y. The last thing Ho wants is Chinese occupation."

Every day that the United States continues to intervene increases the danger of intervention by the Chinese, since China and Vietnam are neighbors. The war in Vietnam could escalate into general war with China and World War III.

THERE ARE OTHER THINGS at stake in the continued American aggression in Vietnam in addition to the lives and freedom of the Vietnamese people, important as these are. It is perhaps impossible for most Americans to compare their present responsibility to speak out against the war in Vietnam with the responsibility of the Germans to speak out in the early days of Hitler. Everyone knows that we have no Hitlers here, in power or close to power. But one wonders what limits there are to the atrocities Americans will go along with, so long as they are explained, however falsely, as necessary for the maintenance of democracy.

Arthur Miller, whose recent play, Incident at Vichy, deals with Nazi persecutions of the Jews, has written: "Who among us knew enough to be shocked, let alone to protest at the photographs of the Vietnamese torturing Vietcong prisoners, which our press has published? The Vietnamese are wearing United States equipment, are paid by us and could not torture without us. There is no way around this—the prisoner crying out in agony is our prisoner." (New York Times Magazine, January 3, 1965)

The prospects for the future are terrifying if those of us who live in the most powerful nation in the world, a nation loaded with money and overkill, fail to do what we say the Germans should have done when atrocities were being committed in their name and with their knowledge.

F MUST INSIST on immediate withdrawal of all U.S. troops from Vietnam, even though the situation may remain a tragic one. Many problems will remain, but withdrawal of U.S. troops will provide the way remain at the people of South Vietnam can become masters of their own destiny. Then the way will be open for genuine negotiations about the problems of Southeast Asia, as distinct from manipulation by outside powers, and for friendly aid to the stricken peoples of the region, if they ask for it. Delaration

Of Conscience

Because the use of the military resources of the United States in Vietnam and elsewhere suppresses the aspirations of the people for political independence and economic freedom;

Because inhuman torture and senseless killing are being carried out by forces armed, uniformed, trained and financed by the United States;

Because we believe that all peoples of the earth, including both Americans and non-Americans, have an inalienable right to life, liberty, and the peaceful pursuit of happiness in their own way; and

Because we think that positive steps must be taken to put an end to the threat of nuclear catastrophe and death by chemical orbiological warfare, whether these result from accident or escalation—

We hereby declare our conscientious refusal to cooperate with the United States government in the prosecution of the war in Vietnam.

We encourage those who can conscientiously do so to refuse to serve in the armed forces and to ask for discharge if they are already in.

Those of us who are subject to the draft ourselves declare our own intention to refuse to serve.

We urge others to refuse and refuse ourselves to talmourt in the manufacture wert transportation of military equipment, or to work in the fields of military research and weapons development.

We shall encourage the development of other nonviolent acts, including acts which involve civil disobedience, in order to stop the flow of American soldiers and munitions to Vietnam.

NOTE: Signing or distributing this Declaration of Conscience might be construed as a violation of the Universal Military Training and Service Act, which prohibits advising persons facing the draft to refuse service. Penalties of up to 5 years imprisonment, and/or a fine of \$5,000 are provided. While prosecutions under this provision of the law almost never occur, persons signing or distributing this declaration should face the possibility of serious consequences.





These records reflected that FROMM is married; that he is about 40 years of age and has no children. FROMM is listed as a psychologist and it is reported that he has a bank account at the National City Bank of New York, lllth Street and Broadway, New York City.

An inquiry was conducted at the International Institute of Social Research, 90 Morningside Drive, New York City, but due to the nature of this institute, it was not deemed advisable to make an investigation regarding FROMM.





This brings me to the subject of the consular treaty. I wrote to several senators and I received variest answers. Many of them did not satisfy me, some of them did. Under the circumstances the treaty might not get ratified anyhow. I surely hope not, because I think it is timely wrong and all to often it is one way road, all take for the communists, and nothing for the free world.

