An internship with the Congressional Budget Office (CBO) provides a unique opportunity to experience firsthand the process of developing legislative policy. The integral, nonpartisan role CBO plays in the policy process fosters an enriching learning environment. Interns work closely with experienced economists and policy analysts to prepare cost estimates, budgetary forecasts, and econometric models and to conduct research and analyze issues. In addition, Congressional lectures and hearings show interns the ins and outs of life on Capitol Hill. Formal and informal seminars by CBO staff also provide insight into CBO's mission and the inner workings of the budget process. These interactions allow interns to develop career-enhancing relationships with one another as well as with CBO staff.

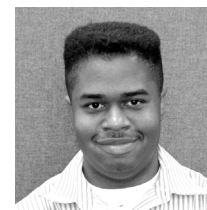

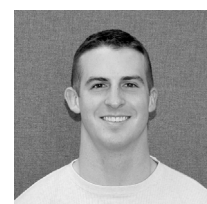
