

The Marine Corps Logistics Base Albany, Ga., in conjunction with the Albany District Attorney's Domestic Violence Task Force, proudly presents the dramatic play "Daddy, Don't". Charles, a retired Marine and Thelma Williams have been married for twenty-three years. Almost immediately from the onset of their union, Thelma has been a victim of domestic violence. Their children now ages 23, 17, 16 and 14 emotionally bear the scars that Thelma physically hides. "Daddy, Don't" is

dense with unforgettable images. We see through the eyes and lives of their children how domestic violence spawns other abuses — alcohol abuse, premature sex, drug solicitation. A belief that domestic violence should be permissible in relationships spirals their two daughters into mirrored abusive relationships. The play "Daddy, Don't" reminds us that domestic violence rarely occurs as a single assault. Instead, such acts of aggression are usually the culmination of a long history of emotional psychological abuse and are often cyclical in nature. They are the out-

ward signs of a dysfunctional fully end the cycle of domestic relationship.

Consequently, Thelma's children have not just witnessed sporadic acts of violence, but have grown up in an environment in which violence is an accepted form of conflict resolution and that the social order of the Williams' family depends on physical domination.

"Daddy, Don't" forces us to consider the effects of domestic violence on children and brings us to the realization that a family is more than a collection of individuals. It's a complex set of dynamic interrelationships in which each member is affected by the others. Only by recognizing this interdependence can we hope to success-

violence. Through tears, love, humor and most importantly hope Thelma strives to break free of the emotional and physical chains that bind her and her children to not just an emotional prison, but also a physical one, with invisible walls that, unlike bars, prevents escape through intimidation and

To be eligible for the award, individual food and hospitality activities must have operated for the entire past fiscal year, they must at least break even, and must show significant gains in customer service, financial performance, human resources, and operations.

Each activity is evaluated against criteria of excellence established by the Food and Hospitality Operations Branch staff. A panel from the Personal and Family Readiness Division, MCCS's headquarters'organization, individually evaluates and judges each of the nominations against the award criteria.

At my house, I am known as "the Master Packer." I just have the ability to fit things into nearly any given space and maximize usage. It doesn't matter whether we are packing the trunk of the car for a trip or loading the dishwasher. I just seem to be able to look at an area, look at what needs to go in and figure out the best arrangement so as to get the most use out of the space available.

This has some advantages, but some drawbacks, as well. For instance, if my wife knows that we need to get a lot of stuff into an area, she will get me to take care of it. On the other hand, sometimes if we add things to the existing cargo, I will take everything out and completely reload it. I like to see everything up front before I decide how I need to put it in.

The biggest drawback to being the Master Packer is that I tend to feel like I can do it better than anyone else. After all, if I am the master, then certainly I can do it better than another person. The worst part of all is that it fosters in me an attitude that I have to be right. If I can do it the best, then obviously I will always be

This line of thinking can easily lead to a feeling of infallibility. This attitude can lead to disaster. First, it will not allow us to take suggestions from other people. I once had a commanding officer who felt like since he was the CO, he automatically knew more about the operation of the ship than anyone else. Unfortunately, he was an aviator in command of an oiler. He had officers onboard who had spent over 20 years each serving aboard oilers and knew more than he did about underway replenishment. One of the CO's decisions, which went against the recommendation of the deck department head, resulted in serious injury of one of our Sailors. Because the CO felt he was infallible, it resulted in need-

There are times, however, when we would benefit from listening to others. The wisest person knows that even though he may be an expert, too many times we fail to see a better way because we have become so accustomed to doing it in a manner that has proven effective in the past. He knows that he is also prone to mistakes and does not always have the fullest information.

The Bible tells us that all people are fallible. We are not perfect. We all make mistakes. I hate to say it, but sometimes, even the Master Packer is wrong. We have a term for our fallibility. It is called "sin." It means that none of us is perfect. The only One who is perfect is God. The only man who has ever been perfect is the one called Jesus, and he was perfect because of His unique relationship with God. If you, like me, sometimes think of yourself as the master of anything, you should remember that we are human and subject to being wrong. We are all sinners and in need of God's forgiveness. There is nothing bad about being right, just don't ever get to the point that you don't think that you can be wrong. God alone is perfect. Not even the Master Packer is right

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







KVN service to Marine Corps

The forerunner of the Key Volunteer Network, the Key Wives Program, began at the 2nd Marine Aircraft Wing at Marine Corps Air Station Cherry Point, N.C.

