## **Grants for Providing Technical Assistance in the Renovation or Construction of Child Care Facilities**

The focus of the technical assistance is on the renovation or construction of child care facilities and on assisting child care providers in securing private sources for capital financing of child care facilities. It is expected that these grants will lead to an increase in the availability and quality of child care facilities by:

- Establishing new quality child care facilities in low income areas that have been previously underserved and/or have unmet needs;
- Improving existing facilities to meet State and local health, safety, and licensing standards;
- Building the capacity of child care providers to create new funding partnerships, leverage
  private funds and resources, and increase the supply of child care in rural and low-income
  communities; and
- Increasing the availability of services for infants and toddlers and children with special needs.