If it is determined that the program of the ISL is being followed by the SP-SDF, under the domination of the former ISL members, consideration will be given to conducting active investigation of the SP-SDF by the Bureau. (100-429425-69)

In 1958, Fromm sponsored the New York Committee for a Sane Nuclear Policy. (100-391697-534) He also sponsored the Bay Area Students Legal Aid Fund of the Bay Area Students Committee for Abolition of the House Committee on Un-American Activities which organization is presently under Bureau investigation for communist infiltration. (100-433929-2)

In 1955, two Mexican informants advised that a Communist Party member indicated to another Party member that she was studying for a Masters Degree in psychiatry and was contacting Fromm in connection with her studies. She was reprimanded and told that Fromm was anticommunist and she should have nothing to do with him. [100-416-61-62]

In 1946, Fromm was friendly with two individuals described by Elizabeth Bentley as having furnished her information for her Soviet espionage apparatus. (62-6052-30966)

In 1943, it was reliably reported that Fromm was considered as a possible lecturer by the Organizing Committee of the Jefferson School of Social Science, which organization was included on the list of organizations designated by the Attorney General pursuant to Executive Order 10450. (62-60527-30966)

- ...promote, through objective and nondenominational study, understanding of the significance and way of living discoverable through the life and teaching of Jesus of Nazareth.
- (2) ...conduct seminars and conferences in furtherance of said purpose;
- (3) ...to administer all real and personal property without gain, profit, or dividend to any member of the corporation, and
- (4) ...to engage in any business or other activity incidental to the main purposes of the corporation PROVIDED that the corporation not carry on propaganda or otherwise attempt to influence legislation.

ERICH FROMM

Since both Build the Earth and the National Initiative Foundation leaders assign works by Erich Fromm, the source read his works and critiques extensively and researched his associations.

Erich Fromm studied sociology and psychology at the Universities of Munich, Frankfort, and Heidlberg. He was trained in psychoanalysis at the Psychoanalytic Institute in Berlin. Since 1926, he has been engaged in theoretical investigation and consulting psychology and has lectured at Columbia, Yale, Bennington, the William White Institute for Psychiatry, and the New School for Social Research. In 1963, includes a professor of psychology at NYU and professor of psychoanalysis at the National University of Mexico where he still lives.

Noted humanist philosopher, CORLISS LAMONT, a member of the American Humanist Association, lists Fromm as a naturalistic humanist and also as a "humanist psychologist" together with ABRAHAM H. MASLOW. In fact Lamont says that Maslow and Fromm provide churches a way to "save face" by stating that religious experiences are possible in a naturalized and humanized setting and that eventually the churches, which have battled humanism so fiercely, may try to say that Fromm and Maslow's ideas are what they meant all the time. In Lamont's opinion Erich Fromm is one of the contemporary leaders of "humanism." Fromm states that "Marxism is humanism" and has as its goal the full realization of the potentialities of man. He pleas for Marxist thought to incorporate a "dialectically and humanistically oriented psychoanalysis." He further states that Marxism needs such a theory and that psychoanalysis needs to incorporate genuine Marxist theory.

Among Erich Fromm's most noted works is The Art of Loving in which he states that the principle of love and the principle of capitalism are incompatible.

Erich Fromm, The Art of Loving, New York, N.Y.: Colophon Paperback Edition, Harper & Row, 1962, p. 131.

In another leading work, Revolution of Hope, he blueprints a plan for changing the world through clubs, groups, and "the movement." In this book he advocates a substitute for religious and patriotic formulae in schools and instructs the "movement" on how to become involved in city, local, regional, and national affairs in order to further the movement's goals. In an international symposium called Socialist Humanism of which he is the editor, he writes a chapter on "The Application of Humanist Psychoanalysis to Marx's Theory."

In the work Erich Fromm, A Protestant Critique, J. Stanley Glenn, Rh.D., claims that Fromm is popular today since he capitalizes on man's loneliness and his need to "relate to others." Dr. Glen claims that Fromm views Christ as a "social revolutionary" and that he views Christian prostestantism as the religious correlate of capitalism. Glen further accuses Fromm of proposing a substitute religion and of believing that "atheistic mysticism" as a religious form of (humanistic) tradition is the only religion that can free man from authoritarian religion of law.

The "Nathonal Initiative Foundation" and "Build the Earth" have formed an "education task force" to introduce their philosophy and program into the Palo Alto Unified School District. Palo Alto is to be a pilot project.

These two closely affiliated but legally separate organizations are reported by members to be interrelated to another organization known both as "New Sphere" and "Challenge to Change" which meet in many small couples groups as part

Arms or Peace

As anticipated in our last issue, public opinion in the Western world has veered in favor of granting some arms to Israel for self defense purposes. France has already delivered twelve Mystere jet interceptor planes. England and Canada have also changed their former negative attitude and have announced that they, too, would sell arms to Israel in greater quantity. The position of the American government on the issue has not changed officially: the State Department still is of the opinion that arms cannot settle the problem in the Middle East and that other measures, such as the UN Mission to the Middle East are better suited to the achievement of peace in that area. But the United States has abandoned its previous objection to the sale of arms to Israel by France, England, Canada and other Western powers. Thus, the urgency of the issue has been relieved and the arms question may erriem auto a more stage, when it can be seen in a calmer atmosphere and discussed without hysteria.

