

# **Programs/Initiatives**

➢ High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA)<sup>10</sup>

Designated in 1996, the Midwest HIDTA is responsible for sections of Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota, and South Dakota. The areas of North Dakota involved in Midwest HIDTA activities are Burleigh, Cass, Grand Forks, Morton, Ramsey, Richland, Walsh, and Ward Counties. The North Dakota counties did not join the Midwest HIDTA until February 1999.

- Retailers Meth Watch Program<sup>11</sup> The North Dakota Meth Watch Program is a partnership between the Attorney General's office and concerned North Dakota retailers. The goals of the program are to raise awareness of the problems associated with methamphetamine labs, to educate and train retail employees to recognize signs of individuals obtaining meth production precursors, and to limit the availability of precursor chemicals.
- North Dakota Drug Enforcement Initiative<sup>12</sup>
  The Drug Enforcement Initiative was created in response to the serious problems caused by drug usage and trafficking in North Dakota. A few of the goals of the initiative include stopping the importation of illegal drugs and manufacture of methamphetamine, creating public awareness of the state's illegal drug problem, identifying vulnerable groups for increased education and awareness, and ensuring that all North Dakota citizens have resources to assist with drug-related problems.
- $\succ$  Share the Fame<sup>13</sup>

The Share the Fame program was created in an effort to deter drug and alcohol abuse by juveniles in Native American communities. Share the Fame is a communityoutreach prevention program on North Dakota reservations that encourages youths' artistic expressions. It is intended to tap into Native American art and culture as a way to get the drug prevention message across.

# Crime and Drug-Related Crime

There were 1,658 arrests for drug abuse violation in North Dakota during 2001.<sup>30</sup> During 2002, arrests for drug abuse violations in North Dakota increased to 1,752.<sup>31</sup>

#### Drug Arrests by Offense Type, North Dakota, 2000-2002

- According to the North Dakota Indian Affairs Commission, the unemployment rate on Indian reservations in the State averages 55%. The high rate of unemployment may result in a large number of individuals who are willing to engage in criminal activities, such as drug distribution, to support themselves.<sup>34</sup>
- The North Dakota Crime Laboratory has reported an increase in the number of methamphetamine samples submitted for analysis from 1992 through 2000. In 1992, there were 14 samples submitted, and by 2000, the number of methamphetamine samples submitted for analysis totaled 1,218.<sup>35</sup>
- Veterinary clinic burglaries for ketamine have increased in North Dakota. Typically, one or two clinics are burglarized each year. However, during the first ten months of 2001, more than twelve clinics were burglarized.<sup>36</sup>

## Drugs

 $\succ$  Cocaine<sup>37</sup>

Powder cocaine availability and abuse are stable at low levels in North Dakota. The availability and abuse of crack cocaine is very limited. Cocaine prices range in the State from \$100-\$120 per gram and \$1,000-\$1,500 per ounce.

➢ Heroin

The use of heroin is not a significant problem in North Dakota. Virtually all heroin found in the State is black tar heroin from Mexico.<sup>38</sup> Mexican brown powdered heroin is also available but in very limited quantities. Black tar heroin prices range from \$350-\$600 per gram and \$4,000-\$10,000 per ounce.<sup>39</sup>

➢ Marijuana

Marijuana is one of the primary drugs of abuse in North Dakota. Most of the marijuana available in the State originates in Mexico. However, marijuana is increasingly available from local cultivators. Ditchweed is abundant in the southeastern part of North Dakota.<sup>40</sup> Local marijuana cultivators are often armed and use booby traps and warning devices to protect grow sites from law enforcement. Marijuana prices remain stable in the State and range from \$8-\$10 per gram, \$100-\$120 per ounce, and \$800-\$1,000 per pound.<sup>41</sup>

> Methamphetamine

The most significant drug threat to North Dakota is methamphetamine. The most common type of meth found in the State is produced in Mexico.<sup>42</sup> Methamphetamine is also increasingly being produced in small laboratories throughout North Dakota. Because of the State's dependence on the agriculture industry, there is a high level of use and availability of anhydrous ammonia, a substance commonly used in the "Nazi" method of manufacturing methamphetamine.<sup>43</sup> Methamphetamine prices are

decreasing in the State. During FY 1999, meth prices ranged from \$125-\$200 per gram and \$2,000-\$2,500 per ounce. In FY 2000, prices ranged from \$100-\$120 per gram and \$1,000-\$1,300 per ounce.<sup>44</sup>

