

Programs/Initiatives

- ▶ Norfolk Police Department D.A.R.E. Parent Program⁷
 - The D.A.R.E. Parent Program is intended for families of children who are presently in the D.A.R.E. program and other interested adults. The program focuses on developing better skills to interact with children, learning about peer pressures, and identifying signs to help reduce the risk of potential substance abuse. The program consists of four or five two-hour sessions generally held in the evening on building self-esteem, listening skills, communication skills, risk factors, peer pressure, resistance skills, media messages, drug recognition, and reasons for drug use.

Federal Funding

- Drug-Free Communities Support Program grantees in Norfolk:⁸ Since funding was first available through the Drug-Free Communities Support Program in 1998, only one coalition in Norfolk has received funding. In FY 1999, \$89,953 was awarded to the James Barry Robinson Institute, The Barry Robinson Center.
- There were no FY 2001 Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration Discretionary Funds awarded to Norfolk grantees.⁹
- Executive Office for Weed and Seed¹⁰
 Norfolk has not been officially recognized as a Weed and Seed site.
- There were no grants awarded to Norfolk for the FY 2001 U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's Federally Assisted Low-Income Housing Drug Elimination Grants.¹¹
- Norfolk did not receive any funding for the FY 2002 Office of Justice Programs Drug Court Grant.¹²

Norfolk did not receive any funding for the FY 2002 Community Oriented Policing Services Methamphetamine Grant.¹³

Crime and Drug-Related Crime

During 2000, the crime index total for Norfolk was 15,913.¹⁴ This number decreased to 14,966 during 2001.¹⁵ Preliminary data for 2002 show that the crime index total was 7,434 for Norfolk between January and June.¹⁶

During 2001, there were 17,482 adult arrests in Norfolk, 1,086 of which were for drug/narcotic offenses.¹⁷

Juveniles

According to a 1999 survey by The Virginian Pilot, 10% of high school seniors surveyed in the Norfolk area reported having abused LSD at least once in their lifetime.¹⁸ During 2001, there were 2,102 juvenile arrests in Norfolk, 34 of which were for drug/narcotic offenses.¹⁹

Enforcement

- As of October 2001, there were 851 law enforcement employees in Norfolk (730 officers and 121 civilians).²⁰
- Norfolk Vice and Narcotics Division²¹ This division is responsible for the suppression of illegal vice, narcotics and organized crime activity in the City of Norfolk through the investigation, arrest and prosecution of offenders.

Trafficking and Seizures

- The Granville Boyz, Lamberts Point, and West Ocean View Folks gangs distribute cocaine and crack as well as commit violent crimes in Norfolk.²²
- The Berkley Boyz, Da Mobb, Folks, Granville Boyz, Lamberts Point, NOON, and West Ocean View Folks gangs distribute marijuana and commit violent acts such as assaults, carjacking, drive-by shootings, home invasions, and homicides.²³
- The Norfolk Police Department report that the Shotgun Gangster Crips distribute heroin and commit assaults in the Norfolk area.²⁴
- During 1998, the Norfolk Police Department, Vice and Narcotics Division seized drugs valued at \$4,575,704. The total amount of money seized was \$958,097.09 with actual forfeited monies turned back to the City totaling \$249,582.72.²⁵

Courts

 \blacktriangleright Drug Courts²⁶

As of January 2003, there were 2 drug courts in Norfolk. One drug court had been operating for over 2 years and one was being planned.

Consequences of Use

> During 2000, there were 20 deaths involving drug abuse in Norfolk City.²⁷ The number of deaths involving drug abuse in Norfolk City decreased to 12 during 2001 28

Treatment²⁹

Bridges to Freedom

Bridges to Freedom is a therapeutic community type treatment program for women that provides intensive education regarding issues surrounding addiction to alcohol and other drugs. A major component of this treatment experience is taking back a personal sense of responsibility, developing a healthy self-image as women, as well as a willingness to cooperate as part of a larger group.

➢ Freedom Within

Freedom Within is also a therapeutic community type program designed for male offenders 18 years and older in need of and who have requested substance abuse treatment and education.
