- ➤ Many of the offenders arrested for robbery in Portland during 2003 admitted to detectives that they committed the crime to obtain money for drug purchases. ²²
- The number of robbery offenses known to police in Portland increased 59% from 2002 to 2003. 23

Drugs

Cocaine

The Portland Field Office of the Maine Drug Enforcement Agency (MDEA) reports a significant increase in the availability and use of cocaine in the area. Powder cocaine prices range from \$80/gram to \$1,300/ounce. The average price for crack cocaine is \$50/rock (1/2 gram).²⁶

> Heroin

MDEA's Portland Field Office reported an increase in heroin availability in 2003. There are an estimated 1,500-1,800 heroin addicts in the Portland area. Many of the heroin users in Portland are in their late teens and early twenties. Authorities indicate that young users sometimes begin to abuse heroin after becoming addicted to prescription opiates. According to the Portland Resident Office of the Federal Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), heroin purity levels ranged from 50% to 90% in the first quarter of FY 2003. Heroin sold for \$6,000-\$8,000/ounce, \$250-\$300/gram, and \$35-\$60/bag during that period. > Marijuana

Marijuana is readily available throughout Cumberland County. A pound of processed marijuana sells for \$1,200-\$1,400. In addition to locally-grown marijuana, commercial grade marijuana from Mexico is also available in the area.²⁹

> Methamphetamine

The availability and abuse of methamphetamine are not very high in the Portland area. However, authorities anticipate an increased availability of the drug in the future due to the increased presence of the Hells Angels and Outlaws gangs. Both gangs are involved in the distribution of methamphetamine.³⁰

Club Drugs

Due to an anti-rave strategy, raves are no longer held in Cumberland County. However, MDMA and ketamine remain very popular with young adults in the area. According to the DEA Portland Resident Office, MDMA sold for \$20-\$30/tablet in the 1st quarter of FY 2003. 32

Diverted Pharmaceuticals

The diversion and abuse of pharmaceutical substances increased steadily during 2003. OxyContin, oxycodone, Vicodin, and Darvocet are the prescription drugs of choice in the Portland area.³³

Juveniles

➤ Survey results from the 2002 Maine Youth Drug and Alcohol Use Survey indicate that 17.7% of Cumberland County students in grades 6 through 12 reported using marijuana 10 or more times during their lives. Seventy percent of 6th through 12th graders reported never using marijuana.³⁴

Enforcement

- ➤ Maine Drug Enforcement Agency (MDEA)³⁶
 MDEA serves as Maine's statewide drug task force and has 6 regional task force offices located in Augusta, Bangor, Houlton, Lewiston, Lyman and Portland.
- ➤ In 2003, there were 160 sworn and 64 civilian employees of the Portland Police Department.³⁷

Courts

➤ Drug Courts³⁸

As of May 2004, there was 1 drug court in Portland that had been in existence for more than 2 years and 1 drug court that was recently implemented. There were no drug courts being planned.

Consequences of Use

During 2003, there were 28 drug overdose deaths in Portland. More than half of the overdose deaths were directly related to methadone "take home doses" prescribed to clients. The patients either sold, traded or furnished their take home doses to the victims, ultimately contributing to their deaths.³⁹

Treatment

➤ There are 2 methadone clinics in Portland. 40
