➢ High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA)¹¹

Designated in 1996, the Gulf Coast HIDTA is responsible for Baldwin, Jefferson, Madison, Mobile, Montgomery, and Morgan counties in Alabama. In addition to Alabama, the Gulf Coast HIDTA is also responsible for counties in Louisiana and Mississippi.

Crime and Drug-Related Crime

During 2003, there were 13,819 adult arrests for drug possession in Alabama.¹² This is up from 2002, when there were 13,197 adult arrests for drug possession.¹³

Drugs

> Cocaine

Cocaine is a large drug threat in Alabama.¹⁷

➢ Heroin

The heroin found in Alabama is becoming available in a purer form that can be smoked or snorted. It is also becoming more affordable, which makes it more attractive to new users.¹⁸

- Marijuana Marijuana continues to have a strong presence in Alabama.¹⁹
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- Methamphetamine

Methamphetamine has surpassed cocaine as the biggest drug threat in Alabama.²⁰

Club Drugs

Club drug abuse and distribution among young people is on the rise in Alabama. Increases in arrests, overdoses, and seizures of designer drugs have been reported and indicate a trend toward increased availability and trafficking. MDMA, LSD, GHB, and Ketamine are readily available throughout the state, most commonly found on college campuses and at raves. GHB and MDMA are the club drugs of choice.²¹

Other Drugs

Alabama continues to see an increase in diverted pharmaceuticals across the state. OxyContin is the top pharmaceutical drug of abuse. Alabama is also a major market for Dilaudid.²² According to 2002 data from the National Survey on Drug Use and Health, 46% of Alabama citizens ages 12 and older felt that smoking marijuana once a month posed a great risk.²³

Enforcement

- As of October 2003, there were 15,720 full-time law enforcement employees in Alabama (10,414 officers and 5,306 civilians).²⁷
- DEA Mobile Enforcement Teams (MET)²⁸ Developed in 1995 in response to the overwhelming problem of drug-related violent crime in towns and cities across the nation, the MET program serves as a cooperative program between DEA and its state and local law enforcement counterparts. As of March 2003, there have been 8 MET deployments in Alabama. The MET deployments occurred in the following Alabama areas: Selma, Prichard, Alabaster, Enterprise, Gadsden, Anniston, Bessemer, and Green/Tuscaloosa counties.

Trafficking and Seizure

- A large amount of the cocaine available in Alabama is supplied by Mexican sources in California, Arizona, and Texas. However, Alabama's proximity to Atlanta and Miami also poses a significant threat.²⁹
- > Most of the heroin found in Alabama is transported from Jamaica.³⁰
- Alabama's stateside sources of supply of club drugs include Miami, Tennessee, and Georgia.³¹
- The main source of marijuana coming into Alabama is Mexico with connections to South America as well as through port cities of Florida and the Port of Mobile.³²
- The number of methamphetamine labs seized in Alabama by the DEA and state and local authorities has increased from 30 in 1999 to 289 in 2003.³³

Courts

➢ Drug Courts³⁶

As of September 2004, there were 12 drug courts in Alabama that had been operating for over 2 years, 10 that were recently implemented, and 9 that were being planned.

During FY 2002, approximately 42.1% of the Federally sentenced defendants in Alabama committed drug offenses. Approximately 42% of the Federal drug cases involved methamphetamine.³⁷
