REQUEST FOR FBI FIREARMS DEMONSTRATION FRIDAY, DECEMBER 20, 1963, 2:00 P.M. - 4:00 P.M.

Reference is made to our memorandum of December 9, 1963, attached, wherein the Director approved a series of firearms demonstrations for the 1, 100 children invited to the Attorney General's Christmas Party on Friday, December 20, 1963.

At 9:30 A.M. today Mr. Stubbs, of the Department, who made the original request in connection with this affair, telephoned SA he first wanted to express the Department's wholehearted appreciation for the splendid cooperation he received from us in connection with the captioned matter. Somewhat apologetically, he added that at a meeting of the Program Committee last night it was decided that in view of the large number of boys and girls involved, and the fact that they would have to be split into small groups in order to see the firearms demonstration, that they did not wish to impose on us to this extent. Mr. Stubbs explained that the members of the committee fully appreciated that the FBI could handle its part of the program with its usual efficiency, but their concern was with the other events on the program. He said that they had engaged a Clown Band which would play in the Courtyard with several individuals dressed as animals who would entertain the children. He mentioned they were now seeking a show business luminary to entertain the group in the Great Hall, following which the youngsters would be brought to the Attorney General's Office to meet Mr. Kennedy and to receive individual gifts from him. He added that because of the movement of large numbers of children involved which would severely tax the elevator service on the Justice side of the building, they felt that it best because of the time element to omit the firearms demonstration.

Mr. Stubbs stated that he hoped he hadn't caused us any inconvenience in connection with any planning we may have done on his original request, and he was thanked for getting in touch with us as promptly as he did.

REQUEST FOR FBI FIREARMS DEMONSTRATION

FRIDAY, DECEMBER 20, 1963, 2:00 P.M. - 4:00 P.M.

This morning, Mr. Robert J. Stubbs, of the Department, advised that the Attorney General is planning to hold a Christmas party for about 1, 100 underprivileged boys and girls from the Washington, D. C., area. These children will be between the ages of 9 and 11 and this affair will be held in the Great Hall and the Justice Courtyard. Mr. Stubbs indicated that the Attorney General's assistant, Dave Hackett, will be in charge of the program, and that entertainment will be provided, consisting of a group of clowns, a magician, and several stars of the Washington Redskins' football team have also been invited. He mentioned that in the event of snow they planned to have horse drawn sleds take the children around the courtyard, and that should weather conditions not permit this, they were looking into the feasibility of hiring a snow machine for this purpose. This is not firm, however, he said.

Present plans call for the children to be brought to the Great Hall at 2:00 P. M. on Friday, December 20, 1963, by D. C. Transit Company buses which will also return them at the end of the party about 4:00 P. M. Mr. Stubbs explained that the Attorney General is greatly interested in this affair and wanted him to check to see if it would be at all possible for the FBI to put on a series of firearms demonstrations for the children. He said that if this were possible necessary arrangements could be worked out to our convenience and satisfaction, and that the demonstrations could be scheduled across the entire two hour period so that our facilities would not be overloaded. Mr. Stubbs was advised that our Indoor Range is also used as a training facility at this time of the year in addition to being used for FFI Tours, and that we would have to check our commitments to see what our situation is on that date and time.

A check of ar tour schedule reflects that our commitments are relatively light during the two hour period involved here on December 20, 1963. Further, the Training Division advises that the Indoor Range will not be used for training purposes until 4:30 P.M. on that particular date. The handling of these 1, 100 youngsters could be coordinated without too much difficulty by our Tour Unit staff, and arrangements could be made to schedule a sufficient number of demonstrations during the two hour period to enable all of the children to see a firearms demonstration.

