He was involved in the Fire Use Program since 1979 when he helped write the Fire Management Plan for the Sawtooth Wilderness. Other businesses throughout the town of Grangeville employ Seniors under the Career Experience Program.





### Engineers Receive Leadership Award

The 2001 "Traditional Skills and Minimum Tool Leadership Award" was presented to John Kattell of the Regional Office and Bill Fowler on the Nez Perce National Forest by the Regional Forester, Brad Powell. John and Bill received this award for their designing of "packable bridges". The annual Wilderness Meeting was held January 13th through the 15th in Missoula. The project was initiated in 1999 for replacing Goat, Ditch and Pettibone Bridges located in the Selway Bitterroot Wilderness.

During the public scoping process, a public field trip was conducted to look at each of the three bridge sites. The group included Wilderness Watch representatives, hiking interests, Back Country Horsemen Clubs along with several concerned and interested public. From this trip



along with scoping letters, it was decided to design "packable bridges." This is where John and Bill began their work with the help of David Scovell, Structural Engineer at the Regional Office.

In keeping the integrity of our "wilderness," the new bridge designed used stringers that could be packed with stock. This would minimize the use of aircraft. The stringers could not weigh too much and could not be too long for stock to pack. John and Bill designed the packable bridges to come fully assembled from the fabricator so the crew on the ground would be assured that all the parts fit and the bridges could be assembled. These bridge sites are located many miles within the wilderness, which makes it impossible to run to the hardware store when you discover you are missing a part or piece of equipment.

The materials for the new bridges arrived on Forest in September 2001 already assembled. The ground crew designed a marking system where each piece of these stringers could easily be re-assembled exactly the way they came apart. Approximately 46,000 pounds of bridge materials were flown to Shearer using a fixed-Wing aircraft. It took a total of 134 mule loads to get the bridge materials to each respective bridge site.

There is still a little work to be performed on each bridge during the field season of 2003. Because of John and Billís dedication and hard work, completions of the bridge projects were completed in a timely and safe manner while keeping to the wilderness values and solitude. Packable bridges will be considered more in our wilderness with the success of this project.





## Changing & Rearranging

As most of you have probably noticed, there's been some changing & rearranging going on in Office Services. For one, the big bulky printing press is gone! It has a happy new home at the Missoula Public School System.

Secondly, Debbie Farris has moved into the copyroom. And did you check out the new linoleum in Deb's office/copyroom - pretty snazzy - and a fresh paint job to boot! The Audio/Visual room is now just that - an AV supply room.

Another change is the Forest recently purchased a new Canon C2058 color copier. The Image Runner C2058 can be programmed with job codes to keep track of project costs and can copy 21 color pages per minute. Debbie Farris is assigned sole operation of the Image Runner. Employees are asked to fill out the green copy request sheet with job code and all other specifications of the project.

There are specific rules and regulations when dealing with a color copier, Debbie will coordinate with Laura Smith for specific instructions to keep within government printing regulations.

Along with special forest project copying (color maps for EAs, EISs), Debbie will continue to do forest copying jobs for resources and contracting, etc.

- -Flu vaccine


Avoid spreading colds and flu by doing the following:

The Nez Perce National Forest has a new addition to its 1st aid equipment list ñ an automatic external defibrillator (AED). Carolyn Wren, Forest 1st Aid Coordinator, has implemented the new program for the Forest and will oversee the installation and maintenance of the unit. The new unit was purchased and installed in the break room at the Supervisorís Office. This will help the Forest to maintain its high safety standards for personnel. AEDs have evolved to the point where staff and public can be trained to use them and give care to a cardiac victim before EMTs arrive at the scene. Sudden cardiac arrest kills approximately 225,000 people in the U. S. alone each year, and can strike anyone.

According to the American Heart Association, the only definitive treatment for sudden cardiac arrest is a defibrillation shock: an electrical pulse through the heart, which restores a normal heart rhythm. The chance of a sudden cardiac arrest victimis survival decreases by up to 10



These AEDs are portable and user friendly. Essentially once turned on, they will talk the trained and certified caregiver through the necessary steps providing defibrillation to the cardiac victim. In addition to the use of the AED on cardiac victims, early CPR is still an integral part of providing lifesaving aid. Nez Perce Forest personnel are currently receiving training in the use of the AED.
