

- ➤ During 2002, 1,313 offenders were suspected of drug usage while committing an offense in South Dakota. <sup>25</sup>
- ➤ During 2002, there were 467 HIDTA methamphetamine arrests in South Dakota. <sup>26</sup>
- ➤ During 2001, the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) reported making 101 arrests for drug violations in South Dakota.<sup>27</sup>

# **Drugs**

## > Cocaine

Cocaine HCL (powder cocaine) is readily available throughout all parts of South Dakota. Crack cocaine availability is increasing in South Dakota, but mainly in eastern areas of the state.<sup>28</sup>

> Heroin

Heroin is available in personal use quantities in South Dakota.<sup>29</sup>

➤ Methamphetamine

Mexican methamphetamine is increasingly available in South Dakota.<sup>30</sup>

Marijuana

Marijuana is readily available throughout South Dakota.<sup>31</sup>

Club Drugs

MDMA availability is limited, but has been shown to be increasing. MDMA is more readily available in western parts of South Dakota. The number of rave parties in South Dakota remains stable. LSD availability is also limited.<sup>32</sup>

➤ Diverted Pharmaceuticals

According to the South Dakota Department of Health, hydrocodone products, codeine, and Darvocet-N are the most popular abused pharmaceutical substances in the state. These drugs are obtained by forged prescriptions and by phony call-ins.<sup>33</sup>

According to 2000-2001 data from the National Household Survey on Drug Abuse, 1.06% of South Dakota citizens reported past year dependence on illicit drugs.<sup>34</sup>

According to 2000-2001 data from the National Household Survey on Drug Abuse, 41.63% of South Dakota citizens ages 12 and older felt that smoking marijuana once a month posed a great risk.<sup>35</sup>

- ➤ Eight percent of the South Dakota 9th-12th graders surveyed during 2003 reported trying marijuana for the first time before age 13.<sup>37</sup>
- ➤ Four percent of the students reported using marijuana on school property within the past month.<sup>38</sup>
- ➤ Twenty-two percent of the students surveyed during 2003 reported that someone had offered, sold, or given them an illegal drug on school property during the past year.<sup>39</sup>
- During 2002, there were 458 juvenile arrests for drug abuse violations in South Dakota.<sup>40</sup>

### **Enforcement**

As of October 31, 2002, there were 2,016 full-time law enforcement employees in South Dakota (1,267 officers and 749 civilians). 42

# **Trafficking and Seizures**

- Methamphetamine available in eastern South Dakota is obtained from sources in Sioux City, Iowa or from western states such as Texas, Arizona, and California. Methamphetamine is distributed locally by Caucasian residents who have been in the area for a long time, or by Hispanic males who recently moved to the state.<sup>43</sup>
- Mexican methamphetamine is shipped into the state directly from Denver, Phoenix, San Francisco, and San Diego.<sup>44</sup>
- ➤ The stealing of anhydrous ammonia fertilizer from farm supply stores and farmers is emerging as a serious problem in South Dakota. 45
- Multi-hundred pound quantities of marijuana are transported into the state from the Southwest. Smaller quantities of marijuana are also shipped via express mail services

- or purchased from Hispanic males in the Sioux City area and driven back to Sioux Falls. 46
- During full year 2003, the DEA and state and local authorities in South Dakota reported 30 methamphetamine lab incidents to the El Paso Intelligence Center. 47

➤ During 2002, Federal agencies seized 5.2 kilograms of cocaine in South Dakota. 48

➤ During 2002, approximately 31,002,195 marijuana plants were eradicated in South Dakota. This is down from 294,842,944 plants eradicated in 2001. The primary cause for the decrease was widespread drought conditions during 2002. 49

#### Courts

- ➤ Drug Courts<sup>50</sup>
  - As of November 2003, there were 3 drug courts in South Dakota that had been operating for more than 2 years, 1 that was recently implemented, and 2 that were being planned.
- ➤ During FY 2001, 19.9% of Federally sentenced defendants in South Dakota had committed drug offenses. Approximately 64% of the drug offenses involved methamphetamine.<sup>51</sup>

#### **Corrections**

➤ As of March 31, 2004, there were 3,094 adult inmates under correctional supervision in South Dakota. At this time, 357 of the inmates were incarcerated for possession of a controlled substance.<sup>52</sup>

➤ At the end of 2002, there were 4,959 adults on probation and 1,672 adults on parole in South Dakota.<sup>53</sup>

#### **Consequences of Use**

From October 1, 2002 to September 30, 2003, there was 1 South Dakota methamphetamine laboratory site reported to the El Paso Intelligence Center in which a child was present.<sup>54</sup>

## **Treatment**

➤ During 2002, there were 9,039 admissions to drug/alcohol treatment in South Dakota. <sup>55</sup> There were 6,762 treatment admissions in 2001. <sup>56</sup> During 2000, there were 9,174 admissions to treatment. <sup>57</sup>