The Attorney General called and stated he had heard that there has been some discussion about a report on Martin Luther King before the Rooney Committee and also some discussion about the Department of Justice wanted to recall that report and he, the Attorney General, wanted to recall our conversation about it because someone got the impression he, the Attorney General. requested it be recalled. I told the Attorney General that the only discussion before the Rooney Committee was cil the record; that there was inquiry off the record as to the association of Martin Luther King with the Communist movement and I reviewed the information that we had developed in the monograph and said copies of the monograph had been dolivered to the Secretary of Defense, the Secretary of State, and the White House, and that it was later recalled because it was feared it might leak out. I stated one of the members of the Committee, a Republican, made the statement he thought it ought to be exposed, and Chairman Rooney said he thought information of that kind should be kest in the back of the head rather than come out as public information. I stated I made the remark that that was the intention in recalling the document. The Attorney General stated he understands that they are saying he had requested it be withdrawn. I stated it was nothing of the kind; that in other words he, the Attornoy General, and I had tailed about it several times and he had questioned the wisdom of its distribution and I indicated I would have the copies withdrawn and I did. The Attorney General stated he did not want to have the idea that he had requested it. I stated both of us had feared a leak might get out from the Departments which had copies of the monograph; and if it happened during a sensitive time of negotiations going on with the Negro



Shortly before 10:30 this morning our Tour Room received a request from the Attorney General's Office for a tour leader. Mention was made that little "John John Kennedy, the late President's son, wanted to see our guns. went directly to the Attorney General's Office where it was decided that the Attorney General, Dave Hackett, and little John would go to our Indoor Range for a special firearms demonstration. Upon leaving his office, the Attorney General said that he wanted to stop by and see if the Director were in, took the party directly to Mr. Hoover's Office. The Director received the group, spent some time with little John showing and explaining to him various items in his office which appeared to fascinate the child. Little John was particularly interested in the model airplanes and missiles, and the Director promised the boy that he would send one of the model missiles over to his Uncle Robert this afternoon so that he could give it to him. Secret Service Agent also accompanied the group while they were at the Bureau; however, he did not go into Mr. Hoover's Office with the party. took the group to -Following the meeting with the Director, was in the process of firing for a couple of the Indoor Range where SA tour groups. His accuracy was perfect and elicited cries of approval from the tourists. Following this the Attorney General was introduced to arrangements were made for little John to fire a couple of shots with the revolver close scrutiny. On March 17, 1964, Agents of this office met the Attorney General at the Wilkes-Barre-Scranton Airport in Avoca, Pa. The Attorney General and his party were escorted in Bureau cars to the dedication of the John F. Kennedy School at Minooka, Pa., and subsequently to the Federal Building in Scranton.

Upon arrival there he indicated he wished to meet all FBI personnel. He was advised that Scranton is a resident agency, and that all the Bureau agents stationed there were in the escort party. He visited Federal officials, including the United States Attorney's office, -District Judges, and the U. S. Marshal's office.

Mr. KENNEDY was then driven to Pittston, Pa., where he addressed the meeting of the Friendly Sons of St. Patrick. He then returned to Scranton, where he was the featured speaker at the Friendly Sons' dinner at the Hotel Casey.

Upon completion of his speech he was escorted by Bureau agents to the Scranton-Wilkes-Barre Airport. Mr. KENNEDY was most appreciative of the services rendered to him by Bureau agents.

During the trip no topics of interest to the Bureau were discussed by the Attorney General.

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

Evans TRAVEL PLANS OF THE ATTORNEY GENERAL Previous memoranda have set forth information indicating the Attorney General is to participate in the memorial services for the late General MacArthur in Norfolk on April 11. 1964 Mr. Harold Reis, Executive Assistant to the Attorney General, has advised that the Attorney General is to officially participate in the services and is to travel to Norfolk, Virginia, leaving Washington, on an Air Force Jet plane at approximately 8:15 a.m., on April 11, 1964. Mr. Reis asked that they be furnished with any additional information coming to our attention which would be of interest in connection with the Attorney General's trip. Of course, this will be done. The Department has been advised by memoranda concerning information received from the Norfolk Police Department indicating a possible threat to the Attorney General on the part of a disgruntle citizen in Norfolk. In addition, the Attorney General has been advised of anonymous calls to the "Washington Daily News" and the Norfolk Police Department indicating one allegedly has threatened to bomb the memorial services in Norfolk. will leave Andrews Field on the morning of April 14 for Ottawa, Canada. He will meet with Prime Minister Pearson and Minister of Justice Guy Favreau on April 14 in Ottawa. The wife of the Attorney General will accompany him to Canada.

