Life in the Vast Lane?

Willmar, Kandiyohi County, and MN Dept. of Agriculture recently sponsored a day-long session entitled "Investing in MN Agriculture." Participants learned about opportunities in biodiesel and food processing, future livestock regulations, research on the financial contribution livestock operations pump into a community and state, and the need to enhance global agricultural markets. The MN Legislature may consider a "livestock friendly" bill in 2003 that will position dairy producers in southwestern MN to grow their herds and market their milk to the Davisco cheese plant in South Dakota. Outreach to Enhance Native Budgeting

First National Development Institute and the Fannie Mae Foundation have developed financial skills curriculum, Building Native Communities: Financial Skills for Families. It was designed to help Native people take control of their financial future.

First Nations, Fannie Mae Foundation and other partners will train regional instructors called "Super Trainers." Rural Development's Pam Wiltsey will be a super trainer, in Minnesota. These super trainers will deliver "train the trainer" courses to local trainers and in turn, the local trainers, who are tribal housing folks, will offer the course to tribal members. Thirty-three "train the trainer" sessions have already been completed nationwide, reaching 30 tribal communities and almost 500 instructors. The goal is to reach over 10,000 tribal members. Wiltsey has been invited by the Leech Lake Tribal College to train a group of tribal housing personnel from the Leech Lake, White Earth and Red Lake Nations in January 2003. Pam will partner with the National American Indian Housing Council in offering this workshop.

Sustainable into the Future?

Joe Folsom, Community & Co-op Development Program Director instructed residents of Wadena and the region, how to form



a co-op at a November workshop. An initiative is Underway to explore a variety of ideas in hopes of creating a sustainable community in the small, west-central MN town. Possibilities include an ag-based industrial park with an ethanol plant to fuel other value-added businesses; a greenhouse enhanced with carbon dioxide (a by-product of ethanol production); livestock fed with DDGs (another byproduct from an ethanol plant), dairy production, and possible enhancements to the existing Buckwheat Growers' mill and shipping facility. Moving up the Food Chain!

A number of MN co-ops and LLCs have been selected to receive value-added grants from USDA Rural Development. They include: American Crystal Sugar, MG Grass Seed, Midwest Investorys, Earthwise Processors, Harvest Land, Cenex Harvest States, SoyMor, Generation II Ethanol, St. Paul Growers Assn., and Blue Mound Soy.

Others serving MN. farmers include: FarmConnect (its soy plant is in Iowa) and the National Bison Assn. Value-added development grants range up to a half million dollars to help producers grow their businesses through financial and legal planning and marketing. More grants are anticipated in 2003.

The name, "Bene Siikwe," meaning "Thunderbird Woman" was given to Pam during a pipe ceremony August 17, 2002. A song in her honor was written and sung by Kathy. A traditional meal followed with family in attendance.

"It is a great honor to become part of Kathy's family, and I am very proud of my new name," Wiltsey remarked.

"I will carry it with dignity and honor."

Pam is an enrolled member of the Cherokee Nation and Osage Tribe. The Am. Indian Community Development Specialist lives near Crosslake with her husband, Joe. He is also a longtime USDA employee, the training coordinator for the Natural Resource Conservation Service.