It is appropriate at this point to place on record the littleknown fact that the clamor for arms as the solution of the Middle East crisis is not as unanimous among Jews as it is presented to be. Both in Israel and in this country, many voices have been heard in opposition to the iron-clad formula that if Israel only had enough arms from the United States to counteract the arms to Egypt from Communist countries, this would not only serve as a deterrent to Arab aggression, but would do away with the threat of an Arab-Israeli war entirely. To be sure, theirs are not official, or even majority voices, but they reflect the views of organizations of historic significance and of individuals of great prestige and deserve consideration, or at least a hearing. In this and in forthcoming issues, the Jewish Newsletter proposes to present the views of these opponents to the general clamor for force as a settlement of the Arab-Israeli conflict.

Exaggerating the Arms Issue

The first and most important of these voices is that of the Jewish Labor Bund, a Labor-Socialist body with a great record of more than two generations of achievements for Jewish labor. The Bund arose at the same time as the Zionist movement, but while the latter reflected the national awakening of the Jewish middle class and its aspiration to national independence based on escape and separation from the Non-Jewish world, the Bund expressed the hopes of Jewish labor and liberals that internationalism and social justice for all will solve the Jewish problem. During the last quarter of this century, the Jewish group as a whole, has tended to follow the nationalist ideology, but the Bund has remained true to its ideals and is the outstanding opponent to nationalism.

Lebensfragen, organ of the Bund in Israel, published in current issue an article entitled Arms or Peace in which opposition to the Israeli-Zionist clamor for arms is stated clearly and dispassionately. The article begins with a strong criticism of the Israeli government and of the Zionists for exaggerating OT the arms issue out of all proportions, and for concentrating all

DANTI-DEFOMOTION LEAGUE Western countries fear a sharpening of the Arab-Israeli tensions. They are afraid of an Arab-Israeli war because they fear that this would enable Russia to penetrate into the Middle East. They are therefore sincerely interested in bringing about a peaceful solution of the Arab-Israeli conflict. Why should the Israeli government not use this opportunity to obtain peace rather than arms? Lebensfragen asks, and concludes that Israel, or at least the Ben Gurion government, does not really want peace. It is maneuvering for peace negotiations "from a position of strength", not for real peace.

Terms of Peace

A similar position is taken by the American section of the Jewish Labor Bund. Writing in Unser Teat (April), organ of the American Bund, editor Dr. Emanuel Scherer says that he is not opposed in principle to the sending of American arms to herei, expecially since the Arab states are receiving arms from the Communist countries. But arms can at best bring only temporary relief and serve as a palliative. What is necessary while there is still time — is not an arms race but a permanent peace settlement between Arabs and Israelis. How is this to be accomplished? Unser Tsait publishes the following peace proposals submitted by the Bund to the Council of the Socialist International which met in Zurich, Switzerland (March 2-4), as a basis for negotiations:

An Arab-Israell peace can be reached only through farreaching concessions by both sides. On the side of Israel, peace depends primarily on her attitude toward the frontier and the Arab refugees problems.

1. To reach a permanent peace, negotiations must be conducted on the basis of readiness to make frontier adjustments.

2. The State of Israel must recognize the moral right of the Arab refugees to repatriation and compensation, and must make effective concessions in the question. Our attitude toward the Arab refugee problem is in agreement with the general principles of democracy. For the Jewish people which in the course of its long martyrdom experienced more than once the bitter fate of the refugee, and has, on more than one occasion, demanded the rights of Jewish refugees for their home and property—the assitude of Israel in the Arab refugee problem is a test of political morality.

3. On the other side, the Arab states too must make concessions. They must stop the boycott, the blockade and other acts of animosity, and establish a truly peaceful co-existence Sojth Israel.

In short, the Bund holds that Zionists and Israelis are overemphasizing the importance of arms and underestimating the importance of peace. Real peace can now be obtained more easily than at any other time before, but only by concessions and compromises on both sides.

