CHANGES TO LOCAL AREA SERIES

Due to the revised MSA definitions, a single index is now published bimonthly for the **Washington-Baltimore**, **CMSA**. The separate indexes for Washington, DC-MD-VA, and Baltimore, MD, will no longer be published.

Indexes for the **Philadelphia** area are now published bimonthly. The area definition also changed from Philadelphia-Wilmington-Trenton, PA-DE-NJ-MD, to Philadelphia-Wilmington-Atlantic City, PA-DE-NJ-MD. Trenton is now part of the New York area.

In January and July each year, semi-annual average indexes will be published for **Pittsburgh**, **PA**. Bimonthly indexes have been discontinued. Butler County was added to the area definition.

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Consumer Price Index, June 2004

Note to CPI users:

This announcement details Consumer Price Indexes for two population groups: All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) and Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W). Both indexes reflect 1982-84 spending patterns. Monthly percent changes are shown for the U.S. and five large areas; bimonthly data are presented for the remaining areas. Area indexes do not measure differences in th levels of prices among cities; they only measure the average change in prices for each area since the base period.

Local area CPI indexes are by-products of the national CPI program. Because each local index is a small subset of the national index, it has a smaller sample size and is, therefore, subject to substantially more sampling and other measurement error than the national index. As a result, area indexes show greater volatility than the national index, although their long-term trends are quite similar. Therefore, the Bureau of Labor Statistics strongly urges users to consider adopting the national average CPI for use in escalator clauses.

This announcement is primarily intended for those users requiring the current indexes on a regular basis.
