

Show a Leg

Many of our Navy's colorful expressions originated as a practical means of communicating vital information. One such expression is show a leg. In the British Navy of King George III and earlier, many sailors' wives accompanied them on long voyages. This practice caused a multitude of problems but some ingenious bosun solved one that tended to make reveille a hazardous event - that of distinguishing which bunks held males and which held females. To avoid dragging the wrong mates out of the rack, the bosun asked all to show a leg. If the legged was hairy and tattooed, the owner was forced to turn-to. In today's Navy, showing a leg is a signal to the reveille petty officer that you have heard his call and are awake.
