APPLICATION PERIOD EXTENDED

PORTLAND – The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) will continue to accept nominations for 18 positions on its three East-Cascade Resource Advisory Councils (RAC's). The extended closing date for applications is **May 7, 2004.**

The RAC's need people who can work collaboratively to represent the viewpoints of commodity, conservation and/or community group interests for the Eastern Washington, John Day-Snake and Southeast Oregon RAC's. Vacancies and expiring terms include: commercial recreation and/or Off-Highway Vehicle (OHV), commercial timber, grazing permit holders, dispersed recreation, national or regional environmental groups, wild horse and burro, conservation and/or wildlife interests, historic and cultural interests, local elected officials, Indian tribes, and academician.

The RAC's are an integral part of land management for Federal Agencies. Local RAC's provide valuable advice on developing management plans and alternatives. Their expertise helps to refine project initiatives for issues as varied as grazing, forest health, land exchanges, and recreation management.

Candidate ratings are based on knowledge of the region, familiarity with the subject category, experience with collaborative decisionmaking, and recommendation letters. Individuals may nominate themselves or others, and current members whose terms will expire in September may be renominated. Candidates must reside in the State where the council has jurisdiction. BLM, an Agency of the U.S. Department of the Interior, manages more land, 262 million surface acres, than any other Federal Agency. Of this, about 164 million acres are permitted for livestock grazing. Most of the country's BLM-managed Public Land is located in 12 Western States, including Alaska. The Agency, which has a budget of \$1.8 billion and a workforce of 10,000 employees, also administers 700 million acres of subsurface mineral-estate throughout the Nation. BLM's "multiple-use" mission is to sustain the health, diversity and productivity of the Public Lands for the use and enjoyment of present and future generations. BLM accomplishes this by managing for such resources as outdoor recreation, livestock grazing, and energy and mineral development that helps meet the Nation's energy needs, and by conserving natural, historic, cultural and other resources on the Public Lands.