The International Antisemitic Conspiracy"

Fayer Sayegh, Deputy Director of the Arab States Deletold a correspondent of the Jewish Newsletter last week the recent charges made by the ADL in the book Cross ints about a new international antisemitic conspiracy and ole of the Arab Information Center (AIC) in it are comly false. He denied that there had been any contact bea any official or employee of the AIC and any known antito mentioned in Cross Currents, and that any of the memis allegedly written by the AIC staff and mentioned or ed in the book ever existed. Dr. Sayegh also stated that AIC had never distributed any antisemitic literature. Publins mentioned in Cross Currents, such as The Story of ist Espionage in Egypt, were not distributed by the Center. latter pamphlet was distributed by the Egyptian Embassy. larly, the Syrian government publication, Tension, Terror Blood in the Holy Land, which was mentioned in a letter he editor of the Jewish Newsletter in the issue of February was never circulated by the AIC.

a response to questions about visits of the well known antiite, James Madole, to the AIC, Dr. Sayegh pointed out the owing. Madole tried on several occasions to see him. The t few times, Dr. Sayegh did not receive Madole nor did any er member of AIC. On the fifth visit, Dr. Sayegh granted dole a two-minute interview, in which he rejected a request fuell quantities of AIC literature On two other occasions, . Sayegh refused to provide Madole's organization with speakor lecturers from the AIC staff or panel of speakers.

Dr. Sayegh challenged the ADL to produce one piece of antinitic literature which had ever been distributed by the AIC, to bring forward one piece of evidence to prove the existence any connection or coptact between the antisemites mentioned Cross Currents and any member of the Center. He pointed t that the "evidence" presented in Cross Currents which is e basis of all the ADL charges against the Center, was all ted in inter-office memoranda of the ADL or its representatives. This is tantamount to a man being sued by another on the sole asis of evidence in the latter's diary," he charged.

Dr. Sayegh referred to the speech dealing with the same subct he made on Barry Gray's program on March 15 in the purse of which he said:

"The accusation that the Arab Information Center or the Arab States Delegations engaged in antisemitic propaganda directly or indirectly is an accusation that is not borne out even by the ridiculous documentation contained in that book. As far as the Arab States Delegation is concerned, even the contentions which, in the form of conclusions, were heralded with all the hullabuloo and fanfare of a soap opera, were not defended, were not in any way vindicated, by any of the alleged quotations or any of the alleged facts that are contained in the book.

It is a queer thing for a so-called anti-defamation agency to be engaging in defamation and seeking to achieve its purpose through defamation. I would say, it is as queer as a person who seeks to achieve peace through declaring war, or as a person who seeks to achieve freedom through tyranny.

I repeat my challenge to them to prove one single contention they made in that book in any form, shape or manner, at any time; I challenge them to meet me at any public debate, at any public discussion; I challenge them to do that through the press, to do that through the radio or TV, to which they seem to have infinite access - or else to stand convicted of engaging in outright defamation." While we welcome the repudiation of antisemitism on the part of the Arab Information Center, we regret that the AIC evidently does not speak for the individual Arab States affiliated with it. We are certain that Dr. Sayegh's statement would have carried more weight if the representatives of Syria and Saudi Arabia repudiated antisemitism as thoroughly as does the A.I.C. and would discontinue the distribution of such vile antisemitic material as Tensions, Terror and Blood in the Holy Land, and stop their inflammatory propaganda directed against all Jews.--Ed.)

Reappraisal in Israel?

Is Israel contemplating a reappraisal of its foreign policy in relation to Soviet Russia? This question is widely discussed in the pages of the Israeli newspapers, in the Knesset, and in other opinion-molding groups. It even came up for discussion at the last conference of the Histadrut held in Jerusalem last month. The debate has partly been quickened by the latest disappointments in Israel with the American policy on arms to Israel. But actually the question is older than the present crisis. There has always been a body of opinion in Israel favoring a position of neutrality between the Eastern and Western blocks rather than of exclusive friendship with the West. This view is not limited to the Left, but includes prominent personalities of all political parties, among them such men as Eliezer Livneh, charman of the Israeli American Society. The primary cause of this movement is not irrendiant to, a facilities of with, the Communists, but the obvious fact that Israel is too small and too near to the Communist countries to antagonize them by allying itself exclusively with the West. Zionists also have always had great hopes for a mass-immigration of Jews from Communist countries to Israel and this obviously cannot be accomplished in an atmosphere of cold war.

