### Tucson, Arizona

The following profile contains information on demographics, political figures, programs, crime, drug use, drug trafficking, and enforcement statistics.

#### Demographics

- Population (2003 American Community Survey): 479,613<sup>1</sup>
- Race/Ethnicity (2003 American Community Survey): 51.2% white; 3.8% black/African American; 1.5% American Indian/Alaska Native; 2.3% Asian; 0.1% Native Hawaiian/other Pacific Islander; 0.1% other race; 1.4% two or more races; 39.6% Hispanic/Latino origin (of any race)<sup>2</sup>

#### **Programs/Initiatives**

High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA)<sup>8</sup> The Arizona Partnership, one of the five partnerships of the Southwest Border HIDTA, was designated in 1990 and is responsible for 8 Arizona counties, including Pima County.

#### Crime and Drug-Related Crime

From January to September 10, 2004, there were 28 homicides known to police in Tucson. During full year 2003, there were 44 homicides known to police.<sup>9</sup>

#### Number of Drug Offenses, Tucson, 2000-September 2004

Data for 2003 indicate that 73.3% of adult male arrestees and 68.6% of adult female arrestees in Tucson tested positive for at least one of the following drugs at arrest: cocaine, heroin, marijuana, methamphetamine, or PCP.<sup>11</sup>

#### Percent of Adult Arrestees Testing Positive, Tucson, 2003

Approximately 55% of Tucson's adult male arrestees reported using marijuana in the past year. Among the male arrestees reporting past year marijuana use, the average number of days the drug was used in the past month was 11.6 days.<sup>12</sup>

#### Past Drug Use, Adult Male Arrestees, Tucson, 2003

Approximately 44.1% of Tucson's adult female arrestees reported using marijuana in the past year. Among the female arrestees reporting past year marijuana use, the average number of days the drug was used in the past month was 8.0 days.<sup>13</sup>

#### Drugs

➢ Cocaine

The accessibility of powder and crack cocaine remained stable in Tucson during 2003.<sup>14</sup> In the 4th quarter of FY 2002, powder cocaine sold for \$500-\$650/ounce and \$14,000-\$18,000/kilogram. Crack sold for \$20/rock and \$500-\$700/ounce in Tucson during this period.<sup>15</sup>

> Heroin

Mexican brown powder heroin is readily available in Tucson. During the 4th quarter of FY 2002, Mexican black tar heroin sold for 60-110/gram, 1,075-1,300/ounce, and 43,000/kilogram.

Marijuana

In the 4th quarter of FY 2002, marijuana sold for \$65-\$105/ounce and \$400-\$600/pound in Tucson.  $^{17}$ 

 Club Drugs MDMA is widely available in Tucson.<sup>18</sup>

#### Juveniles

- As part of the 2002 Arizona Youth Survey, 1,326 students from Pima County were surveyed. Approximately 23.9% of Pima County seniors, 23.0% of tenth graders, and 22.8% of eighth graders reported being drunk or high at school within the past year.<sup>19</sup>
- More than 10% (10.5%) of Pima County seniors, 13.2% of tenth graders, and 6.4% of eighth graders reported that they have sold illegal drugs within the past year.<sup>20</sup>
- Approximately 29.1% of the Pima County high school seniors surveyed reported using a drug within the past month.<sup>21</sup>

#### Enforcement

- Street Narcotics Section<sup>23</sup> Formed in November 2001, the Tucson Police Department
  - Formed in November 2001, the Tucson Police Department's Street Narcotics Unit addresses narcotic problems within Tucson.
- Metropolitan Area Narcotics Trafficking Interdiction Squads (MANTIS)<sup>24</sup> Initiated in 1988, MANTIS is a multi-jurisdictional, multi-agency narcotics task force in Pima County. The Tucson Police Department administers MANTIS.
- As of October 2002, there were 1,290 full-time law enforcement employees in Tucson (969 officers and 321 civilians).<sup>25</sup>

#### **Trafficking and Seizures**

- Tucson is commonly used as a drug stash location until the substances are ready to be sent to their final destination.<sup>26</sup>
- One of Arizona's 6 international airports is located in Tucson. These airports are often used by drug traffickers to smuggle drugs into and through the area.<sup>27</sup>
- Law enforcement officials have identified Tucson as a major methamphetamine distribution area.<sup>28</sup>
- During 2002, the Tucson Police Department's Narcotics Detective Unit initiated or assisted in the recovery of 1,688 pounds of marijuana, 3,281 grams of methamphetamine, and 430 grams of cocaine.<sup>29</sup>
- Tucson's Street Level Undercover Squad seized 741 pounds of marijuana, 792 grams of cocaine, 283 grams of crack cocaine, and 311 grams of methamphetamine during 2002.<sup>30</sup>
- During FY 2003, the MANTIS Task Force seized 27,019 pounds of cannabis. From FY 1988 to FY 2003, the MANTIS Task Force seized approximately 903,799 pounds of cannabis.<sup>31</sup>

#### Courts

➢ Drug Courts<sup>32</sup>

As of September 2004, there were 4 drug courts in Tucson that had been operating for over 2 years. No additional drug courts were in existence or being planned.

Pima County Drug Prosecution Project<sup>33</sup> Administered by the Pima County Attorney's Office, this program provides prosecution and court litigation services for all law enforcement agencies in Pima County, including the MANTIS Task Force and the Pima County Sheriff's Office narcotics units. Since beginning in July 1991, this project has concluded 14,209 cases, which resulted in 10,981 felony and 366 misdemeanor convictions.

Tucson City Attorney's Drug Enforcement Project<sup>34</sup> This program handles all non-felony drug cases referred by the Tucson Police Department's MANTIS Task Force and the Pima County Attorney's Office, along with asset forfeiture cases. Since July 1991, the activities of this project have resulted in the conclusion of 33,300 drug cases, which resulted in 226 felony and 21,748 misdemeanor convictions. During FY 2003, 715 offenders were diverted to treatment in lieu of prosecution under this program.

#### Corrections

Approximately 14.7% of the Arizona Department of Corrections inmates on June 30, 2004 were from Pima County.<sup>35</sup>

#### **Consequences of Use**

- There were 150 drug-induced deaths in Tucson during 2003.<sup>36</sup>
- > During 2002, there were 161 drug-induced deaths involving Pima County residents.<sup>37</sup>

#### **Treatment**

During 2003, 19.3% of adult male arrestees and 17.7% of adult female arrestees in Tucson reported receiving outpatient substance abuse treatment at some point within their lives.<sup>39</sup>
