(Eddie Cantor's radio sketch for which Chase & Sanborn have had the greatest number of requests.)

EDDIE CANTOR, D.D. (*Depression Doctor*) was sitting in his office on the Chase and Sanborn Hour one Sunday night, when a knock was heard outside the door and a weak voice asked, "Where's a doc?"

"Right here, my friend," said Eddie. "Sit down in that chair, open up your collar and say 'aaah'."

"Me no can say."

"Well why can't you say 'aaah'?"

"Sorry, doc, me no speaka English."

"Well then, say 'aaah' in your own language."

"Booh."

"Good. Now say 'booh' in your language."

"Aaah."

"That's it. Let's have a look. Your tonsils are very low. You should wear arch supports."

"You think I'm gonna live, doc?"

"Well, your chances are 9 to 1," replied Eddie. And sure enough it was right on the doctor's card. Dr. Cantor—9 to 1.

Eddie looked at him a moment and shook his head. "Yes, you are my Uncle Sam all right, but you have changed. You look very thin. Have you done any eating lately . . . you know, food?"

Uncle Sam sadly shook his head. "You see, Eddie, I have a lot of nephews and nieces out of work . . ."

"I understand," said Eddie, "you don't like to sponge on them. I'm going to ask you a few questions, Uncle Sam. When were you born?"

"On July 4, 1776."

"That makes you a hundred and fifty-five years old. Why, you're just a kid, Uncle. You are suffering from growing pains, that's all."

"Maybe," said Uncle Sam weakly, "but I feel terrible."

"Don't be foolish, Uncle Sam, I have been sicker than you myself." Eddie was rapidly unbuttoning his coat and vest. "Look Uncle, did I ever show you

my operation? Oooh, was I sick. And look at me now. Don't worry, you will feel better soon. You have had these attacks before. Remember—1907 . . . 1893?"

"Yes, but this is the worst one yet."

"No, no, no," said Eddie. "That's what you say every time. Why, compared to that internal trouble you had in 1865 which nearly upset your whole system, you haven't even got a bad cold now. "Wall Street cocktail?"

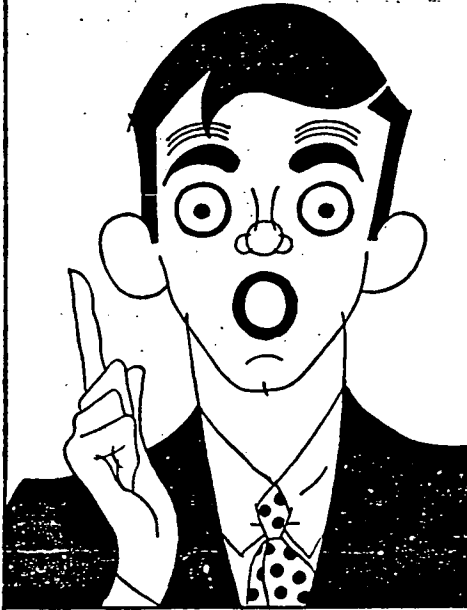
"Sure—one drink and you get a seat on the curb with your feet in the gutter. That's what was wrong with you in 1929. But you didn't get a headache until 1931."

HOW TO MAKE QUACK-O

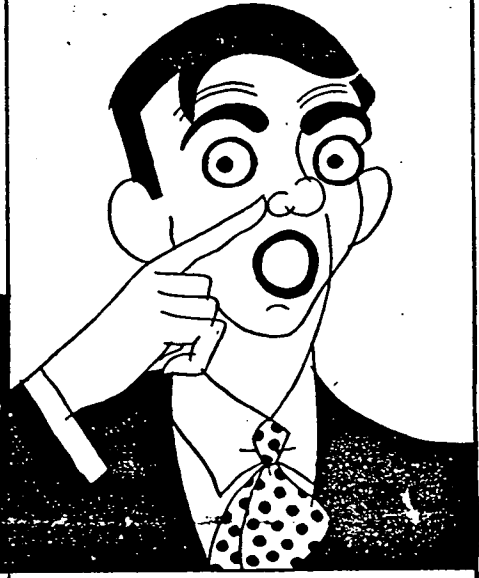
1 If you have heard that quack-quack noise on the radio, you may be one of the thousands who wonder *how* it is made . . . or one of the millions that wonder *why*.



