# Idaho

## **Programs/Initiatives**

- Idaho Drug Free Youth (IDFY)<sup>11</sup>  
IDFY began in January of 1990 at Coeur d'Alene High School. It currently has over 2,500 members in Northern Idaho. The program rewards drug and alcohol free adolescents with various discounts or privileges from area businesses, sporting facilities, clothing stores, and restaurants. Students voluntarily choose to be drug tested (by use of urine analysis) and if they show no signs of substance use, they are issued a laminated, picture IDFY membership card allowing them to become eligible for the incentives.
- Idaho Regional Alcohol Drug Awareness Resource (RADAR) Network Center<sup>12</sup>  
The Idaho RADAR Network Center is an alcohol, tobacco, and other drug information clearinghouse and resource referral service for the state.

### **Crime and Drug-Related Crime**

- During 2002 in Idaho, there were 6,044 drug/narcotic violations, 70.5% of which were offenses for possession/concealing.<sup>30</sup>

- During 2002 in Idaho, 11.1% of the total Group “A” incidents (which include an additional 22 offenses in conjunction with the Part 1 crimes) indicated drug and/or alcohol usage during the commission of a crime.<sup>31</sup>
- During 2000, there were 1,174 arrests for aggravated assault in Idaho.<sup>32</sup> This number decreased to 1,035 during 2001.<sup>33</sup> During 2002, there were 1,087 arrests for aggravated assault in Idaho.<sup>34</sup>

**Drugs**

- Cocaine<sup>36</sup>  
Cocaine, although readily available throughout Idaho, is limited to affluent users.
- Methamphetamine<sup>37</sup>  
Low methamphetamine prices have increased the drug's popularity in Idaho, making it one of the most widely abused drugs in the state.
- Heroin<sup>38</sup>  
Heroin, particularly Mexican black tar and brown heroin, is readily available in Idaho.
- Club Drugs<sup>39</sup>  
Club drugs, including MDMA, LSD, and ketamine, are popular among young adults in Idaho.
- Marijuana<sup>40</sup>  
Marijuana cultivated in the state as well as marijuana produced in Mexico are available in Idaho.
- Diverted Pharmaceuticals<sup>41</sup>  
Hydrocodone and benzodiazepines are commonly abused prescription drugs in Idaho. OxyContin abuse has increased in the state.
- According to 2000-2001 data from the National Household Survey on Drug Abuse, approximately 43.3% of Idaho citizens ages 12 and older felt that smoking marijuana once a month posed a great risk.<sup>42</sup>

- During 2001, 34.7% of Idaho high school students reported using marijuana at least once in their lifetime.<sup>44</sup>

- During 2000, there were 3,314 juvenile arrests for larceny-theft offenses in Idaho.<sup>45</sup> This number decreased to 2,939 during 2001.<sup>46</sup> During 2002, there were 3,060 juvenile arrests for larceny-theft offenses in Idaho.<sup>47</sup>

- During 2002, there were 850 juvenile arrests for drug/narcotic violations and 376 juvenile arrests for drug equipment violations in Idaho.<sup>48</sup>

### Enforcement

- As of October 31, 2002, there were 3,502 total law enforcement employees in Idaho, (2,358 officers and 1,144 civilians).<sup>49</sup>
- During FY 1999, Governor Dirk Kempthorne recommended increased funding for a multi-phased approach to assist law enforcement personnel to deal with the methamphetamine problem in the state. The legislature approved the increase in funding for the Department of Law Enforcement to specifically fight methamphetamine problems in Idaho.<sup>50</sup>

### Trafficking and Seizures

- The majority of drug trafficking in Idaho is run by Mexican poly-drug organizations.<sup>51</sup>
- Illicit drugs are smuggled into Idaho by air and land routes from Southwest border-states and Mexico.<sup>52</sup>
- During 2003, there were 80 methamphetamine labs were seized in Idaho. As of February 29, 2004, there were 8 methamphetamine labs seized in Idaho.<sup>53</sup>

- In 2002, a total of 1,449 cultivated marijuana plants were eradicated in Idaho under the Drug Enforcement Administration's (DEA) Domestic Cannabis Eradication/Suppression Program.<sup>56</sup>

**Courts**

- As of November 2003, there were 33 total drug courts being planned and operating in Idaho. Fifteen drug courts had been operating for over two years, 17 were recently implemented, and 1 was being planned.<sup>57</sup>
- Of the 115 Federal defendants in Idaho during FY 2001, 24.6% were convicted of a drug offense. Methamphetamine was the most common drug involved, accounting for 75% of the drug offenses.<sup>58</sup>

**Corrections**

- According to the Idaho Department of Corrections, there were 5,825 inmates in Idaho as of July 2003. Of the inmates, 25% were in prison for drug-related crimes.<sup>59</sup>
- During this same time period, there were 9,433 persons on parole and probation in Idaho.<sup>60</sup>

**Treatment**

- During FY 2003, 55.7% of adolescent substance abuse treatment clients were admitted with their primary drug of choice being marijuana.<sup>61</sup>