While in Ottawa the Attorney General will be recognized in the House of Commons. He will travel from Ottawa to Toronto on the afternoon of April 14 where he will address the Canadian Press Dinner in the Royal York Hotel. According to Guthman, the Attorney General will leave Toronto late on the afternoon of April 14 and return to Washington by way of New York and Andrews Field.

Guthman has advised that the complete itinerary of the Attorney General has been furnished to the RCMP.

ACTION:

Our liaison representative in Ottawa is aware of the Attorney General's contemplated trip to Canada and has been advised that no specific requests have been received from the Attorney General. 

The attached post card was sent to the Director anonymously from Miami Beach, Florida. The card/ reads as follows:

"April 30, 1964

Dear Sir.

There are only 2 blemishes on your 40-year record with the FBL 2 men 30 died whose lives you could have saved.

In 1941 Lepke surrendered to you personally on your promise that he would be tried by the U.S. instead, you turned him over to NY and B.A. Dewey whose life Lepke had spared when he ordered Dutch Schultz removed. Dewey sent him to the chair in 1944 as part of his campaign for President.

Lepke's loss was not a great one to the U.S. but in 1963 America lost its greatest leader since for when your Agents bungled the Lee Oswald case, it was a great victory for the Reds.

Oswald's widow has received \$60,000 in contributions, a woman who could have saved JFK with one phone call. I certainly hope that you are checking every person - left or right wing - who has seen fit to disgrace our country by sending her money.

They shot the wrong Kennedy, stop letting Bobby use the FBI like the Gestapo. John Knight of the Miami Herald can tell you what I mean.

Wally stated that he had previously alerted the Farmville Police Chief Otto Overton,

His brother is Jack Overton, the First Deputy Sheriff of Prince Edward County, Virginia, who was also alerted to be on the lookout for any potential trouble. After talking with both of the Overtons said that they had checked extensively in Farmville today, and had received no information concerning any threats to the safety of the Attorney General or any possible trouble in connection with his visit.

Mally said they have been in touch with the local police and have worked closely with them in setting up security and precautionary procedures. Sixteen uniform officers and four plain clothes officers from the police department will be on duty. The latter four will be mingling with the crowd and equipped with radios tuned to the police frequency. The Bureau cars will be tuned to that frequency. A sufficient number of Agents with cars will be assigned to cover the affair. Seven or eight Virginia State Troopers will be on the scene directing traffic and available if trouble ensues.

Nally is of the opinion sufficient law enforcement personnel are available and already assigned to cover this parade on Monday; however, on 5-10-64, a meeting will be held with representatives of all agencies affected to iron out last minute problems.



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

The Attorney General is returning directly to Washington from Georgia and is scheduled to arrive at Andrews Air Force Base about 6:00 p.m. The Attorney General's secretary was unaware of the reason for the Attorney General advancing the time of his return to Washington. She said he had promised Duke University to reschedule his appearance there next fall.

Within a short time after the call from the Attorney General's Office, ASAC Walters of the Charlotte Division advised information had been received by our Senior Resident Agent at Durham, North Carolina, from officials at Duke University that the Attorney General's appearance there had been canceled. The Charlotte Division is therefore aware that the Attorney General will not be visiting in their territory tomorrow.

SUBJECT: VISIT OF ATTORNEY GENERAL ROBERT F KENNEDY TO CARROLLTON, GEORGIA, MAY 26, 1964 INFORMATION CONCERNING

> During the Attorney General's recent visit to Carrollton, Georgia, our Atlanta Office has indicated that during the question and answer program inquiry was made of the Attorney General as to what was being done about La Cosa Mostra. He said that the convictions are up 700 per cent. The Director inquired as to the correctness of this figure.

It appears that the basis for the inquiry is in Attorney General's report to the President on the Federal fight against organized crime and racketeering dated January 3. This report advises of the number of racketeering indictments, the number of individuals indicted and the number of individuals convicted. It reveals that convictions numbered 45 in 1960, 73 in 1961, 138 in 1962 and 288 in 1963. Nowhere in the report are these convictions identified as being members of La Cosa Nostra. This can figuratively be interpreted as nearly a 700 per cent increase during the period 1960 through 1963.

