## Drugs

> Cocaine
The primary drug threat in the state of Illinois is cocaine. Powdered cocaine sold for \$18,000-\$28,000/kilogram, \$800-\$1,200/ounce, and \$75-\$100/gram in the first quarter of FY 2002. Crack cocaine prices ranged from $\$ 500$ to $\$ 1,400 /$ ounce and $\$ 10$ to $\$ 25 /$ rock during the same time period. ${ }^{28}$

## $\rightarrow$ Heroin

The second greatest drug threat to the state is heroin. The state has seen an increase in the number of young, white, suburban heroin users. This increase in abuse was the result of increased availability of lower cost, higher purity heroin. ${ }^{29}$ Heroin from all source areas is available in Illinois, although South American and Southeast Asian heroin are most prevalent. ${ }^{30}$
> Marijuana
Marijuana is the most readily available and most commonly abused drug in the state. ${ }^{31}$ Commercial grade marijuana produced in Mexico is the most widely available in type found in Illinois. ${ }^{32}$
> Methamphetamine
Methamphetamine is growing in popularity because it is cheaper and produces a longer euphoric effect than crack cocaine. ${ }^{33}$ Methamphetamine production is expanding in rural areas of Illinois, increasing the threat of the drug to the state. According to the DEA, methamphetamine sold for \$7,300-\$10,000/pound, \$1,000$\$ 1,300 /$ ounce, and $\$ 80-\$ 100 /$ gram in urban areas. ${ }^{34}$
> Club Drugs
MDMA, Ketamine, and GHB use has increased, particularly among users living in urban areas and college towns. ${ }^{35}$ MDMA is readily available and is considered to be the most commonly abused club drug in the state. MDMA tablets sell for \$5-\$7 at wholesale levels. Prices for MDMA at the retail level range from $\$ 20$ to $\$ 30$. GHB, sold in liquid and powder forms, sells for $\$ 5-\$ 10 /$ dose at the retail level. Ketamine, also sold in liquid and powder form, sells for $\$ 60 /$ dose. Other club drugs such as PCP and LSD sell for $\$ 15 .{ }^{36}$
> Diverted Pharmaceuticals
The diversion of legitimate pharmaceuticals is a significant problem in Illinois. The most common diverted pharmaceutical drugs are hydrocodone, alprazolam, and phentermine. There has been a notable increase in the number of reported incidents of diverted pseudoephedrine. ${ }^{37}$
$>$ According to 2000-2001 data from the National Household Survey on Drug Abuse, $1.52 \%$ of Illinois citizens reported past year dependence on illicit drugs. ${ }^{38}$

> According to 2000-2001 data from the National Household Survey on Drug Abuse, 42.45\% of Illinois citizens ages 12 and older felt that smoking marijuana once a month posed a great risk. ${ }^{39}$

## Juveniles

$>$ During 2001, 36.9\% of Illinois (excluding Chicago) high school students reported that they had tried marijuana at least once in their lifetimes. ${ }^{40}$

## Enforcement

> During 2002, 21 Metropolitan Enforcement Groups (MEGs) and task forces were operating throughout Illinois. ${ }^{41}$
$>$ As of October 31, 2002, there were 50,441 full-time law enforcement employees in Illinois (36,389 officers and 14,052 civilians). ${ }^{42}$

## Trafficking and Seizures

$>$ Three different types of groups are responsible for most of the drugs distributed in Illinois: Mexican polydrug trafficking organizations, Colombian drug trafficking organizations (mostly traffic cocaine and heroin), and Nigerian groups (traffic Southeast heroin and whole distribution of drugs). ${ }^{43}$
$>$ African American and Caucasian street gangs and independent dealers are the primary retail distributors of powdered and crack cocaine. ${ }^{44}$
$>$ The Illinois State Police (ISP) seized 971 methamphetamine labs in the state during 2003. The total number of meth labs seized in Illinois by ISP and the DEA totaled

1,099 for 2003. ${ }^{45}$ During 2002, ISP seized 677 meth labs and the number of meth labs seized by ISP and DEA totaled $776 .{ }^{46}$ ISP seized 666 meth labs alone and 698 meth labs with the DEA during 2001. ${ }^{47}$
$>$ During 2002, Federal agencies seized 1,871.4 kilograms of marijuana in Illinois. ${ }^{48}$

## Courts

## $>$ Drug Courts ${ }^{50}$

As of November 2003, there were 12 drug courts in Illinois that had been operating for more than 2 years, 7 that were recently implemented, and 5 that were being planned.
$>$ During FY 2001, 44.7\% of the Federally-sentenced defendants in Illinois had committed drug offenses. Approximately $39 \%$ of the drug offenses involved crack cocaine. ${ }^{51}$

## Corrections

$>$ On June 30, 2003, the Illinois Department of Corrections adult inmate population totaled 43,186 . Approximately $25 \%$ of the adult offenders committed drug offenses. ${ }^{52}$
> The number of juveniles incarcerated in Illinois juvenile institutions on June 30, 2003 was 1,565 . Twelve percent of the juvenile offenders committed drug offenses. ${ }^{53}$

$>$ From October 1, 2002 to September 30, 2003, there were 72 Illinois methamphetamine laboratory sites reported to the El Paso Intelligence Center in which a child was present. ${ }^{55}$

## Treatment

$>$ Illinois treatment admissions increased from 93,491 in FY 2000 to 122,673 during FY 2001. Admissions later decreased to 108,955 during FY $2002 .{ }^{56}$
