### Tampa, Florida

The following profile contains information on demographics, political figures, programs, crime, drug use, drug trafficking, and enforcement statistics.

#### **Demographics**

- > Population: 298,674 (2003 American Community Survey)<sup>1</sup>
- Race/Ethnicity (2003 American Community Survey): 49.4% white; 27.6% black/African American; 0.5% American Indian/Alaska Native; 1.0% Asian; 0.5% Native Hawaiian/other Pacific Islander; 0.3% some other race; 1.1% two or more races; 19.7% Hispanic/Latino origin (of any race)<sup>2</sup>
- > Tampa is located in Hillsborough County.<sup>3</sup>

#### **Programs/Initiatives**

- ➢ High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA)<sup>7</sup>
   Designated in 1998, the Central Florida HIDTA is responsible for Volusia, Seminole, Orange, Osceola, Polk, Hillsborough, and Pinellas counties.
- ➤ Drugs Don't Work<sup>8</sup>
  The Drugs Don't Work program, run through the Greater Tampa Chamber of Commerce, is designed to create a drug-free workplace in local organizations.

#### **Crime and Drug-Related Crime**

➤ From January through June 2004, the Tampa Police Department reported 15 murders. During full year 2003, the Tampa Police Department reported 41 murders. This is an increase from the 37 murders reported in 2002. <sup>10</sup>

➤ From January through August 2004, the Tampa Police Department reported 4,168 drug/narcotic offenses. In full year 2003, there were 4,473 such offenses reported.<sup>11</sup>

➤ During 2003, the Tampa Police Department made 5,197 drug arrests. <sup>12</sup> During 2002, there were 5,275 drug arrests reported by the Tampa Police Department. <sup>13</sup>

➤ Thirty percent of Tampa adult male arrestees tested positive for cocaine in 2003. 14

Additional Tampa arrestee drug use data for 2003 indicate that 52.3% of the adult male arrestees used marijuana within the past year. Among those reporting past year marijuana use, the average number of days the drug was used in the past month was 11.1.<sup>15</sup>

#### **Drugs**

Cocaine

According to *Pulse Check* sources, the number of crack users in Tampa has increased slightly, while the number of powder cocaine users has declined slightly. A gram of powder cocaine typically sold for \$50 in the Tampa area during 2002.<sup>16</sup>

> Heroin

South American heroin is prevalent in the Tampa Bay area.<sup>17</sup> During 2002, a gram of heroin typically sold for \$80 in the Tampa/St. Petersburg area.<sup>18</sup>

> Marijuana

During 2002, marijuana sold for \$1,100-\$1,200/ounce in Tampa.<sup>19</sup>

> Methamphetamine

Methamphetamine continues to be reported as an emerging problem in Tampa.<sup>20</sup> The Tampa Bay area is the focal point of all meth distribution and abuse in Florida.<sup>21</sup>

Club Drugs

Ecstasy is flooding the Central Florida area, primarily Orlando and Tampa. The "rave scene" in these cities also promotes the use of other club drugs such as ketamine, GHB, nitrous oxide, and LSD.<sup>22</sup> During 2002, ecstasy tablets sold for \$12-\$15 each.<sup>23</sup>

> Other Drugs

Diverted pharmaceuticals are becoming increasingly available on the street, particularly since pain management clinics began opening on a more frequent basis. Tampa *Pulse Check* sources indicate that diverted OxyContin can be obtained with no difficulty at all. A large increase in the abuse of benzodiazepines, particularly alprazolam, has been reported in the Tampa/St. Petersburg area. Dextromethorphan (found in Coricidin HBP Cough and Cold) is being used by adolescents in Tampa. There has been an increase in thefts of the product from groceries and pharmacies and some pharmacies have begun restricting sales of the product to one box per customer.<sup>24</sup>

#### Enforcement

➤ Narcotics Bureau<sup>25</sup>

The Tampa Police Department Narcotics Bureau is composed of the Narcotics Unit and the Quick Uniformed Attack on Drugs (Q.U.A.D.) Squad. The Narcotics Unit works to enforce narcotic and dangerous drug laws, investigates crime organizations involved in drug trafficking, and gathers and disseminates information to other agencies. The Q.U.A.D. Squad works to reduce street level drug dealing.

➤ As of October 2002, there were 1,277 full-time law enforcement employees in Tampa (956 officers and 321 civilians). <sup>26</sup>

#### Juveniles

➤ During 2002, the mean age when Hillsborough County middle school students first used marijuana was 12.0 years. Among Hillsborough County high school students surveyed in 2002, the average age of first marijuana use was 14.1 years.<sup>27</sup>

➤ Approximately 11.5% of Hillsborough County middle school students and 37.5% of high school students surveyed in 2002 reported using marijuana in their lifetime. <sup>28</sup>

➤ Nearly 19% of Hillsborough County high school students surveyed in 2002 reported being drunk or high at school.<sup>29</sup>

#### **Trafficking and Seizures**

As a result of Florida's Domestic Marijuana Eradication program, 7 marijuana grow sites (indoor and outdoor) were detected in Hillsborough County during 2003.<sup>31</sup>

#### **Courts**

➤ Drug Courts<sup>32</sup>

As of September 2004, there were 3 drug courts in Tampa that had been operating for more than 2 years and 1 additional drug court that was being planned.

#### **Corrections**

- ➤ At the end of June 2004, the inmate population at the Hillsborough Correctional Institution was 200.<sup>33</sup> This facility has Alcoholics Anonymous and Narcotics Anonymous programs for the offenders.<sup>34</sup>
- ➤ Tampa Circuit Office probation officers supervise Hillsborough County offenders in the community who have been placed on probation or who have been released from prison with post-release supervision. As of August 22, 2003, there were 11,791 total offenders being supervised by this office. The Circuit Office offers drug treatment at the Drug

Abuse Comprehensive Coordinating Office, Tampa Crossroads, and at the Center for Rational Living.<sup>35</sup>

#### **Consequences of Use**

There were 81 deaths in Tampa during 2003 in which cocaine was found in the body of the deceased. This is down from 2002 when there were 79 deaths in which cocaine was present. During 2001, there were 56 deaths in which cocaine was present.

Approximately 25% of Tampa adult male arrestees interviewed during 2003 reported receiving inpatient or residential treatment at some point in their lives.<sup>40</sup>
