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## HIGHLIGHTS OF JUNEAU, AK NATIONAL COMPENSATION SURVEY NOVEMBER 2001

Workers in the Juneau, Alaska, area averaged \$20.09 per hour during November 2001 according to a new survey released by the U.S. Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS). Regional Commissioner Stanley P. Stephenson reported that white-collar workers averaged \$22.89 per hour. Blue-collar employees averaged \$19.49 per hour, while those in service occupations earned \$11.29 per hour. (See table 1.)

The National Compensation Survey (NCS) is part of a statistical program that will eventually integrate three separate surveys of wages and benefits into one comprehensive compensation program increasing the amount of wage data available. Data presented in this release are straight-time earnings for occupations in establishments employing 50 or more workers in private industry and State and local governments. The survey excludes agricultural establishments, private households, the self-employed, and the Federal Government. This NCS covered 14 establishments in the Juneau area.

Among white-collar workers, those in executive, administrative and managerial positions averaged \$33.49 per hour, and administrative support workers earned \$13.74. In the blue-collar occupations, precision production, craft, and repair workers made \$22.20 per hour. Occupational characteristics available show that private industry workers in Juneau earned \$12.98 per hour and state and local government employees averaged \$23.79. For full-time workers, earnings averaged \$20.74 per hour compared to \$11.49 per hour for part-timers.

<sup>1</sup> Earnings are the straight-time hourly wages or salaries paid to employees. They include incentive pay, cost-of-living adjustments, and hazard pay. Excluded are premium pay for overtime, vacations, and holidays; nonproduction bonuses; and tips. The mean is computed by totaling the pay of all workers and dividing by the number of workers, weighted by hours.

NOTE: Dashes indicate that no data were reported or that data did not meet publication criteria.

<sup>2</sup> The relative standard error (RSE) is the standard error expressed as a percent of the estimate. It can be used to calculate a confidence interval around a sample estimate.

<sup>3</sup> Employees are classified as working either a full-time or a part-time schedule based on the definition used by each establishment. Union workers are those whose wages are determined through collective bargaining. Wages of time workers are based solely on hourly rate or salary; incentive workers are those whose wages are at least partially based on productivity payments such as piece rates, commissions, and production bonuses.

<sup>4</sup> A classification system including about 480 individual occupations is used to cover all workers in the civilian economy.

<sup>5</sup> Classification of establishments into goods-producing and service-producing industries applies to private industry only.

<sup>6</sup> Establishments classified with 50-99 workers may contain establishments with fewer than 50 due to staff reductions between survey sampling and collection.