It is known from previous discussion with representatives of the Department's Organized Crime and Racketeering Section that they have lumped into the figure reflecting racketeering convictions all such action which took place in Labor Management Relations cases, any conviction of a member of the Teamsters, as well as any conviction in gambling matters.

The Dallas Office additionally advised the Director shortly after 2:00 p.m. that day that the President had died. The Director immediately called the Attorney General once again and told him of the death of his brother. At this time the Director inquired as to whether the Attorney General planned to go to Dallas. The Director stated that he had advised the Attorney General that if such plans were in the making he would facilitate his departure and arrival. The Director told Manchester that shortly thereafter our Dallas Office called once again to indicate that the President's body would be immediately flown back to Washington and that the Vice President had already been sworn in as President. The Director later called the Attorney General once again and told him that the FBI was moving into the investigation. The Director advised Manchester that the FBI took this action despite the fact that there was no law making it a Federal violation to assassinate the President.

At this point the Director gave Manchester a brief history of the assassination of SAC Shanahan in Chicago, Illinois, in the middle 1920's. There was no Federal law against assaulting or murdering an FBI Agent at that time. The Director told Manchester he initiated action to make it a Federal crime to assault or kill an FBI Agent so that proper action could be taken in Federal court rather than a local court in such matters.

The Director told Manchester that if the FBI had taken custody of Lee Harvey Oswald, Jr., Oswald would never have been killed by Jack Ruby. The Director stated that the murder of Oswald by Ruby naturally gave rise to considerable speculation and rumor. All of this could have been avoided had the Dallas police taken proper action to protect Oswald.

The Director told Manchester that the FBI immediately entered the case, despite non-jurisdiction, and that we interviewed Oswald as soon as he was made available. The Director stated that on the evening of November 22, 1963, at approximately 7:25 p.m., President Johnson called him at his home and requested that the FBI take complete charge of the case involving the assassination. The Director stated he advised the President that the FBI had already entered the case and that we would, of course, go all out in this matter. The Director also told the President that he was concerned about the great amount of publicity coming out of Dallas.

The Director then told Manchester that the Dallas police had given cut considerable information received as a result of FBI findings, particularly from cur Laboratory. He added that on the 4th or 5th day following the assassination he instructed our SAC in Dallas to contact Chief of Police Curry and order him to make no further statements to the press with respect to the evidence or investigation surrounding the assassination. The Director told Manchester that this Chief of Police could have told

him to go to hell; however, he had recognized the obvious necessity and logic of such instructions and had complied. The Director explained to Manchester at some length the necessity to keep physical evidence confined prior to the prosecution of an individual.

The Director told Manchester that on Saturday evening, November 23, 1963, our Dallas Office had received an anonymous telephone call indicating that plans had been made to murder Oswald when he was removed from the Dallas City Jail. The FBI informed the Dallas Chief of Police immediately. The Director told Manchester that original plans for removal of Oswald had been made for 10:00 p.m. that Saturday night. The Chief of Police, however, changed these plans by acceding to the pressure of the press that Oswald be removed at a convenient time so that communications media could cover the event. Our Dallas Office again called the Dallas Police Department on Sunday morning, November 24, 1963, and reminded that Department of the same anonymous telephone call. At that time the Chief of Police assured our Dallas Office that all precautions were being taken to protect Oswald.

The Director informed Manchester that following the President's call at 7:25 p.m., November 22, 1963, he gave specific instructions that the FBI do everything possible to thoroughly investigate this case. The Director stated that additional personnel were immediately sent to Dallas. He told Manchester this was necessary inasmuch as our Dallas Office and FBI Headquarters, as well as other offices, received hundreds and hundreds of phone calls, telegrams and letters setting forth leads in this case.

Manchester inquired as to whether the Director placed any significance to the anonymous phone call concerning the plan to murder Oswald. The Director replied that we had no way of knowing at the time whether any importance should be attached or not; however, we did have the responsibility to immediately notify the Dallas police, which we did.