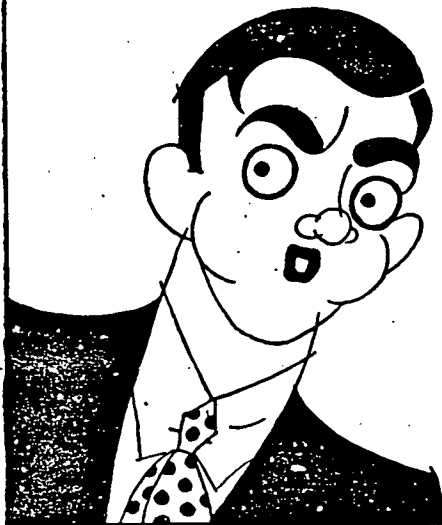
2 This making quackee is like making whoopee. It's an old American custom. Even when it was new it was an old American custom.

7 Expel the air abruptly from the mouth. One man says let it come out like the geyser in Yellowstone Park. Of course the geyser really isn't in Yellowstone Park . . . he's chopping wood in Holland!



8 On the first quack, you may not have the right pitch or volume. If at first you don't succeed keep practising until you make a perfect goose of yourself.



9 If you are still unsuccessful, catch a goose and observe how quack-quack is made. Wives can learn other lessons from the goose, which is considered foolish because it thinks about its fine feathers and forgets the big bill.

4 An ear for music is fairly important. But you don't need *much* ear. Even if you have no more than Rubinoff there is still hope.



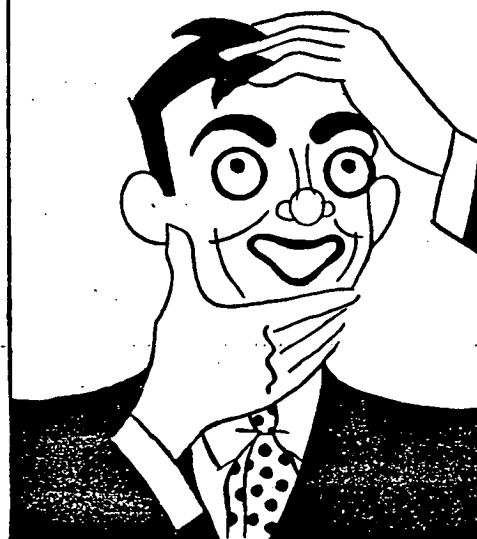
5 The mouth, of course, is most important. . . . After moistening the lips, hold them tightly together, like you do when your wife asks for a new hat.



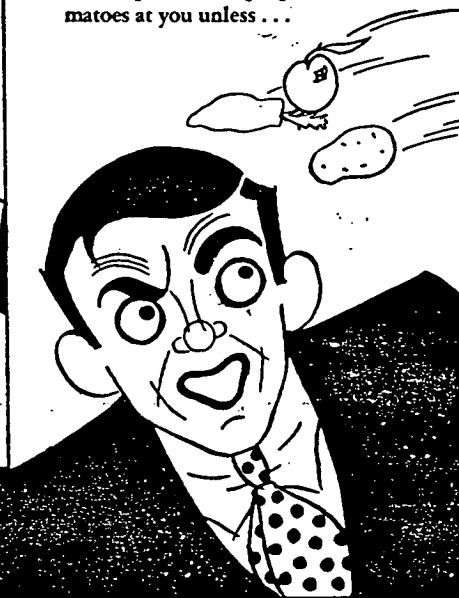

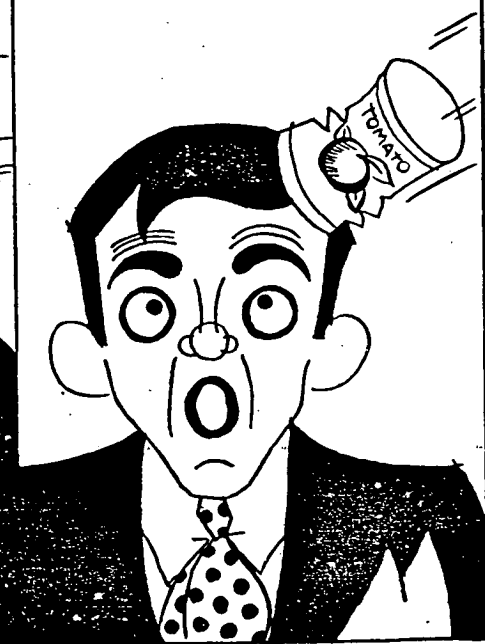

Mr. Harvin McIntyre, Assistant Secretary to the President,
has requested that I furnish you the information requested in your
telegram of January 31.

