

## **Bismarck, North Dakota**

The following profile contains information on demographics, political figures, funding, programs, crime, drug use, drug trafficking, and enforcement statistics.

#### **Demographics**

- Population: 55,532 (2000 Census);<sup>1</sup> 56,344 (July 2003 Census estimate)<sup>2</sup>
- Race/Ethnicity (2000 Census): 94.3% white; 0.3% black/African American; 3.3% American/Alaska Native; 0.4% Asian; 0.0% Native Hawaiian/Other Pacific Islander; 0.0% some other race; 0.8% two or more races; 0.7% Hispanic/Latino (of any race)<sup>3</sup>
- > The city of Bismarck is located in Burleigh County.<sup>4</sup>

#### **Programs/Initiatives**

- ➢ High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA)<sup>9</sup>
  - Designated in 1996, the Midwest HIDTA includes sections of Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota, and South Dakota. In North Dakota, this HIDTA is responsible for the following counties: Burleigh, Cass, Grand Forks, Morton, Ramsey, Richland, Walsh, and Ward. The North Dakota counties did not join the Midwest HIDTA until February 1999.

Produced by *The Bismarck Tribune*, Meth on the Street is an ongoing series of newspaper reports that highlight the growing prevalence of methamphetamine production, trafficking, and use in the Bismarck area.

#### Federal Funding

- Drug-Free Communities Support Program<sup>11</sup> No community coalitions in Bismarck have ever received funding through the Drug-Free Communities Support Program.
- Community Capacity Development Office<sup>12</sup>
  There are no areas in Bismarck that have been recognized as Weed and Seed sites.
- Bismarck did not receive any methamphetamine funding in 2003 from the Department of Justice's Office of Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS).<sup>13</sup>
- FY 2003 Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) Discretionary Funds received in Bismarck:<sup>14</sup>
  - Center for Mental Health Services: \$99,607
  - Center for Substance Abuse Prevention: \$0

- Bismarck did not receive any funding through the FY 2003 Office of Justice Programs Drug Court Grant Program.<sup>15</sup>

- Bismarck did not receive funding from the Housing and Urban Development Drug Elimination Grants in 2001.<sup>17</sup>

#### **Crime and Drug-Related Crime**

The Bismarck Police Department reported 163 arrests for drug abuse violations in 2001.<sup>18</sup> This number increased to 198 drug arrests reported by the Bismarck Police Department in 2002.<sup>19</sup>

Number of Arrests, Selected Offenses, Bismarck Police Department, 2001-2002

- The Burleigh Sheriff's Office reported 67 drug arrests during 2001.<sup>20</sup> This number increased to 92 drug arrests reported by the Burleigh Sheriff's Office during 2002.<sup>21</sup>
- Bismarck Police Department officials report an increasing number of thefts of overthe-counter medications and chemicals that can be used to produce methamphetamine.<sup>22</sup>

#### Drugs

> Heroin

While there are indications of heroin availability in the Bismarck area, there were no heroin-related arrests or seizures in 2000.<sup>23</sup>

Cocaine

According to the Bismarck Police Department, cocaine abuse has decreased since  $1998.^{24}$ 

Club Drugs

LSD abuse is increasing in the Bismarck area, particularly among college students and young adults. The drug is available in liquid form and on sugar cubes.<sup>25</sup>

Diverted Pharmaceuticals OxyContin abuse is increasing in Bismarck and abusers are writing fraudulent prescriptions, altering prescriptions, and even posing as doctors to obtain the drug.<sup>26</sup>

## Enforcement

- As of October 2002, there were 110 law enforcement employees in Bismarck, 80 officers and 27 civilians.<sup>27</sup>
- ➢ Bismarck Police Department drug-related initiatives:<sup>28</sup>
  - Drug Education This program is designed to help children and adults recognize illegal substances and equip them with the information they need to make good decisions regarding the temptation to use drugs.
  - Marijuana Education Program This program educates youth of the legal consequences of marijuana and other drug use.

### **Trafficking and Seizures**

- Native American independent drug dealers distribute drugs to Caucasian abusers. They also distribute drugs on Indian reservations.<sup>29</sup>
- Mexican criminal groups transport large quantities of marijuana in private vehicles from Denver to Bismarck.<sup>30</sup>
- Mexican males transport an estimated 15 to 20 pounds of methamphetamine into the area every two weeks via private vehicles.<sup>31</sup>
- The Sons of Silence outlaw motorcycle gang maintains a chapter in Bismarck. Sons of Silence is responsible for transporting methamphetamine and other drugs into the Bismarck area.<sup>32</sup>
- According to the Metro Area Narcotics Task Force and the Bismarck Police Department, Caucasian local independent dealers are the primary distributors of Mexican-produced marijuana. Local marijuana producers distribute the drug in their production areas.<sup>33</sup>
- From January to June 2002, there were 12 methamphetamine lab seizures in Burleigh County reported by the North Dakota Bureau of Criminal Investigation.<sup>34</sup>

### Courts

➢ Drug Courts<sup>35</sup>

As of May 2004, there was one drug court in Bismarck that had been operating for over 2 years and one that was recently implemented. No additional drug courts were being planned in Bismarck.

#### **Consequences of Use**

According to the Bismarck Police Department, the number of methamphetamine overdoses has increased in the area.<sup>36</sup>

#### Treatment

> Treatment admissions to publicly funded facilities were fewer for smoked cocaine (crack) than for cocaine admissions via other routes.<sup>37</sup>
