THE GENERAL SERVICE SCHOOLS
FORT LEAVENWORTH, KANSAS

1. The General Service Schools, Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, consist of the Command and General Staff School and the Command and General Staff Correspondence School. There is also a Special Command and General Staff Course for officers of the National Guard and the Organized Reserves.

(See appendix 1 for roster of staff and instructors.)

THE COMMAND AND GENERAL STAFF SCHOOL

2. The Command and General Staff School opened September 8, 1924, with 263 students, 259 from the Regular Army and four from the Marine Corps. All graduated June 19, 1925, except four officers of the Regular Army who were relieved during the year on account of sickness and one who died.

3. The class of 1925 was a good class, loyal, industrious and earnest.

4. The Command and General Staff School has materially extended its field by conducting schools for National Guard and Reserve officers in nearby towns. The most important of these schools was conducted at Kansas City, Missouri, where there was an average attendance of more than one hundred. The school sessions were held in the Armory of the 110th Engineers every Wednesday evening from October to May. In

the preceding year the instructor practically lectured to the class each evening and did all of the work. This year problems were sent to the school one week in advance. The National Guard and Reserve officers were assigned to duties as brigade, regimental, and battalion commanders and also as staff officers, and required to prepare their subjects and to give their orders. This was a great advance and the progress made was remarkable. Many of the orders issued by these officers would do credit to the student officers of the Command and General Staff School. There was also conducted a course of five lectures and one problem for the medical officers in Kansas City, Missouri.

Courses of one lecture or conference per month for seven months were also given in St. Joseph, Missouri; Leavenworth, Kansas; Kansas City, Kansas; and Topeka, Kansas.

There is a great interest taken in this instruction by Reserve and National Guard officers in the Missouri valley and these courses will develop both in number and in usefulness. The school in Kansas City, Missouri, will soon be self-sustaining, and a part of the instruction next year should be given by the officers stationed there.

5. There is a growing interest in the work of these schools by officers in the service generally and by the graduates of the school. A graduate of these schools, now stationed at one of the larger posts, wrote to the Commandant under date of December 9, 1924, as follows:

"It may interest you to know that I am conducting a class of twenty-eight officers and that we are following the Leavenworth course as closely as we can. I explain the teachings as well as I can and we solve and discuss the problems and other practical exercises that are being solved at Leavenworth this year. I believe this is helpful to the officers in the class and I find it most helpful to myself in keeping up with things."

Another graduate of these schools wrote under date of December 24, 1924:

"I have quite a lot of logistics to do, as I am conducting a series of conference problems for the officers of the _____ Corps Area Headquarters dealing with the fighting and marching of an army corps. I get up the successive situations, solve the tactical part and get up an approved solution for the logistic part. The several officers of the administrative and supply branches are then required to solve their respective parts of the problem. They are not too good, but enter into the spirit of the thing very heartily."

THE COMMAND AND GENERAL STAFF CORRESPONDENCE
SCHOOL

6. The work of this school, while intended primarily for National Guard and Organized Reserve officers, is being utilized by Regular officers to prepare themselves for the regular course and also is being used in the garrison schools. The work of this school is satisfactory and the progress during the next few years should be one of growth with no radical changes.

THE SPECIAL COMMAND AND GENERAL STAFF COURSE FOR
OFFICERS OF THE NATIONAL GUARD AND
ORGANIZED RESERVES

7. This course began on March 16, 1925, and closed June 16, 1925. It was a short, simplified, three months' course, so conducted as to lead the class to a participation in the series of general terrain exercises with the regular class.

8. This course opened with an attendance of thirty-seven officers, sixteen from the National Guard and twenty-one from the Organized Reserves. All graduated June 16, 1925, except one officer of the National Guard who was relieved during the course for business reasons, and four who failed to make the required percentage.

9. The value of this course and its effect upon the development of the Army will be far-reaching. I recommend that the number of officers taking the course be increased next year to fifty.

10. I wish to renew my recommendation that no officer should be detailed to take this course who is over the age of forty-seven years and especially the recommendation that Correspondence Course D should be a prerequisite to admission to this school in all cases. The officers this year who failed were all officers who had taken no part of Correspondence Course D and their failure to graduate was due to a lack of preparation. All this is a waste of time and money.

11. ANNUAL ALLOTMENT.

ANNUAL ALLOTMENT.—The annual allotment of \$46,440.00 has been disbursed as follows:

SELECTION OF INSTRUCTORS

12. I recommend that, beginning next year, at least one-third of the new instructors be not taken from the graduating class, but be selected from graduates of the Army War College who have had two years' experience with troops after graduation. Should a large majority of the instructors continue to be selected from the graduating class, the school will become ingrowing and largely a school of technique.

FUTURE COURSES

13. In future courses every effort should be made to cause students to come to a proper decision and every problem should be in part a problem of decision. The command must be emphasized and technique not permitted to outweigh sound tactical decisions.
