Programs/Initiatives

- High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA)⁵ Designated in 1996, the Midwest HIDTA is responsible for areas in Iowa, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota, South Dakota, and Kansas. Topeka's Shawnee County is involved in Midwest HIDTA efforts.
- ➢ Methamphetamine Watch Program⁶

Topeka and other cities take part in a Methamphetamine Watch Program to identify individuals involved in the production of methamphetamine. As part of the program, retailers report multiple purchases involving chemicals that are used in the methamphetamine production process.

Drugs

Cocaine

Cocaine, particularly crack cocaine, is readily available throughout Kansas, primarily in major urban areas such as Topeka.¹⁵

> Heroin

Heroin sells for \$100/gram in Topeka.¹⁶

> Methamphetamine

During the first quarter of 2002, law enforcement officials in Topeka indicated that high purity crystal methamphetamine became available in wholesale and retail quantities in their area. In the Topeka area, methamphetamine produced by Mexican criminal groups sells for \$5,000/pound.¹⁷

Club Drugs

Law enforcement officials in Topeka indicate that GHB availability and abuse are moderate. $^{18}\,$

Enforcement

As of October 31, 2001, there were 332 full-time law enforcement employees in Topeka (277 officers and 55 civilians).¹⁹

Trafficking and Seizures

- Topeka is a drug distribution center in Kansas and serves as a transit area for drugs being transported to other states.²⁰
- From January 1 through September 30, 2003, no marijuana plants were seized in Topeka or Shawnee County. During 2002, the Topeka Police Department seized 76 cultivated marijuana plants at indoor locations. The Kansas Bureau of Investigation seized 3 marijuana plants at outdoor sites in Shawnee County during 2002.²¹
- From January to October 1, 2003, there were 13 methamphetamine laboratory-related seizures in Shawnee County.²²

▶ In 2001, the Topeka Police Department seized 3.6 kilograms of methamphetamine.²³

Courts

 \blacktriangleright Drug Courts²⁴

As of September 2003, there were no drug courts in existence or being planned in Topeka.

Corrections

- In March 2001, the Topeka Correctional Facility (TCF) became an all-female facility. On December 31, 2002, the TCF population was 557.²⁵
- \blacktriangleright The therapeutic community at TCF has a capacity of 24.²⁶
