




National Military Command Center







Strategic Command

- Deter attacks on U.S. and allies
- Control strategic nuclear forces
- Operate communications, weather, navigation, ballistic missile attack warning satellites
- Assure U.S. space access and deny the enemy same
- Should deterrence fail, employ forces to achieve national objectives





War on Terrorism

- Communicate that supporting terrorism carries a steep price
- Acquire intelligence
- Develop friendly relationships
- Eliminate terror operations
- Deny enemy access to offensive systems
- Provide humanitarian relief





Progress in Afghanistan

- The Taliban regime is out; the al-Qaeda senior leadership is in disarray
- 49 schools rebuilt; 30,000 boys and girls back in school
- First Little League baseball game held
- 500,000 metric tons of food delivered, enough to feed almost 7 million Afghans

Homeland Security

- Traditional military missions; combat air patrols, maritime defense
- Emergency response to the aftermath of attacks and natural disasters
- Special event security support



The Phoenix Project

- September 11, 2001: Flight 77 crashes into Pentagon at 9:37 a.m. damaging the C, D, and E Rings of Corridors 4 and 5; approximately 400,000 square feet; 125 killed.
- June 11, 2002: Discolored limestone block from west wall impact site, covers dedication capsule.
- September 11, 2002: E-ring point of impact spaces reoccupied.
- Spring 2003: Full restoration.


