

- Population (2002 American Community Survey): 383,948¹; 360,890 (2000 Census)²
- Race/Ethnicity (2002 American Community Survey): 73.74% white; 6.43% black/African American; 0.79% American Indian/Alaska Native; 1.93% Asian; 0% Native Hawaiian/other Pacific Islander; 0.35% other race; 3.61% two or more races; 13.15% Hispanic/Latino (of any race)³

Programs/Initiatives

▶ High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA)¹⁰

The Rocky Mountain HIDTA was designated in 1996 and is responsible for areas in Colorado, Utah and Wyoming. In Colorado, this HIDTA is responsible for the following areas/counties: Adams, Arapahoe, Boulder, Denver, Douglas, Eagle, El Paso, Garfield, Grand, Jefferson, LaPlata, Larimer, Mesa, Moffat, Pueblo, Routt, and Weld.

➢ Metro Vice, Narcotics and Investigation (VNI)¹¹

The El Paso County Sheriff's Office & Colorado Springs Police Department Metro VNI works as a multi-agency, co-located drug task force that investigates, controls, and prevents the illegal sale, possession, or manufacturing of illicit drugs. Units of Metro VNI conduct in-depth investigations of major drug trafficking organizations and gangs involved in drug trafficking and money laundering operations throughout El Paso and Teller counties.

Federal Funding

- Drug-Free Communities Support Program¹² Since 1999, there have been no grants awarded to Colorado Springs for the Drug-Free

 \succ Office of Weed and Seed¹⁴

Colorado Springs has not received Federal funding or official recognition as a Weed and Seed site.

- Colorado Springs did not receive any funding through the FY 2003 Office of Justice Programs Drug Court Grant Program.¹⁵
- Colorado Springs did not receive methamphetamine funding in 2003 from the Department of Justice's Office of Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS).¹⁶
- No funds were received in Colorado Springs during FY 2001 from the Housing and Urban Development Low Income Housing Drug Elimination Grant.¹⁷

Crime and Drug-Related Crime

During 2000, there were 12,640 larceny offenses reported to law enforcement in Colorado Springs.¹⁹ This number increased to 13,155 during 2001²⁰ and to 14,137 during 2002.²¹ According to preliminary 2003 data, there were 6,078 larceny offenses in Colorado Spring between January to June 2003.²²

The Metro VNI efforts resulted in the arrest of more than 198 individuals associated with methamphetamine laboratories during 2002.²³

Drugs

 \succ Cocaine²⁴

During the fourth quarter of FY 2002, powder cocaine sold for \$15,000-\$25,000 per kilogram and \$600-\$700 per ounce. Crack cocaine sold for \$500-\$1,100 per ounce and \$25-\$50 per rock. The average purity of powder cocaine was 50% at the retail level.

➢ Heroin²⁵

Mexican black tar and brown powdered heroin are not very available in Colorado Springs. Both types of heroin sold for \$1,800-\$3,500 per ounce and \$75-\$300 per gram during the fourth quarter of 2002.

➢ Marijuana²⁶

BC bud is becoming increasingly available and sells for \$3,000-\$5,000 per pound in Colorado Springs. During FY 2002, marijuana from Mexican sources sold for \$300-\$1,200 per pound and \$100-\$150 per ounce. Locally produced sinsemilla sold for \$1,500-\$3,200 per pound and \$100-\$150 per ounce.

➢ Methamphetamine²⁷

High purity methamphetamine is readily available in Colorado Springs. Wholesale and retail purity levels for methamphetamine averaged 20% in Colorado Springs. Prices for methamphetamine ranged from \$90-\$125 per gram, to \$700-\$1,200 per ounce, to \$9,000-\$15,000 per pound.

Enforcement

As of October 31, 2002, there were 940 law enforcement employees in Colorado Springs (651 officers and 289 civilians).²⁸

Trafficking and Seizures

- Colorado Springs is a regional distribution center for methamphetamine, cocaine, and MDMA.²⁹
- > The Westside Varrios gang distributes methamphetamine in Colorado Springs.³⁰
- The following street gangs distribute cocaine in Colorado Springs: 81st Eastside Hustlers; Four Comer Hustlers; Gangster Disciples; Neighborhood Bloods; Parkside Varrios; and Surenos 13.³¹
- Heroin is transported from Sinalona, Mexico to Colorado Springs for distribution.³²
- Powder cocaine is converted to crack by Mexican criminal groups and Hispanic street gangs in Colorado Springs.³³
- During 2002, the Metro Vice, Narcotics and Intelligence (VNI) division seized 153 methamphetamine labs in El Paso and Teller counties.³⁴

Courts

 \blacktriangleright Drug Courts³⁵

As of November 2003, there were two drug courts being planned in Colorado Springs. There were no additional drug courts operating.

- Approximately 77% of person admitted to the drug court program in El Paso County either successfully graduated or were actively participating in rehabilitation at the end of 2003.³⁶
- During 2003, of the 5,379 felony cases filed in El Paso, 1,529 were drug offense cases. This was a 24.2% increase from the 1,231 drug offense cases filed in El Paso County during 2002.³⁷

Corrections

During 2002, the average daily population for the Detention Bureau of the El Paso County Sheriff's Office was 1,106.³⁸