I regret that I have very little information along the
lines in which you are interested, that is, the number of police
officers killed yearly in performance of duty, average salary of a
policeman and other such statistics. The following information
was given in an article published in the September, 1933, issue of
"Police 13-13", the publication of the Chicago Police Department.
It quoted as its source of information, a recent number of the
"Monthly Labor Review", issued by the United States Department of
Labor. The lowest salary paid by a Metropolitan Police Department
is the \$840 per year paid the senior patrolman in Mobile, Alabama.
The highest schedule is found in New York City and Los Angeles,
California where a senior patrolman receives \$3,000 per year. A
Mobile detective receives \$900 a year, while a New York detective
receives \$4,000. Other cities are quoted as follows:

The above information is, of course, based entirely upon the figures quoted by "Police 13-13", in 1933.

I have just received a copy of the Year Book of the Scranton, Pennsylvania Police Department, and find it gives police officers' salaries for that city as \$3,000 for the Superintendent, who is the highest paid man in the Department, and \$2,160 for patrolmen. These salaries are subject to a 10% economy reduction.

The 1935 World Almanac quotes the following salaries for the New York Police Department, as of October 24, 1934, but states actually smaller salaries are being paid during the economy regime: captains \$5,000, lieutenants \$4,000, sergeants \$3,500, patrolmen \$2,000 to \$3,000, policewomen and patrolwomen \$2,000 to \$3,000.

I regret that I do not have any reports or estimates giving the number of officers killed in the line of duty.

As of possible interest to you, I am inclosing a copy of the address given by the Attorney General, and the address which I gave during the Attorney General's Conference on Crime, held in Washington during December, 1934. I am also inclosing the following publications of this Division which deal, of course, only with its law enforcement and identification activities:

Dear Sir:

In a recent conversation with [redacted] National Broadcasting Company of Hollywood, California, he being a director and producer of shows, he advised me that JACK BENNY, radio comedian, who, according to today's press, pled guilty to smuggling charges in New York City, has been very worried as to the outcome of the trial. [redacted] is intimately acquainted with him. BENNY and his sponsors were very much afraid that he would receive a penitentiary sentence in connection with this case.

He advised me confidentially that EDDIE CANTOR, who has recently made a number of public remarks relative to his dislike for HITLER and things German in general, has had difficulty with his sponsors, the American Tobacco Company, and the sponsor actually endeavored to cancel his contract after a recent episode in Hollywood. They were not legally able to break this contract and the comedian has eight or nine weeks before it expires.

After the conclusion of a recent broadcast in Hollywood, CANTOR made some remarks about HITLER and an individual in the rear of the studio arose and left and was followed by two persons, who are reported to have attacked him after engaging in a verbal dispute outside the studio. There was some talk of filing charges against the attackers, one of whom was said to have been an individual on the program with CANTOR. Apparently the incident, as well as CANTOR'S remarks, were very disgusting to the broadcasting company officials and he is becoming increasingly unpopular in radio circles.

Eddie Cantor in his broadcast from Skelly's Stadium, ~~University of Tulsa~~ on Sunday evening, May 5th, over WMAL after referring to his friendship with Will Rogers and the obligations of citizenship, quoted the Director to the effect that if we used our heads today, we will not have to use our battleships, etc. tomorrow. Mr. Cantor then pointed out that the Director speaks from experience because he has been confronted with the job of meeting with the enemies from within and "he has done that job well." This statement was followed, as you will recall, by considerable applause. Mr. Cantor then went on to say if we used our heads we can make America what it should be.

DEAR EDDIE: I APPRECIATED YOUR WIRE OF THE EIGHTH. THERE IS NO QUESTION BUT THAT ONE OF THE GREAT DOMESTIC PROBLEMS TODAY IS THE SHOCKING INCREASE IN THE NUMBER OF YOUTHFUL OFFENDERS. THE FIRST SIX MONTHS OF THIS YEAR WITNESSED A EIGHT NINE POINT FIVE PER CENT INCREASE IN THE ARREST AND FINGERPRINTING OF GIRLS UNDER TWENTY-ONE YEARS OF AGE FOR OFFENSES AGAINST COMMON DECENCY. SUCH OFFENSES INCLUDE DRUNKENNESS, VAGRANCY, DISORDERLY CONDUCT, PROSTITUTION, AND COMMERCIALIZED VICE. THE ARRESTS AND FINGERPRINTING OF GIRLS UNDER TWENTY-ONE INCREASED THIRTY PER CENT FOR CRIMES AGAINST PROPERTY FOR THE FIRST SIX MONTHS OF THIS YEAR. SUCH CRIMES ARE ROBBERY, BURGLARY, THEFT, LARCENY AND RELATED OFFENSES. ARRESTS OF BOYS AND GIRLS, AGE SEVENTEEN, INCREASED SEVENTEEN POINT SEVEN PERCENT, AND FOR ALL AGES, UNDER EIGHTEEN, ARRESTS OF BOYS AND GIRLS INCREASED THIRTEEN POINT SIX PERCENT. THESE FIGURES ARE AGGRAVATED BY THE FACT THAT THOUSANDS OF BOYS AGED EIGHTEEN ARE IN THE ARMY AND IN SOME INSTANCES BOYS UNDER EIGHTEEN ARE PRODUCTIVELY EMPLOYED WHICH WOULD NOT BE THE CASE IN OTHER YEARS. MORE PERSONS AGED EIGHTEEN WERE ARRESTED IN THE FIRST SIX MONTHS THIS YEAR, AS WAS THE CASE IN NINETEEN FORTY-TWO, THAN IN ANY OTHER AGE GROUP. THEY WERE FOLLOWED BY THE SEVENTEEN AND NINETEEN YEAR OLDS. OUR YOUTH IS BLAMED FOR THIS SORDID PICTURE BUT THE REAL FAULT LIES ON THE SHOULDERS OF THE ADULTS. WARTIME CONDITIONS HAVE BROUGHT ON DISLOCATIONS AND INCREASED,

