

Programs/Initiatives

- High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA)¹⁰
 - Designated in 1999, the Hawaii HIDTA is responsible for the following counties: Hawaii, Honolulu, Kauai, and Maui. This area's location, popularity as a resort destination, and high volume of international and domestic air and sea travel, provide crime organizations with ample opportunity to traffic drugs into and through the area.
- Project PAU (Preventing Alcohol Use Among Youths)¹¹ Project PAU works to combat underage drinking through a number of methods, including sting enforcement operations to stop stores from selling liquor to minors. This program also enables youth arrested for alcohol use to be sentenced to a special program that attempts to curb the problem through education and community service.

Medical Marijuana¹²

In 2000, Hawaii's Governor Cayetano signed into law a bill, SB862 HD1, to approve the possession and use of marijuana for medical purposes. This bill states that medical use of marijuana by a patient shall only be permitted if the qualifying patient has been diagnosed by a physician as having a debilitating medical condition; if the qualifying patient's physician has certified in writing that the potential benefits of medical marijuana would likely outweigh the health risks for the patient; and if the amount of marijuana does not exceed an adequate supply. An adequate supply of marijuana is not to exceed three mature plants, four immature plants, and no more than one ounce of usable marijuana.

Drugs

 \succ Cocaine³³

Cocaine is readily available throughout Hawaii and used in combination with alcohol, heroin, and marijuana. Crack cocaine is also readily available and is converted on an as needed basis.

 \succ Heroin³⁴

Most heroin users in Hawaii are white, middle class, 30-40 year old users. Younger persons are also now experimenting with the drug.

➢ Marijuana³⁵

Marijuana is frequently encountered in schools among students as young as sixth grade. Medical marijuana certificates are a concern on the islands, where local users are permitted to grow several plants at their residences for personal consumption.

 \blacktriangleright Methamphetamine³⁶

Crystal methamphetamine, also known as "ice," is the drug of choice in Hawaii. Methamphetamine is considered readily available.

Club Drugs³⁷

Among teens and young adults (20-30 years old), there has been a continued increase in Ecstasy use. Ecstasy abuse is rising among the large military population in Hawaii and it is considered the major drug use issue effecting active duty military in the state.

- Diverted Pharmaceuticals³⁸ Hydrocodone is one of the most abused pharmaceutical drugs in Hawaii, ranging from \$3-\$9 per tab on the street. OxyContin's street price has risen 20% due to increased demand with prices ranging from \$18 for 80 milligrams to \$3 for 10 milligrams.
- According to 2000-2001 data from the National Household Survey on Drug Abuse (NHSDA), 39.69% of Hawaii citizens ages 12 and older felt that smoking marijuana once a month posed a great risk.³⁹

Enforcement

- As of October 31, 2002, there were 3,553 full-time law enforcement employees in Hawaii (2,799 officers and 754 civilians).⁴⁷
- Statewide Narcotics Task Force⁴⁸ This task force combines multi-agency efforts including airport interdiction, intelligence sharing, standardized training, use of undercover officers, and the use of canine in the detection of drugs. Federal and county law enforcement personnel, as well as state narcotics investigators are involved in this task force.

Statewide Marijuana Eradication Task Force⁴⁹ This task force is a multi-agency, cooperative effort to eradicate marijuana in Hawaii. Multi-agency efforts include joint missions, stake outs and surveillance, investigations, and surveillance, regular meetings, regular and standardized training. Members of the task force include personnel from county, state, and federal law enforcement agencies with leadership provided by the Drug Enforcement Administration.

Trafficking and Seizures

From July 2001 to June 2002, 2,473,047.93 grams of marijuana was seized in Hawaii.⁵⁰

During 2002, more than 435,789 cultivated marijuana plants were eradicated in Hawaii under the DEA's Domestic Cannabis Eradication/Suppression Program.⁵¹

- Most of the heroin seized in Hawaii is black tar heroin, although Southeast Asian heroin is also smuggled and distributed in the state.⁵²
- Most of the methamphetamine labs seized in Hawaii are small "conversion" laboratories. Through analysis of the seized glassware and chemicals, it was found that most laboratories are capable of manufacturing in ounce quantities.⁵³
- Ecstasy is not manufactured in Hawaii, but is shipped from the mainland through the U.S. mail or smuggled on incoming flights through the Honolulu airport.⁵⁴
- Hawaii is considered the "national leader" in the production of high-grade marijuana. Homegrown marijuana, either harvested from indoor operation or from outdoor grows, remains a staple for the local demand and for export to the mainland.⁵⁵
- During 2002, 24.4 kilograms of methamphetamine was seized in Hawaii.⁵⁶

Courts

➢ Drug Courts⁵⁸

As of November 2003, there were 9 drug courts in Hawaii that were either already in existence or were being planned. Two drug courts had been in existance for over 2 years, 3 drug courts were recently implemented, and 4 drug courts were being planned.

In 2000, 51% of the 292 Federal defendants in Hawaii were charged with a drug-related offense. Of the defendants charged with a drug-related offence, 44.6% involved methamphetamine.⁵⁹ In 2001, 50.4% of the 357 Federal defendants in Hawaii were charged with a drug-related offense. Of the defendants charged with a drug-related offense, methamphetamine was involved in 51.1%.⁶⁰

Corrections

- As of December 31, 2002, there were 16,772 adults on probation and 2,525 adults on parole in Hawaii.⁶¹
- As of December 31, 2002, there were 5,423 prisoners under supervision by State and Federal correctional authorities in Hawaii.⁶²

Treatment

During 2001, there were 2,089 amphetamine admissions to treatment in Hawaii, representing 31.9% of all admissions.⁶³ During 2002, there were 2,238 amphetamine admissions to treatment, representing 34.7% of all treatment admissions.⁶⁴