The Director characterized Jack Ruby as somewhat of a "police buff." As a result of his friendship with a number of police officers he had easy accessibility to the Dallas Police Department. The Director stated that he did not know whether Ruby's reported insanity was of the sincere or faked type inasmuch as we were not psychiatrists. He stated that Ruby had given the excuse that he had killed Oswald because of his obvious affection for the late President and the fact that he wanted to prevent any further sorrow to Mrs. Kennedy inasmuch as she would necessarily have to return to Dallas and testify against Oswald.

Manchester inquired as to the exact location of the Director at the time Oscald was killed on Sunday, November 24, 1963. The Director replied that he was at home. He stated that the Dallas Office contacted him immediately following this event. Manchester inquired as to the Director's immediate reaction. The Director replied that his first hought was how such an event could take place, particularly under a system of civilized justice. The Director added that he had ordered an immediate check on Jack Ruby and particularly to ascertain if there had been a relationship between Ruby and Oswald.

Manchester inquired as to whether the Director was watching television at the time of Oswald's murder. The Director replied in the negative. He stated he was working on official papers at the time. The Director added that he usually saved Sundays to review lengthy documents and memoranda as well as to prepare himself for interviews, hearings, etc.

Manchester inquired as to what the Director was doing on Friday morning, November 22, 1963, prior to the assassination. The Director replied that he was conducting business as usual, that he had had a number of interviews that particular morning.

Manchester inquired as to the physical location of the wire service ticker machine. He was told that it is located across the hall and that pertinent wire service items are brought in to the Director immediately.

The Director told Manchester that his first conversation on November 22, 1963, with our Dallas Office occurred at approximately 1:48 p.m. The Director was advised at that time that the President was not believed to be dead yet but that he had suffered a mortal wound. The Director mentioned that on the occasion of his second call to the Attorney General, the Attorney General had indicated that he had also been in touch with a number of the Presidential Staff and had been informed of a number of details concerning the shooting and the fact that the President had died.

Manchester inquired as to the Director's opinion of the Attorney General's reaction upon being informed that the President had been shot. The Director replied that the Attorney General had been silent for a few moments and had then requested that the Director keep him informed of any further facts received concerning this matter. The Director told Manchester that the Attorney General is usually very quiet in manner until he has all the necessary facts of a given situation. The Director stated that the attorney General was not the explosive type unless he became angry.

Manchester told the Director that the President's call to the Director at 7:25 p.m., November 22, 1963, appeared to be one of the first calls that the President made upon returning to Washington that evening. The Director replied that he would surmise that this was correct. The Director added that our investigation proceeded forthwith; however, it was not until Monday or Tuesday of the following week that the President decided to name a Presidential Commission to look into the assassination. The Director told Manchester that an FBI report had been sent to the Warren Commission within ten days after the President had set up this body. The Director stated that he personally had appeared before the Warren Commission and that he considered their questioning of him to be quite thorough. He stated that thoroughness was necessary on the part of the Commission inasmuch as this would serve to assist in quelling gossip and epeculation in the future. The Director quickly added, however, that rumors will continue concerning this case, especially in Europe where there is widespread gossip concerning a supposed conspiracy, for many years.

The Director told Manchester that the statement that some of the information may be withheld by the Warren Commission naturally gave rise to further rumer. Manchester replied that he could understand the Chief Justice's statement in this regard inasmuch as not just any individual should be allowed to look at the classified material sent to the Commission by some agencies. The Director replied that the issue in point is such that excessive precautions of security is unwise. The Director explained that he had never been a great believer in wasteful precautions or going overboard regarding excessive security. He stated that an item is either classified or else it isn't classified. The Director gave examples of leaks in Government that have given several Presidents extreme cause and worry. He stated that the FBI is usually called upon to investigate these leaks, however, newspapermen naturally do not desire to reveal their sources. The Director stated that if newspapermen did reveal such sources that quite naturally the sources would dry up.

Manchester inquired of the Director as to whether the assassination case became one of major concern following the President's call at 7:25 p.m., November 22, 1963. The Director stated that as he had previously indicated, the FBI had already entered this case. He added, however, that after the President's call we went all out in doing such things as working around the clock, sending a Washington-based FBI official to Dallas and adding approximately 30 Agents to the Dallas personnel complement. The Director stated that we still have at least 50 men who are tied up in running down leads on this particular case throughout the FBI's service. He stated that this case will never be closed from an investigative point of view inasmuch as we will continually receive leads, nany from mental cases, which necessarily have to be checked out.

