
PARTNERING HELPS YOUNG FAMILY FIND SHELTER AFTER THE STORM

Outline of Need:

Michael and Carrie Adamson both worked and resided in Ogallala. The couple and their three children--Kelsey 5 1/2 yrs., Tyler 4 yrs., and McClain 2 yrs. lived in a trailer home that the Adamsons were purchasing. On July 6, 2002, heavy rains resulted in area flooding causing the family to lose both their home and many possessions. Their troubles soon increased when Michael had to leave his employment due to serious medical problems.

How Rural Development Helped:

Effective partnering and community support played a significant role in assisting the Adamson family with buying a "home" again. USDA Rural Development via its Direct Home Ownership Loan program partnered with Keith County Housing Development Corporation and Ogallala Recovery, as well as local businesses, churches and realtors to help the Adamsons. Community response was overwhelming as responders "were coming out of the woodwork" to help all the residents adversely impacted by the flood. This outpouring of generosity assisted families such as the Adamsons.
