

I&E COMMITTEE MEETING HIGHLIGHTS MARCH 27, 2002



Inspector General Johnnie Frazier, Chair of the Inspection and Evaluation Committee, welcomed new Committee members from the Departments of State, Health and Human Services, and Justice, as well as from the Farm Credit Administration, and thanked returning members (Labor, VA, FEMA, and NSF) for their continuing commitment. He gave special thanks to George Grob, Chair of the I&E Roundtable, for the Roundtable's outstanding contributions to the work of the Committee over the years.

Committee members discussed ways to promote information sharing among the IG community on crosscutting issues such as emergency preparedness, bioterrorism, grant management, procurement, deemed exports, best I&E practices, and other areas of mutual interest.

COMMITTEE PROJECTS

Before hearing reports on current and proposed projects, Johnnie welcomed suggestions from Committee members for future work and encouraged them to be alert to ideas for possible areas of focus from other PCIE members.

Committee members agreed that each I&E project should have a specific lead, and will decide who among them will head up outreach activity, web site redesign, and other pending and proposed activities.

Project Updates

Travel Cards. The I&E Roundtable is preparing a "best practices" report to aid IG oversight of the federal travel card program. The report, which is based on OIG travel card work to date, is being prepared under Gordon Heddell's (Labor) leadership.

Child Support Enforcement. The I&E Committee examined compliance with child support laws among employees at the FBI and HHS. The Justice OIG completed and issued a report on its findings regarding enforcement activities at the FBI. The HHS OIG issued the report regarding activities within that agency.

Training. Roundtable Chair George Grob reported on upcoming training sessions for inspectors and evaluators at the IG Auditor Training Institute. Sessions on effective writing and evaluation techniques and analysis have been scheduled for select weeks in May through September. Committee members gave some consideration to the idea of reviving the former PCIE Professional Development Committee.

In recent months more than 120 OIG staff members from various agencies took advantage of training sponsored by the Committee and Roundtable in such areas as effective writing, statistics, questionnaire design, and evaluation skills and Visit analysis. http://www.igati.org/ for more information.

Purchase Card Guide A Practical Guide to Reviewing Government Purchase Card Programs. Johnnie reported that the draft guide is complete and has been circulated to Committee members for final review and comment. He gave special thanks to Lorraine Lewis and her staff at the Department of Education OIG for taking the lead in developing this project. He hopes to have the guide published and ready for distribution to the entire IG community shortly.

This timely reference has been a high priority for the I&E Committee because of its focus on so critical an area for IG review. Purchase card expenditures represent a huge and ever-growing area of federal spending. Governmentwide, purchase cardholders spent \$13.7 billion in FY 2001—a 12 percent increase over the previous year. The guide's practical features (questionnaires, templates, sample reports) promise to enhance the review process.

Johnnie commented that he views the guide as an indispensable tool for enabling IGs to more effectively target their efforts for preventing as well as detecting waste, fraud, and abuse.

Internal IG Reviews. Johnnie reminded Committee members that as a first step in this effort, they should assess purchase and travel card programs within their own offices before turning their eyes agencywide.

Congressional and Media Atten-

tion. The guide's arrival is well timed, as scrutiny of the purchase card program is intensifying. Past abuses of the program have received widespread attention in the media and sparked congressional interest. The Oversight and Investigations Subcommittee of the House Energy and Commerce Committee plans to hold hearings on the purchase card program this spring, and has expressed interest in reviewing both the guide and the results of related OIG and other evaluations. The House Government Reform Subcommittee on Government Efficiency, Financial Management and Intergovernmental Relations recently held hearings on the program.

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
