8. Pursuant to Section 1004.8 of the Department's regulations, the Director of Office of Hearings and Appeals is the person responsible for all denials of appeals submitted to the Department. With respect to denial of access pursuant to Exemption 1, the Director, Office of Security Affairs, has been designated as the official responsible for the review of information at the appellate level. The adjudicatory aspects of such appeals are processed by the Department's Office of Hearings and Appeals.
9. There have been no proceedings instituted under the authority of subsection (a)(4)(F).
10. Department of Energy regulations implementing the Freedom of Information Act, issued on December 29, 1978, became effective on January 1, 1979, and were published on January 8, 1979, in Vol. 44, Federal Register, page 1908. A change to the regulations regarding the Freedom of Information Reading Room fee schedule was published on March 9, 1982, in Vol. 47, Federal Register, page 9995.

To comply with the Freedom of Information Reform Act of 1986, the Department of Energy published a final rule on the Uniform Fee Schedule and Administrative Guidelines on May 3, 1988, in Vol. 53, No. 85, Federal Register, page 15660. The Department's proposed regulations revising its regulations on the procedures and principles to be applied in responding to requests for records under the Freedom of Information Act were published on October 23, 1991, in Vol. 56, Federal Register, page 55035.

11. **Fee schedule:** Photoduplication - \$.05 per page for paper to paper copies and \$.10 per page for microform to paper copies. Pursuant to Section 1004.9 of the final rule (see Section 8 above), fees for search and review will be charged to recoup the full allowable direct cost incurred, i.e., salary rate(s) of the employee(s) performing the search and/or review. Fees are not charged for a request or a series of related requests where they would amount, in the aggregate, to \$15.00 or less. The approximate amount of fees collected by the Department of Energy was \$31,562.48.



## 12. Additional report information:

- a. **Availability of Records:** New categories or segregable portions of records are being released upon request. These include documents declassified after October 1, 1994, for Open-Net, human experimentation records, and draft documents. The Department continues to make information publicly available to the fullest extent permitted by law.

In 1994, the Department of Energy received 2,949 requests for information pursuant to subsection (a)(3). This number significantly differs from prior reports submitted by the Department, such as 1993, which identified 11,391 received, and 1992, which identified 8,247 received. This vast difference is a result of the Department's past calculation methods, which included requests for reading room material pursuant to subsection (a)(2). The Department's 1994 Annual Report figures reflect only the total number of Freedom of Information Act requests received pursuant to subsection (a)(3).

- b. The Department of Energy incurred costs of approximately \$4,909,552.86 in administering all Freedom of Information Act requests in 1994. This figure includes the cost of services of Departmental personnel including salary and fringe benefits, litigation proceedings, overhead costs of such services (i.e., training, travel, subscriptions, printing, duplicating, and mailing), and other associated expenses for all program areas and field operation activities related to administering the Freedom of Information Act.
- c. There were 424 instances in which a formal 10-day extension of time was sought. The reasons for the extensions are as follow:
- 1) The need to search for and collect requested records from field facilities or other establishments that are separate from the office processing the request: 71
  - 2) The need to search for, collect, and appropriately examine a voluminous number of separate and distinct records which are demanded in a single request: 269

- 3) The need for consultation with another agency having a substantial interest in the determination of the request or between two or more components of the agency having substantial subject-matter interest therein: 84
- d. There were no instances in which a court appeal was taken on the basis of exhaustion of administrative procedures because the Department was unable to comply with the requests within the applicable time limits.
- e. There were no instances in which a court ruled on the issue of additional time upon a showing of exceptional circumstances.
