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FCC TO HOLD SECOND INDIAN TELECOMMUNICATIONS INITIATIVES
REGIONAL WORKSHOP AND ROUNDTABLE IN RAPID CITY, SD, MAY 26 AND 27
National Tribal Telecommunications Association to Co-host

Washington, DC – The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) will hold its second Indian Telecommunications Initiatives (ITI) Regional Workshop and Roundtable in Rapid City, SD, on May 26 and 27.

The event will be co-hosted by the National Tribal Telecommunications Association and will take place at the Rushmore Plaza Civic Center all day the 26th and the morning of the 27th. After a successful ITI Regional Workshop and Roundtable event in Reno, NV last year, the FCC has chosen Rapid City as a site to bring Commission leadership and officials together with Tribal leaders to address telecommunications issues facing Indian Country with the goal of providing clear, practical information that Tribal decision-makers can use to prioritize their economic goals and telecommunications development agendas.

The FCC's ITI program seeks to promote understanding, cooperation and trust among American Indian tribes, Alaska Native villages, and tribal organizations; the FCC and other governmental agencies; and the telecommunications industry. It is designed to build partnerships to target specific concerns, identify potential solutions, and bring affordable, quality telecommunications services to Indian Country.

Specifically, ITI seeks to increase the telephone penetration rate among tribal communities; facilitate the deployment of telecommunications infrastructure in Indian Country necessary to provide telecommunications services; and inform tribes and tribal consumers about financial support available through federal government programs, including Universal Service Fund programs.