My dear Eddie:

I am returning herewith the letter addressed to you under date of April 7, 1944, by Mr. Fred B. Levine of Superior, Wisconsin, together with the newspaper clipping accompanying Mr. Levine's letter and the carbon copy of your answer to Mr. Levine's communication. Immediately after you furnished this correspondence to me, I checked into the matter within the Department of Justice to determine whether there was any way in which the statement charging you with equipping your automobile to use unrationed butane gas might be retracted or alleviated. I have determined through my Los Angeles office that Mr. James T. Harrington, Chief of the War Frauds Unit of the Department of Justice, did not give out the press dispatch setting forth the names of the persons, including yourself, who were supposed to have this equipment. Mr. John Handy of the War Production Board in Los Angeles advised several of the persons named in the dispatch, after the story had appeared in the papers, that if they would bring their automobiles to the War Production Board in Los Angeles for inspection, in order that it might be determined they did not have and never had butane attachments on them, the War Production Board would then issue a public retraction. I have not been able to determine whether anyone has as yet taken his automobile to the War Production Board for examination, but I would suggest that if you have an automobile in the Los Angeles area, you give consideration to taking this step, since, I am advised as I have indicated, that the War Production Board will then issue a statement retracting the previous story.

LOS ANGELES - (AP) - Charged with installing equipment in automobiles to permit use of unrationed butane gas instead of gasoline as fuel, Lawrence W. Zonker was named yesterday in a 10-count federal criminal information charging violation of War Production board regulations.

James T. Harrington, chief of the war frauds unit of the department of justice here, said Zonkers sold the equipment for as high as \$1,000 per automobile to more than 40 motion picture actors and other wealthy Los Angeles citizens.

These included, Harrington said, Gary Cooper, Bob Hope, Eddie Cantor, L. B. Mayer; Producer William Goetz, Barbara Hutton, Carey Grant, and Director Henry Hathaway.

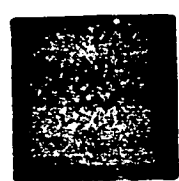
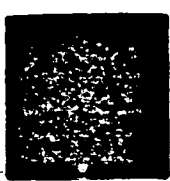

As a matter of record, the Young and Rubicam Agency handling the Eddie Cantor script contacted Mr. Ellsworth of our Los Angeles Office on May 9, 1945 and advised that they were working on the script for the broadcast that evening which dealt with the work of the Bureau. Mr. Ellsworth stated that he understood the script would be built around the Director having sent Eddie Cantor a Special Agent badge and made him an honorary G-Man.

Pursuant to my instructions, Mr. Ellsworth advised them that this was objectionable inasmuch as we had numerous requests for honorary badges which policy and the law would not permit. It was pointed out that should such a reference be made on Cantor's broadcast we would possibly receive many more requests and individuals who were assisting us from day to day would misconstrue and misunderstand such references and would not be able to figure out why they too did not receive honorary badges. Mr. Ellsworth was also instructed to obtain a copy of the script so that we could make any other necessary suggestions. He was not able to get the script until approximately three hours before the broadcast started. He telephoned it in and suggestions were made just before 7:00 p.m. for certain changes to eliminate references to our having furnished Cantor a badge, to eliminate references to our handling black market matters, a reference to the use of third degree and similar objectionable passages. It was understood that Young and Rubicam were very receptive to these suggestions and necessary changes were made so that the broadcast was finally satisfactory.