Manchester asked if the matter of a President being assassinated not being a Federal crime had ever been discussed fully by the Congress, or anyone else, according to the Director's knowledge. The Director replied that there had been no discussion to any extent. He stated the matter had just never been considered.

Manchester inquired as to whether the FBI had prior material on Oswald refore the assassination. The Director replied that we did have some information regarding Oswald, however, it was quite flimsy in nature. The Director then explained at some length the background of Oswald. He told Manchester of the press releases that Oswald made in Moscow. He told Manchester of Oswald's employment in a factory in Minsk, Russia, and of the fact that Oswald had later returned to Moscow. The Director stated that he certainly did not understand why the Department of State had failed to have Oswald sign an affidavit forfeitting his American citizenship at the time Oswald returned to Moscow and visited the U. S. Embassy. Manchester spoke up and stated that the State Department claimed they had wanted to find out if Oswald had committed an extraditable crime in the Soviet Union, therefore, no signed affidavit was taken from him. The Director again deplored the failure to have such an affidavit executed.

The Director continued that we had interviewed Oswald within two or three days following his arrival in the United States. He explained that we, of course, desired to find out if Oswald had been recruited as an intelligence agent by the Soviet Union. The Director told Manchester that this did not appear to be true. He added that Oswald had classified himself as a Marxist rather than a communist. The Director added that Oswald had later been interviewed in New Orleans after getting into a street squabble with anti-Castroites over leaflets being handed out by Oswald. The Director told Manchester that Oswald could best be termed a "Ioner." He explained Oswald's communications with the Communist Party in the United States but added that Oswald had never joined the Party. The Director told of the incidents surrounding Oswald's attempt to kill General Walker in Dallas. He added that Oswald's wife, Marina, had advised us of this incident following the assassination. The Director summarized this part of the interview by indicating there appeared to be nothing in Oswald's background which would reflect that he was a man of violence and most certainly nothing which indicated that Oswald had any intentions of assassinating the President.

Manchester asked if the Director did not find it odd that Mrs. Oswald had failed to tell anyone about the attempted assassination of General Walker until after the murder of President Kennedy. The Director replied that he did not find this odd in view of the cold relationship between Oswald and his wife, the language barrier on the part of Mrs. Oswald and the fact that Mrs. Oswald did not have the natural instincts of an American woman but to the contrary had a different attitude altogether. He stated he placed no significance in Mrs. Oswald's failure to advise of this incident prior to the assassination.

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The Director told Manchester that it was extremely difficult to speculate on the motivations of Oswald to kill the President. The Director stated it was entirely possible Oswald may have wanted to kill Governor John Connally. He explained that Oswald had written communications to Governor Connally protesting his particular type of discharge from the U. S. Marine Corps. The Director added that President Kennedy was an intellectual liberal type. He stated that President Kennedy had been desirous of keeping peace with honor. He stated that President Kennedy desired peaceful co-existence——American style. The Director added that the President, although he had been firm in his dealings with Khrushchev, had a fairly good relationship with Khrushchev and the Soviet Union. The Director summed up by stating that Oswald could not have desired to kill the President because the President had dealt harshly, or spoken harshly, against the Communist Party and Chairman Khrushchev.

Manchester speculated that perhaps the communists, including Oswald, did not like the relationship between the late President and Khrushchev; therefore, the communists desired to do away with President Kennedy so that this obstacle to their desired philosophy could be removed. The Director replied that this was entirely possible; however, he wanted Manchester to clearly understand that Khrushchev was not a person to be trusted and that Chairman Khrushchev had a very cold and evil mind. The Director, at this point, gave examples of Khrushchev's understanding of the English language despite the fact that he had Groyanovsky, an excellent interpreter, with him at all times while on his visits to the United States. The Director told Manchester that he had always felt it better to kick individuals like Khrushchev on the shins once in a while rather than to boot-lick them. The Director explained that Khrushchev was basically an oriental and that individuals opposing orientals usually lost face in the oriental's opinion when fear or trepidation was shown.

