### Ft. Lauderdale, Florida

#### **Programs/Initiatives**

➢ High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA)<sup>7</sup>
Designated in 1990, the South Florida HIDTA is responsible for Broward, Miami-Dade, Monroe, and Palm Beach Counties. The extensive shoreline of the Florida peninsula and the Florida Keys combined with two major seaports and a close proximity to the Caribbean, make South Florida a prime target for maritime smuggling operations, particularly from Haiti.

There are currently no sites in Ft. Lauderdale receiving Federal funding as Weed and Seed sites.

- ➤ There were no Ft. Lauderdale recipients of the FY 2001 Housing and Urban Development Federally-Assisted Low Income Housing Drug Elimination Grant.<sup>14</sup>

#### **Crime and Drug-Related Crime**

From January to September 2003, there were 1,513 drug arrests in Ft. Lauderdale. During full year 2002, there were 2,239 drug arrests.<sup>15</sup>

#### Drugs

➤ Methamphetamine

In some areas of southern Florida, including Ft. Lauderdale, methamphetamine abuse has increased. <sup>17</sup>

Club Drugs

MDMA continues to be widely available and abused in the club scene in Ft. Lauderdale. 18

#### **Juveniles**

- From January to September 2003, the Ft. Lauderdale Police Department reported 996 juvenile arrests. During full year 2002, there were 1,238 juvenile arrests. <sup>19</sup>
- Approximately 21% of middle school and 35% of high school students in Broward County who were surveyed in 2002 reported lifetime use of an illicit drug.<sup>20</sup>

➤ Approximately 6.2% of Broward County middle school students and 13.8% of Broward County high school students surveyed in 2002 reported being high or drunk at school.<sup>21</sup>

➤ Approximately 17% of Broward County high school students surveyed in 2002 reported using an illicit drug within the past month. <sup>22</sup>

➤ Approximately 6% of Ft. Lauderdale students surveyed in 2001 reported using marijuana on school property within the past 30 days. Twenty-seven percent of Ft. Lauderdale students were offered, sold, or given an illegal drug on school property within the past year. 24

#### **Enforcement**

➤ As of October 31, 2001, there were 733 full-time law enforcement employees working in Fort Lauderdale (483 officers and 250 civilians). <sup>25</sup>

#### **Trafficking and Seizures**

- ➤ Broward County remains a favorite area for drug traffickers smuggling large quantities of cocaine, heroin, and marijuana into the United States from South America, Central America and the Caribbean. <sup>26</sup>
- ➤ In January 2002, U.S. Customs Service agents at the Ft. Lauderdale/Hollywood International Airport arrested drug couriers from Haiti and seized approximately 16.5 kilograms of cocaine that had been hidden in false panels of suitcases.<sup>27</sup>
- ➤ During 2002, law enforcement officials seized 1,503 marijuana plants in Broward County as part of the Domestic Marijuana Eradication program. The plants were discovered at 22 different indoor sites.<sup>28</sup>

#### Courts

- ➤ Drug Courts<sup>29</sup>
  - As of September 2003, there were 2 drug courts in Ft. Lauderdale that had been operating for more than 2 years. There was also 1 drug court that had recently been implemented and 1 drug court that was being planned in Ft. Lauderdale at that time.
- ➤ During FY 2001, 52% of the Federally-sentenced defendants in southern Florida had been charged with a drug offense. The majority of the drug offenses involved powder cocaine.<sup>30</sup>

#### **Consequences of Use**

➤ In 2002, lethal amounts of cocaine were found in 71 Ft. Lauderdale deaths.<sup>31</sup>

➤ During 2002, there were 76 drug-related deaths in Ft. Lauderdale in which OxyContin was involved. <sup>32</sup> This is up from 61 in 2001. <sup>33</sup>

➤ Substance Abuse and Health Care Services Division<sup>34</sup>

This office assists persons living in Broward County who have alcohol and/or drugrelated problems. They operate the Broward Addiction Recovery Center located in Ft. Lauderdale. This Center offers detoxification, diagnosis, and assessment of alcohol and drug-related problems, as well as outpatient and outreach services.