The Key Volunteer Network assumed its new name in 1993. The network focuses on educating families, resulting in a self-sufficient Marine Corps family that enhances mission readiness.

KVN is a communication network, formed within a unit, to help keep families better informed about the mission and tasks of that unit, and to assist in establishing a sense of community in the unit.

The purpose of each individual Key Volunteer is to serve as a communication link between the commanding officer and unit families, to provide information and referral services and to act as a role model to demonstrate good coping and stress management skills.

As the link between the CO and unit families, KVN has an obligation to keep confidential personal information shared by unit families. Safeguarding confidential information shows respect for a family's privacy and protects the credibility and integrity of the network.

As Marines and Sailors stationed aboard MCLB Albany, we sometimes overlook how much we need this network. I often hear Marines

say that we do not need the KVN because we are not a deploying unit. I also listen to those same individuals discuss how the KVN is simply a gossip network that provides no positive attributes.

As the family readiness officer, I would like to introduce you to our network. We are working hard to reach Marines. Sailors and their families. We are also attempting to assist these individuals by supporting numerous events aboard MCLB.

For example, the Key Volunteers came out in force to support the Navy and Marine Corps Relief Society's "Run for Relief." The volunteers also raised money in support of local families, hosted the Spouses Night Out, supported the Month of the Military Child Celebration, and welcomed the families who recently joined our community.

We can't do it alone, however. We need your support to make our Key Volunteer Network a success. Without the support of the active duty members and their spouses, it will not be a suc-

Our network is still actively seeking volunteers. The network is designed to support Marines and their families. We are devoting our efforts to accomplishing just that.

For two weeks, Marine Corps Logistic Base Albany accommodated more than 1,100 Marines who evacuated here fromPensacola, Fla., with food and shelter for the duration of Hurricane Ivan's pre-strike evacution procedures and postcleanup efforts.

Even though damage in Pensacola was extensive with cleanup operations still taking place, these Marines packed up and headed home last weekend.

Agencies aboard the base, along with local area community leaders, worked around the clock to support and entertain the Pensacola Marines.

Community support included the Albany Chamber of Commerce, working with the City of Albany, to supply buses for the Marines to visit the Albany Mall during their first weekend here. Additional support was received from various organizations within the community.

Individuals and civic groups donated items from books to dartboards, and one company even candy products. Pensacola Marines continuously

expressed their gratitude for the tremendous outpouring of Albany support and hospitality.

The Pensacola Marines took full advantage of the available extended base activities and store hours. Activities such as the movie theatre, bowling alley, convenience store and snack bar opened earlier than normal, or developed mobile support operations to the warehouse area where they were staying. Recreational sites such as the skeet shooting range, swimming pool and golf driving range were in high demand during their stay here.

The base activated its Destructive Weather Operations Center — a 24hour emergency response cell. The DWOC supported the Pensacola Marines and provided a first alert information entity for all civilian and military personnel during the hurricane conditions.

The DWOC ensured the constant monitoring of Pensacola Marines' health and welfare by providing a myriad of logistical support such as

medical, food, transportation, portable showers/toilets, sleeping cots, tables, audiovisual /computers, communications and much more.

"While it is an unwaiverable fact that 'Marines always take care of their own,' and the base never thought twice about supporting these Pensacola Marines in their hour of need, the fact that the Albany community embraced this motto, as evident by the outpour of humanitarian aid, speaks volumes about this great area." said Col. John Lopez, commanding officer, MCLB.

On Sept. 13, the Marine's evacuation commenced. Other naval military and civilian residents of Pensacola were afforded alternate means of evacuation.

Having been used before as a hurricane relief shelter for Marine recruits stationed at Parris Island, S.C., MCLB proved once again that it is capable of handling such emergency situations.