Manchester inquired as to whether the Director's duties and responsibilities allowed him to participate personally in the funeral ceremonies. The Director replied in the negative. He stated he had been at his desk constantly. He added that he had issued instructions that FBI personnel participate officially in the ceremonies by assisting Secret Service as much as possible. The Director spoke of the many visiting foreign dignitaries and of the dangers involved in the march from the White House to St. Matthew's Cathedral. He told Manchester that over 40 Special Agents had been assigned to assist Secret Service, particularly at St. Matthew's Cathedral. He further told Manchester that the authority to protect the President was clearly a function of the Secret Service; however, since the assassination we have assisted when called upon. The Director briefly advised Manchester at this point of the immediate widespread ramifications of this case following the actual shooting. He told Manchester that leads had spread to Mexico as well as throughout the entire United States. Therefore, it has been necessary for him personally to remain at his desk so as to supervise this matter.

Memo, Baumgardner to Sullivan, 7/7/64, stated New York Office advised that new book by Frank A. Capell entitled "The Strange Death of Marilyn Monroe," which alleges that Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy had an intimate relationship with Miss Monroe, would be ready for sale about 7/10/64.

Kennedy's Friendship with Miss Monroe "Well Known"

The New York Office has now furnished us with a copy of this 70-page book. The book claims that Miss Monroe's involvement with Kennedy 'was wellknown to her friends and reporters in the Hollywood area, "but was neverpublicized. It is alleged that "there are person-to-person telephone calls, living witnesses, tape recordings and certain writings to attest the closeness of their friendship."

The author suggests that Miss Monroe "was led to believe his intentions were serious," and that Kennedy had promised to divorce his wife and marry her. When he failed to do so, the book charges, she "threatened to expose their relationship," which would have rulned his presidential aspirations. It was then that Kennedy decided "to take drastic action."

Kennedy Had Communists "Murder" Miss Monroe

According to the book, Kennedy used 'the Communist Conspiracy which is expert in the scientific elimination of its enemies" to dispose of Miss Monroe by making her murder appear to be a suicide. This could have been achieved without great difficulty, the author points out, because her personal physician, Dr. Hyman Engelberg, was a communist. 1117-51387-


References to Director and FBI

There are several references in the book to the Director and/or the FBI. A biographical sketch of Capell on page 3 states that, while associated with the Westchester County, New York, Sherifi's Office, "he supervised the investigation of over five thousand individuals and organizations, including Nazis, Fascists and Communists, on behalf of the F.B.I. in most cases."

On page 49, it is stated that "under the direction of Bobby Kennedy the F.B.I. has been frustrated as never before."

On page 69, it is said that Mr. Hoover does not share Kennedy's opinion that the Communist Party, USA, "is a windmill virtually powerless to harm the United States."

On page 70, reference is made to an anonymous letter quoted in a column of Walter Winchell datelined May 25, 1964, at Hollywood, California, which told of a 23-year-old Beverly Hills blonde who had been "terrorized for months by the same person who caused Marilyn Monroe's death... You can check this with F.B.I. Special Agent in Charge, Mr. Grapp in L.A.... Her initials are M.J."

INTERVIEW ON CBS-TV, CHANNEL 9

8-24-64

At approximately 8:00 p.m., last night, the Attorney General was interviewed on CBS-TV (Channel 9).

Briefly, the Attorney General made general statements concerning progress made in the civil rights field. In response to an inquiry regarding what else the Federal Government could do in this field, the Attorney General advised that not only the Federal Government but citizens themselves should take an active role. Individuals could do this by treating their neighbors properly, and educating our younger people to respect other people.

In response to the inquiry as to whether there is presently a new atmosphere, as explained by Carl Sanders (ph) of Georgia, as compared with four years ago, the Attorney General advised that there was a new atmosphere everywhere. That people are now aware that the civil rights problem is one that must be faced by the whole country.

The Attorney General advised he will be at the Democratic Convention on Thursday and will be attending the social affair given by former Governor Harriman. He also noted that he was going to New York today, 8/25/64, and when asked why, he stated, "To make an announcement." When pressed as to what he meant by this statement, he refused to elaborate.
