Biographical Sketches of Plenary Speakers



Roderick Paige, U.S. Secretary of Education

On January 21, 2001, the United States Senate confirmed Dr. Rod Paige as the 7th U.S. Secretary of Education.

For Paige, the son of public school educators, that day was the crowning achievement of a long career in education and a life of determination and hard work that began in segregated Monticello, Mississippi. His resume speaks of his persistence in the journey. He earned a bachelor's degree from Jackson State University in Mississippi and earned both masters and doctorate degrees from the Indiana University. In the years since, he's been a teacher, a coach, a school board member, a dean of a

college school of education, and superintendent of the nation's 7th largest school district in Houston, Texas.

Paige is the first school superintendent ever to serve as Secretary of Education. And his vast experience as a practitioner—from the blackboard to the board room—paid off during long hours of work to pass President Bush's number one domestic priority—the *No Child Left Behind Act* of 2001.

Now he is leading the charge—in partnership with the states—to implement these historic reforms that give local districts the tools and the resources to help every child learn, regardless of the color of their skin or the accent of their speech. And the first year since *No Child Left Behind* became the law of the land has seen good progress.

States have moved forward, working to improve student achievement, empowering parents with options and information, providing supplemental services to students in danger of being left behind, and tapping new sources for talented teachers to lead in our nation's classrooms.

In January, the Department celebrated a major victory for accountability when all states—for the first time in the history of the American public school system—submitted plans outlining how they will ensure that all their schools are places of high expectations and high standards. Five states have completed the peer review process and the rest are underway. Paige is the first school superintendent ever to serve as Secretary of Education. And his vast experience as a practitioner—from the blackboard to the board room—paid off during long hours of work to pass President Bush's number one domestic priority—the *No Child Left Behind* Act of 2001.

As Secretary, Paige has held the Department to the same high standards expected of our schools. Prior to his taking office, investigators uncovered wide-scale criminal fraud, abuse, and waste within the Department that was featured on NBC News' The Fleecing of America.

Paige rallied the Department to create a Blueprint for Management Excellence to build an organization worthy of the taxpayers' trust and the President's vision—a vision that says good government is one that is not only closer to the people, but also more accountable to the people. The department-wide implementation of the blueprint streamlined operations, provided strategic direction, and put a halt to corrupt practices that were sapping resources and focus from the Department's central mission: improving America's schools.

As a result, the Department received a clean financial audit for the first time in many years and only the second time in the history of the Department. The Department's cleanup also received the highest kudos from the federal Office of Management and Budget. And those responsible for criminal wrongdoing are being held accountable in the courts.

The driving force behind Paige's work as Secretary is his shared belief with President Bush that education is a civil right, just like the right to vote or to be treated equally. Paige believes it is wrong to fight discrimination with discrimination. For that reason, he strongly supports the President's vision of affirmative access that promotes diversity in our nation's colleges and universities through race-neutral alternatives.



Consuelo Castillo Kickbusch

Born and raised in a tiny barrio in Laredo, Texas where she overcame the fierce challenges of poverty, discrimination and illiteracy, Consuelo Castillo Kickbusch grew to become a successful leadership role model for her community. Breaking barriers and setting records in the military, Lieutenant Colonel (Retired) Consuelo Kickbusch rose to senior officer position and became the highest-ranking Hispanic woman in the Combat Support Field of the United States Army. Acknowledged as a charismatic, passionate and entertaining speaker, Consuelo Kickbusch, carries her powerful message of what it takes to be an effective leader in today's global

marketplace to hundreds of colleges/universities, corporations and government institutions, both here in the U.S. and abroad.

During her distinguished military career, Consuelo Kickbusch held a variety of demanding and critical leadership positions ranging from Executive Officer for Information Systems Command to Technical Advisor to the Joint Command and Control Warfare Center to Company Commander of an all-male platoon. Along the way, she has earned numerous illustrious decorations including the Legion of Merit, the National Defense Service Medal, Meritorious Service Medal (four times), the Army Achievement Medal (twice) and the National Image's Uniformed Services Award for significant contributions in the areas of civil/human rights, race relations, equal opportunity, human resources, and public service.