Club Drugs

There have been some indications that club drugs are appearing in the Fargo area of North Dakota in small quantities.<sup>45</sup> The abuse of MDMA is increasing slowly throughout the State and occurs primarily among high school and college age students. The abuse of GHB is also increasing, primarily in North Dakota's urban areas. Ketamine is an emerging threat to North Dakota. Authorities have noted an increase in the popularity of hallucinogens in the State, possibly attributed to the growing presence of raves and dance clubs. The availability of psilocybin is increasing in certain areas of North Dakota.<sup>46</sup>

Diverted Pharmaceuticals<sup>47</sup>

The abuse of diverted pharmaceuticals, particularly Ritalin, OxyContin, Percocet, and Darvocet, are increasing throughout the State. Ritalin abusers often grind the pill into a powder and snort it like cocaine or dilute and inject it like heroin. The most common methods used to obtain OxyContin include prescription fraud and pharmacy burglary.

According to 2000-2001 data from the National Household Survey on Drug Abuse, less than half (45.41%) of North Dakota citizens ages 12 and older felt that smoking marijuana once a month posed a great risk.<sup>48</sup>

## Juveniles

There were 311 juvenile arrests for drug offenses in North Dakota during 2001.<sup>50</sup> During 2002, there were 289 juvenile arrests for drug abuse violations in North Dakota.<sup>51</sup>

Nearly 270 of the North Dakota juvenile drug arrests in 2001 involved marijuana.<sup>52</sup> During 2002, there were 251 juvenile drug arrests in North Dakota involving marijuana.<sup>53</sup>

# Enforcement

As of October 31, 2002, there were 1,542 full-time law enforcement employees in North Dakota (1,104 officers and 438 civilians).<sup>56</sup>

# **Trafficking and Seizures**

- North Dakota shares its northern border with Canada and there are eighteen authorized land ports of entry (POE) in the State. With only a few of the POEs are staffed 24 hours a day, criminals are provided with the opportunity to smuggle drugs without detection.<sup>57</sup>
- Large quantities of methamphetamine produced in California and Washington by Mexican organizations are transported into and distributed throughout North Dakota.<sup>58</sup>
- Mexico-based drug trafficking organizations manage the transportation of marijuana from Mexico to North Dakota, mostly using tractor-trailers.<sup>59</sup>
- Mexican criminal groups often use Native Americans and Indian reservations to facilitate drug distribution in the State.<sup>60</sup>
- MDMA is sometimes transported to North Dakota via Canada. Minneapolis and Denver are also sources of supply for the MDMA distributed in the State.<sup>61</sup>
- Most of the methamphetamine seized in North Dakota is produced in Mexico or California. The majority of the marijuana seized in the State is also produced in Mexico.<sup>62</sup>
- During full year 2003, the DEA and state and local authorities in North Dakota reported 220 methamphetamine lab incidents to the El Paso Intelligence Center.<sup>63</sup>

In 2002, there were 1,543 cultivated marijuana plants eradicated in North Dakota under the Drug Enforcement Administration's Domestic Cannabis Eradication/Suppression Program.<sup>65</sup>

The number of LSD/hallucinogen seizures by the North Dakota Bureau of Criminal Investigation (BCI) decreased from 2,182 dosage units in 1998 to 281 dosage units in 2000.<sup>66</sup>

The North Dakota BCI reported three seizures of MDMA tablets during September 2001. The MDMA amounts seized were 20, 30, and 150 tablets, respectively.<sup>67</sup>

## Courts

➢ Drug Courts<sup>68</sup>

As of November 2003, there were 8 drug courts operating or being planned in North Dakota. One drug court had been in existence for over 2 years, 5 drug courts were recently implemented, and 2 drug courts were being planned.

During FY 2001, 16.8% of the 150 Federally sentenced defendants in North Dakota had committed drug offenses. Fifty-six percent of the drug offenses involved methamphetamine.<sup>69</sup>

#### Corrections

- ➤ As of June 27, 2003, there were 1,197 inmates incarcerated in North Dakota.<sup>70</sup>
- On March 14, 2002, all inmates in the North Dakota correctional system were drug tested. Of the 980 drug tests given, only 5 tests were positive.<sup>71</sup>
- During FY 2000-2003, 21.7% of the new male commitments to the Division of Juvenile Services/Community Services committed drug/public order offenses.<sup>72</sup>

#### **Consequences of Use**

From October 1, 2002 to September 30, 2003, there were 4 North Dakota methamphetamine laboratory sites reported to the El Paso Intelligence Center in which a child was present.<sup>73</sup>

Alcohol, drugs, and medications were contributing factors in 37 of the 125 total North Dakota traffic fatalities during 2002.<sup>74</sup> Drug-related mortality rates (per 100,000) have increased from 0.16 in 1993 to 1.70 in 2000.<sup>75</sup>
