Programs/Initiatives

- High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA)⁶ The Arizona Partnership was designated in 1990 as part of the Southwest Border HIDTA. This region has 350 miles of largely unsecured international border. The Arizona Partnership is responsible for 8 Arizona counties, including Maricopa.
- Crime Free Multi-Housing Program⁷ The Phoenix Crime Free Multi-Housing Program was designed to help residents, owners, and managers of rental property keep drugs and other illegal activities off their property. The Phoenix Police Department offers free seminars about the Crime Free Multi-Housing Program to those interested.
- Methamphetamine Community Awareness Program⁸ The Phoenix Police Department Methamphetamine Community Awareness Program "What's Cookin' in Your Neighborhood?" was initiated to educate the public about the methamphetamine drug problem in neighborhoods and the city. The program produced an educational video about how to detect a "meth" lab and how to respond.

Additional Phoenix arrestee drug use data for 2003 indicate that 48.4% of the adult male arrestees used marijuana within the past year. Among those reporting past year marijuana use, the drug was used an average of 9.3 days within the past month.²⁴

During 2003, 46.9% of adult female arrestees in Phoenix reported past year use of marijuana. Among the female arrestees who reported past year use of marijuana, the average number of days the substance was used in the past month was 9.2 days²⁵

In 2001, law enforcement uncovered an OxyContin prescription fraud group operating in the Phoenix area. More than 20 individuals were involved in the organization.²⁶

Drugs

➤ Cocaine

Powder cocaine is consistently available throughout the Phoenix area.²⁷ Powder cocaine prices range from \$600-\$800/ounce to \$14,000-\$17,000/kilogram. Prices for crack cocaine range from \$20/rock to \$100-\$250/gram.²⁸ Crack purity levels in Phoenix range from 50% to 90%.²⁹

➢ Heroin

Black tar heroin remains the most frequently used form of heroin among the traditional heroin users in Phoenix.³⁰ While Mexican black tar heroin is the predominate type of heroin found in Phoenix, Mexican brown powdered heroin is also readily available.³¹ Heroin prices range from \$80/gram to \$950-\$1,000/ounce to \$42,000-\$50,000/kilogram.³²

Marijuana

Marijuana prices range from \$75-\$150/ounce to \$500-\$700/pound.³³

> Methamphetamine

During the 2nd quarter of FY 2003, the DEA reported that 31 children were present at clandestine drug labs in Phoenix. Methamphetamine sells for \$5,000-6,000/pound and "ice" sells for \$9,000/pound and \$600/ounce.³⁴ Methamphetamine sold for \$425/ounce in Phoenix.³⁵

Club Drugs

Wholesale MDMA prices in the Phoenix area range from \$5.50 to \$10.50/tablet. The tablets are then sold for \$15-\$30 retail.³⁶ PMA is reportedly being sold in the city as ecstasy. GHB is also available in Phoenix and sells for \$5-\$10/dose (one teaspoon) and \$425 for 25 pounds. LSD is "readily available" in Phoenix and sells for \$4/dose and \$140-150/bottle containing approximately 90 doses.³⁷

Diverted Pharmaceuticals

The Phoenix DEA Diversion Group reports that the most commonly abused pharmaceutical drugs in the area are Vicodin, Lortab, and other hydrocodone products. Prices for diverted pharmaceuticals include: \$20-25/40-milligram OxyContin tablet; \$5/Percocet tablet; \$5/Vicodin tablet; \$4/10-milligram Valium tablet; \$5-6/10 milligrams of Lortab; and \$2/Soma tablet.³⁸

Juveniles

- As part of the 2002 Arizona Youth Survey, 3,354 students from Maricopa County were surveyed. Approximately 24% (24.4%) of Maricopa County seniors, 18.9% of 10th graders, and 13.7% of 8th graders reported being drunk or high at school within the past year.³⁹
- More than 10% (10.2%) of Maricopa County seniors, 9.6% of 10th graders, and 5.3% of 8th graders reported that they have sold illegal drugs within the past year.⁴⁰
- Approximately 30% of the high school seniors surveyed reported using a drug within the past month.⁴¹

Enforcement

Drug Enforcement Bureau⁴⁴

The Drug Enforcement Bureau of the Phoenix Police Department is responsible for the investigation and suppression of illegal drugs in Phoenix. This bureau is also involved in the interdiction of drug trafficking through the Sky Harbor International Airport and shipping facilities throughout the city.