In 1996 LTC (Ret.) Consuelo Kickbusch was selected out of 26,000 candidates to assume a command post, which would put her on track for General Officer rank. Consuelo Kickbusch respectfully declined the honor, retired as a twenty-year veteran and founded Educational Achievement Services Inc. (EAS) to realize her personal dream and mission of preparing tomorrow's leaders today. Through EAS, she shares her years of leadership experience, success techniques and motivational messages to empower people of all ages in all environments (schools, corporations, government and non-profits).

She inspires these young "diamonds in the rough" by encouraging them to believe that "we can all make our dreams come true, to not give up hope, but rather to take charge of your lives, make a real difference in your families/communities and follow a disciplined road map to success".

Consuelo Kickbusch's results-oriented seminars/workshops use real life case studies, successful leadership behaviors and guiding principals and role-playing situations, to provide a dynamic and interactive learning environment. As a result, participants develop leadership skills, the ability to become change agents and achieve optimum performance. She also helps them to examine the role and value-added that our diverse cultures and backgrounds bring to leadership development.

Because of her strong dedication to saving the youth of America living in the same barrios she did as a child, Consuelo Kickbusch has worked with over one million children, their parents and educators, in the roughest neighborhoods in America, covering 43 states. She inspires these young "diamonds in the rough" by encouraging them to believe that "we can all make our dreams come true, to not give up hope, but rather to take charge of your lives, make a real difference in your families/communities and follow a disciplined road map to success". To assist them, she produced a well-received video entitled, "Porque No—Why Not?"

The formation of an historic collaboration, Partners in Hispanic Education, was announced on July 9, 2003 in Washington, D.C. The goal of the Partners in Hispanic Education is to empower the Hispanic community by equipping families with educational tools and informational resources afforded under the *No Child Left Behind* (NCLB) Act. Our aim is to assist communities in becoming stronger advocates for their children's education—from early childhood to college completion. The partners will work in a bipartisan way with local communities to reinforce the notion that more Hispanic students must receive a college education. Together with local communities, the Partners in Hispanic Education will host education fairs and other activities that will provide information about: promoting educational excellence in their schools and communities; improving students' academic achievement; increasing degree attainment; and improving parental involvement and awareness about what it takes to send their students to college. After-school and mentorship programs, successful strategies to engage the business community in local education efforts, and the role of parents and CBO leaders in helping to increase Hispanic student enrollment in college will also be covered.

To accomplish these goals, partnership participants have committed to host community education programs in seven pilot cities over the next several months. Each program will include town hall meetings; educational workshops for parents, students, educators, business and community leaders; and seminars on the student financial aid process and scholarship programs.

The National Council for Community and Education Partnerships

The mission of the National Council for Community and Education Partnerships (NCCEP) is to develop and strengthen broad-based partnerships throughout the education continuum, from early childhood through postsecondary education. By creating education/community partnerships, linking schools and communities, developing new initiatives, supporting proven programs, and using research findings to create successful frameworksfor action, NCCEP aims to invigorate the principal of equal educational opportunity for all, and in the process, to help improve K–16 education.

Youth Entrepreneurship BIZFEST

BizFest: A fun, practical, and innovative "business training camp" where Latino youth, ages 17-25, learn the fundamentals of entrepreneurship and success. The BizFest teaches students a variety of business techniques and focuses on: turning hobbies and skills into profit-making ventures; establishing entrepreneurial and leadership goals; creating plans for business and life; becoming effective leaders and team players; networking in business environments; identifying investment opportunities; implementing money management; and making public presentations.

At the BizFest, students participate in a business plan competition where they write and present a business plan. Winners receive financial awards and access to future entrepreneurship partnering opportunities with business and corporate partners of the USHCC Foundation.

An integral component of the BizFest curriculum is the "Foundation for Success", a dynamic selfesteem building process that engages young people in the learning of strategic selling concepts as well as the process of assessing their own personal inventories. This personal inventory assessment speaks to the following tenets: attitude; discipline; sense of urgency; level of commitment and education/knowledge, all elements of being successful in life and business.