There is no doubt that this movement has grown since Egypt made its successful arms deal with Czechoslovakia and since the USA embarked on what Israelis believe to be an unfriendly stand on arms to Israel. The Jerusalem correspondent of the London Jewish Chronicle refers to this trend in the current issue of his publication (March 23):

Many people in Israel, not only members of the Left-wing parties, are asking what real advantage there was in Israel's early abandonment of neutrality and complete identification with the West. In many small, but quite important, ways the Soviet Union has shown a readiness to create some links with Israel. The now steady trickle of immigrants, suggestions for Parliamentary delegations and exchange of students, and firm trade relations are among them. Do these signs point a way out of Israel's dilemma to ensure survival? In the argent need for a reappraisal of its foreign policy Israel must inevitably ask itself this question.

On the other hand, there is an important section of public opinion which holds that Israel's interests are bound up too much with the United States and with American Jews and that it has more to lose than to gain by changing its policy to one of complete neutrality. This view was stated emphatically by Ben Surion at the last Histadrut conference and it put an end to the open discussion on the subject. It is strongly advocated by American Zionists, particularly by Hadassah, which is reported to be pressing the Israeli government for a more vigorous anti-Communist policy and even to become the champion of anti-Communism in the Middle East. The Jewish Observer and Middle East Review, official organ of the British Zionist Federation, reports that some Hadassah ideologists have criticized Israeli diplomats for not forming the Committee to Save the Middle East from Communism before the Irgunists in the United States

Totalitarian Tr

Mr. Louis Nelson, Vice-President of the ternational Ladies' Garment Workers Union and one of the most independent and courageous men in the Jewish Labor movement, has written an article in the current (February) issue of the Jewish Bulletin in which he charges that American Jews who live under one of the most democratic governments and who have, themselves, a great tradition_of a liberal and almost revolutionary past, are now exhibiting a state of mind and emotional attitude which can be described only as totalitarian. The fact that this totalitarianism is not of a political nature and does not use the physical force of the state to enforce its will does not make it less vicious. Social ostracism, traditional taboo, economic boycotts, character assassination and other forms of modern pressure tactics can and do make the lot of the Jewish dissenter from the majority very trying and often painful.

Nelson confirms the fact long known to every observer that the emergence of the state of Israel has created a curious psychological manifestation not only in Israel, but also among many American Jews. It has let loose a wave of racial pride, religious intolerance, and nationalistic fanaticism. Israel has become almost an object of religious worship among Zionists. To criticize a poling of the Israeli government is tantamount to sacrilege; to question the infallibility or the absolute righteousness of Israel, is equivalent to treason. In order to enforce these views and emotional attitudes on the nonconformist anti-Zionists who do not share them, the fanatics have evolved a system of pressures which, although at rently harmless in comparison with political force, can be and are ery effective.

Samples of Pressures

Mr. Nelson deals with these pressures. He deliberately ignores the big well-known demonstrations of organized political pressures on Congressmen, Senators, editors and other American public men. He relates only small facts of everyday experiences which do not make the headlines, but nevertheless illustrate the working of the trend more graphically than marches on Washington and the Madison Square rallies.

He tells the story of Dr. Herman & Gray, professor of law at the New York University, and a well-known lawyer and life-long liberal active in the labor movement and in the American Jewish Committee. This man has the distinction of being the only American Jewish leader of standing in the community who has had the courage to voice his disapproval of the present Zionist-produced hysteria and to say in public what many non-Zionists say privately. Writing in the Jewish Newsletter (Nov. 21, 1955) on the Failure of American Jewish Leadership, he said:

American Jews are no whit different from their fellow citizens. They do not and will not subordinate the interests of this land of their birth or adoption to those of Israel. They deny with indignation any suggestion of dual loyalty. They are honest in their denial. For them there is only one home and one country. Unfortunately American Jews are in danger of being put in a false light. At this critical juncture their journals, their publications, their spokesmen are failing them.

For having the courage to voice these simple truths, Dr. Gray was described as a leader of a "conspiracy to truncate Israel," as the "prize specimen in the stable of Jewish donkeys" and simlarly attacked for weeks in succession (National Jewish Post, Dec. 2, 9, 16, 23) in an effort to discredit him in the American Jewish Committee.

Pressures on Newspapers

As another illustration of the same trend, Nelson cites the storm that has been ragines in Groundy in the are. Jewish Newsletter since last provember when the publicary attenįsts into ures on America since the crit affice in the their

government. He part out that the Middle East situation was complicated, that had its own interests which are in conflict with the int. of Moscow, and that the truth was not entirely on the side of Israel." The article was quoted in Time (Nov. 20, 1955). This so enraged the fanatics that they were not satisfied with unleashing against this publication the usual mob incitement of lies, calumny, and character assassination in their press, but have also organized a campaign of private letter writing to prominent personalities and friends of the publication to urge them to boycott it and thus force its suspension, a campaign which, incidentally, is still continuing.

