Of the 59,897 cases, 307 had an upward departure. Departure reasons were available in 299 of these cases which cited 321 reasons for upward departure. Courts often provided multiple reasons for departure; consequently, the total number of upward departure reasons may exceed the number of cases with an upward departure. The "Other" category includes all reasons provided fewer than two times among relevant cases