- Commercial Narcotics Interdiction Program⁴⁵ Administered by the Phoenix Police Department, this task force is made up of Federal, State, and local officers organized to identify, arrest, and prosecute drug traffickers using commercial transportation and air freight/parcel companies to transport drugs and money for drug purchases.
- ➢ Forensic Analysis Program⁴⁶

Administered by the Phoenix Police Department, the Forensic Analysis Program provides Phoenix and Commercial Interdiction task force members with scientific support required for efficient court adjudication of drug-related cases. During FY 2003, the Phoenix Police Department Laboratory received 7,550 drug samples for analysis, an average of 629 samples per month. More than 18,000 analyses of the samples were made during FY 2003.

- During 2002, the approximate costs for cleaning up the clandestine methamphetamine labs in the Phoenix area was \$743,000.⁴⁷
- As of October 31, 2002, there were 3,628 full-time law enforcement employees in Phoenix (2,773 officers and 855 civilians).⁴⁸

Trafficking and Seizures

- Phoenix is a primary distribution center and drug transit area because of its close proximity and easy access to the Arizona-Sonora, Mexico border. Multi-ton quantities of cocaine and marijuana and increasingly large quantities of methamphetamine and heroin are smuggled into the city for eventual transportation and distribution throughout the country.⁴⁹
- The DEA's Phoenix Division participated in an investigation named "Operation X-Out," that focused on dismantling organizations that produced and distributed club drugs. The investigation discovered that a number of drugs, including ecstasy, cocaine, marijuana, crack cocaine, methamphetamine, heroin and prescription drugs were being distributed out of numerous bars and clubs.⁵⁰
- During FY 2003, the Commercial Narcotics Interdiction Program seized 2,316 pounds of cannabis.⁵¹

Courts

➢ Drug Courts⁵²

As of May 2004, there were 2 drug courts in Phoenix that had been operating for more than 2 years and 1 drug court that had recently been implemented. There were no additional drug courts being planned in Phoenix.

Maricopa County Attorney's Office Special Crimes, Gang, Homicide, Trial and Drug Diversion Bureaus⁵³

The primary objective of this unit is to coordinate and cooperate with all county law enforcement and prosecutorial agencies to increase the apprehension and conviction of drug offenders, and seize forfeitable assets. This unit focuses on major, multi-jurisdictional offenders, increased asset seizures, reduction in local user demand for drugs and enhanced operational effectiveness. Since FY 1991, this unit has concluded 89,514 drug cases.

Corrections

- Maricopa County Drug Enforcement Detention Strategy⁵⁴
 - Administered by the Maricopa County Sheriff's Office, this program enhances the Maricopa County jail system by providing 8 full-time detention officers allowing the jail to respond to increasing drug arrests and daily drug violator inmate population demands.
- During 2002, the average daily inmate population at the Maricopa County jail was 7,892, a 20% increase from 1999 to 2002. The number of inmates in the jail on drug or drug-related charges makes up a substantial portion of the population.⁵⁵

- Approximately 118,755 inmates were processed at the Maricopa County jail during 2002.⁵⁶
- Approximately 75% (n=13,559) of the admissions to the Treatment Alternatives to Street Crime Juvenile Probation Program in Maricopa County from 1989 to March 2003 were admitted for marijuana treatment.⁵⁷

Consequences of Use

During 2002, there were 10,292 drug-related episodes reported to the Drug Abuse Warning Network (DAWN) by emergency departments (ED) in Phoenix. Cocaine was mentioned 1,727 times in the Phoenix ED episodes.⁵⁸

During 2002, the Maricopa County Medical Examiner's Office reported 132 methamphetamine-related deaths, 116 cocaine-related deaths, and 103 heroin-related deaths.⁵⁹

During 2002, there were 516 drug-related deaths reported to DAWN by Medical Examiners (ME) in the Phoenix area. Cocaine was mentioned 209 times in the drug-related deaths.⁶⁰