Pressures in the Labor Movement

Nelson is even more disturbed by the fact that this spirit of totalitarianism has infected other organizations which have nothing to do with Zionism. "I know of Jewish union leaders who are afraid to express an opinion. I know of Jewish businessmen and industrialists who are too intimidated to stand up to pressure," he says. At a recent UJA meeting in Brooklyn to which he was invited, the suggestion was made that Jewish trade union leaders should exert influence and pressure on employers with whom their unions have contracts to increase their contribution to the UJA. Nelson places in the same category the practice followed by a number of trade unions of imposing a tax on all their members, Jewish and non-Jewish, in favor of Histadrut.

"This is the picture of Jewish communal life and of the Jewish press now," he concludes. "Each organization vies with the other in the use of totalitarian pressure methods. Public opinion is strophied. The individual is lost. The cultural level is declining. Hysteria rules supreme in the Jewish community of America".

Completing the sad picture independently of Nelson, the New Tork Chapter of the Isocious Describ for Andrian reports the following in the April issue of its publication:

"There have come to our attention recently instances of pressures alleged to have been made by some Zionists against members of the American Council for Judaism. These charges seem incredible when we remember we are living in a democracy and not under a terrorist dictatorship. We are anxious to verify them where and if possible. It is said that business and professional men have been threatened with economic boycott if they join the Council; or, where it is known that they are members of the Council, they have been forced to withdraw under threat that their livelihood would be destroyed."

Change of Heart

During the second half of 1955, I reached the conclusion that the views expressed in the Jewish Newsletter no longer represented what I considered a fair appraisal of the position of the American Jewish Community. A warning that Russia's new foreign rollicy remains substantially unchanged and that Stalin's successors are still following his antisemitic policy, was issued by the American Jewish Committee in a new fact sheet entitled "The Jews under Stalin's Successors." According to the report: (1) antisemitism continues to be the official policy of the Soviet government; (2) religious freedom of the Jews is still sharply restricted; (3) Soviet Jews are not allowed even the limited cultural freedom granted to others, and they cannot publish their own newspapers, books or revive their own theater; (4) most of the Jews unjustly detained since the height of the anti-Jewish drive in February 1943, are still imprisoned although the Soviet leaders have admitted publicly that the charges against the prisoners were false; (5) the government ban against emigration to Israel remains in force. "Although the last three years have seen signs of leniency toward Russia's ethnic, religious and cultural groups, this easing has not been extended equally to Jews," says the report.

Sources in Europe and Israel take a less pessimistic view of the situation. They claim that there is an easing of antisemitism in Soviet Russia and in other Communist states as part of the general easing of tensions. More immigrants from Communist countries have come into Israel during the last year than in many previous years. The official figure is nearly 800. Most of the new arrivals report that a better climate now exists for Jews in Soviet Russia, and even more so in Poland and other Communist states. and that the fierce anti-Zionist and anti-Israeli propaganda, which was a frequent feature of Communist radio and press, has been reduced considerably. Timbly, the Landon Landin Illimetric (March 20) reports that a new five-year development plan has been announced in Moscow for Biro-Bidjan's industry and agriculture. The new plan provides for the cultivation of about 100,000 acres of new land, for one of the largest electric power plants, and for some 10,000 new shops, restaurants and coffee houses, schools, hospitals, libraries and other cultural institutions. No mention is made of the furthering of Yiddish culture, but Biro-Bidian is still referred to as the "Jewish autonomous region."

Returnees from Israel - The governments of West Germany and of Canada have now taken steps to keep out Israeli immigrants (known as "returnees") from Germany and Canada. This was done at the request of the Israeli government which is evidently concerned now with a growing emigration of people from Israel on account of the expectation of war. West Germany has always admitted visitors, immigrants or tourists, from other countries, including Israel, without requiring a special entrance visa. But in 1953, 800 Israelis, all former inmates of German concentration camps, returned to Germany and refused to go back to Israel. At the request of the Israeli government, the German government then introduced the visa regulation in order to discourage the further flow of these "returnees." Last month the Social Democratic party of West Germany introduced a motion to abolish this discriminatory visa regulation for Israelis. But the Bonn government rejected the motion, obviously to please the Israeli government. A similar step was recently taken by the Canadian government which decided not to establish immigration facilities in Israel as it was planning to do.
