### Huntsville, Alabama

#### **Demographics**<sup>1</sup>

#### **Programs/Initiatives**

- High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA) Designated in 1996, the Gulf Coast HIDTA is responsible for counties in Louisiana, Mississippi, and Alabama, including Madison.
- Partnership for a Drug-Free Community, Inc.<sup>6</sup> Organized in 1988, the Partnership for a Drug-Free Community is a private, nonprofit organization that serves as the coordinating agency for drug and alcohol prevention programs in Madison County. Trained volunteers teach programs designed to raise awareness about the harms of drugs and alcohol and educate youth on how to refuse alcohol, drugs and tobacco.
- ➢ Parents Education Network (PEN) Show<sup>7</sup>

The Partnership for a Drug-Free Community has developed the PEN Show to air once a week (Tuesdays at 6:30 p.m.) on a local cable channel (Channel 3) for the purpose of providing parents with advice and information on issues such as youth substance abuse.

➢ All Stars<sup>8</sup>

The goal of the All Stars program is to delay the onset of alcohol, tobacco and drug use. The Department of Education has named all Stars a Best Practice Program.

#### Enforcement

- > The Huntsville Police Department K-9 Unit employs seven dual-purpose patrol/narcotic teams and one single-purpose bomb team.<sup>21</sup>
- ▶ As of October 31, 2001, there were 524 full-time law enforcement employees in Huntsville (360 officers and 164 civilians).<sup>22</sup>

#### Courts

 $\blacktriangleright$  Drug Courts<sup>23</sup>

As of May 2003, there was one drug court that was recently implemented and one drug court being planned in Huntsville.

#### Treatment

> There are two treatment programs in Huntsville funded by the Substance Abuse Services Division of the Alabama Department of Mental Health-Mental Retardation: Huntsville/Madison Mental Health (MH) Center and The Pathfinder, Inc.<sup>24</sup>

- In FY 2001-2002, there were 762 clients in the Huntsville/Madison MH Center and 60 clients in The Pathfinder, Inc.<sup>25</sup>
- More than 27% of those being treated at the Huntsville/Madison MH Center had marijuana as their primary drug of abuse.<sup>26</sup>
