

# **Programs/Initiatives**

Prevention and Education on AIDS in Kentucky (PEAK)<sup>6</sup>

The project provides outreach and intervention for drug users at high risk for HIV and AIDS in a two-city crossover design. PEAK offices are located in Louisville with a contract to the Volunteers of America, and in Lexington with a contract to the Community Action Council. This program places special emphasis on rural drug abusers.

# **Federal Funding**

- Drug-Free Communities Support Program grantee in Louisville:<sup>7</sup>
  - FY 2003: \$100,000 to Portland Now Prevention Partnership
  - FY 2002, 2001, 2000, 1999, and 1998: no Louisville grantees
- FY 2002 Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration Discretionary Funds awarded to Louisville grantees:<sup>8</sup>
  - Center for Mental Health Services: \$60,000
  - Center for Substance Abuse Prevention: \$0
  - Center of Substance Abuse Treatment: \$1,875,984
- ➢ Executive Office for Weed and Seed<sup>9</sup>

Louisville is the only city in Kentucky to receive Federal funding and official recognition as a Weed and Seed site.

- There were no Louisville recipients of the FY 2002 Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS) Methamphetamine Grant.<sup>10</sup>
- FY 2001 U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's Federally Assisted Low-Income Housing Drug Elimination Grant recipients in Louisville:<sup>11</sup>
  - \$175,218 to the New Directions Housing Corporation.
- Louisville did not receive any funding for the FY 2002 Office of Justice Programs Drug Court Grant.<sup>12</sup>

# Crime and Drug-Related Crime

During 2000, the crime index total for Louisville was 15,058.<sup>13</sup> This number increased to 15,673 during 2001.<sup>14</sup> Preliminary data for 2002 showed the crime index was 7,322 for Louisville between January and June.<sup>15</sup>

#### Drugs

 $\succ$  Cocaine<sup>18</sup>

Powder cocaine is available in urban areas such as Louisville in ounce to kilogram quantities. Crack cocaine is also available in ounce to pound quantities. Prices for kilogram quantities of cocaine decreased from \$25,000-\$30,000 during 1995 to \$18,000-\$24,000 during 2000.

➤ Heroin<sup>19</sup>

Local law enforcement in Louisville report an increased availability of heroin.
➢ Methamphetamine<sup>20</sup>

Methamphetamine is increasingly available in Louisville. Prices for a gram of methamphetamine increased from \$100 during 1995 to \$100-\$120 during 2000. Prices per pound for methamphetamine decreased from \$13,000 during 1995 to \$6,000-\$10,000 during 2000.

➢ Marijuana<sup>21</sup>

Prices per pound of marijuana have decreased slightly from \$1,800-\$2,400 during 1995 to \$1,800 during 2000.

➢ Club Drugs<sup>22</sup>

From 1993 to 2000, there were 82 documented raves held in Louisville, accounting for 50% of all known rave activity in Kentucky during that time period.

# Juveniles

During 2001, there were 1,804 juvenile violent crime arrests in Louisville/Jefferson County.<sup>23</sup>

#### Enforcement

As of October 2001, there were 956 law enforcement employees in Louisville (713 officers and 243 civilians).<sup>25</sup>

#### **Trafficking and Seizures**

- Street gang activity has decreased significantly since 1996 mostly due to increased local law enforcement pressure.<sup>26</sup>
- Drugs destined for distribution in Kentucky are transported primarily to Louisville, which serves as a major distribution center.<sup>27</sup>

- Methamphetamine is usually transported in 1-3 pound quantities to urban areas such as Louisville by commercial or private vehicles.<sup>28</sup>
- Law enforcement reported an increased number of assaults, robberies, and homicides correlating with increases in cocaine distribution.<sup>29</sup>
- Local independent Caucasian dealers are the primary retail distributors of heroin in the Louisville area, although Mexican criminal groups also distribute heroin at the retail level, but to a lesser extent.<sup>30</sup>
- Mexican and African American criminal groups transport powder cocaine from California, Illinois, New York and Texas to Louisville.<sup>31</sup>
- During February 2000, undercover agents in Louisville purchased more than 8,100 tablets of morphine, Dilaudid, and methadone sold by Ohio pharmacy employees. These diverted tablets had an estimated street value of \$25-\$175 per dosage unit.<sup>32</sup>
- During June 2000, the Louisville task force seized 7.3 kilograms of marijuana from a package delivery shipment.<sup>33</sup>
- During June 2001, a Louisville task force seized 288 dosage units of ketamine shipped from San Diego via a package delivery service in Louisville.<sup>34</sup>
- During 2000, local police departments seized \$17,373,000 worth of marijuana in Louisville/Jefferson County.<sup>35</sup>

# Courts

➢ Drug Courts<sup>37</sup>

As of September 2003, there were 3 drug courts in Louisville. Two drug courts had been operating for over 2 years and 1 had been recently implemented.

During 2001, there were 4,861 drug sentences in Louisville/Jefferson County, 50% of which were for marijuana related offenses.<sup>38</sup>

# Corrections

As of January 2, 2002, 23% of the total inmate population in Kentucky was convicted in Jefferson County.<sup>39</sup>

# **Consequences of Use**

Cocaine-related emergency room incidents decreased from 424 during 2000 to 283 during 2001.<sup>40</sup>

#### Treatment

- Methadone/Opiate Rehabilitation and Education (MORE) Center<sup>42</sup> This center provides medically monitored drug treatment and related counseling services to patients who are physiologically dependent on illicit drugs. The center's mission is to empower people addicted to illicit drugs to discontinue use and improve their quality of life. During FY 2001, of the 42,300 urine drug tests administered, 97.6% were compliant (not positive for drugs).
- The cities of Louisville, Lexington, and Covington have the largest number of patients seeking treatment for heroin addiction.<sup>43</sup>
- During 2001, there were 1,113 cocaine clients in treatment programs in Louisville/Jefferson County.<sup>44</sup>
